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HAY ON M'KINLEY SECRETARY OF STATE EULOGIZES MARTYRED PRESIDENT. MEMORIAL SERVICES AT CAPITOL. PRINCE HENRY AMONG THOSE IN ATTENDANCE.

Washington, Feb. 27.—Memorial services in memory of the late President McKinley were held in the hall of the representatives today in the presence of President Roosevelt, Prince Henry, members of the cabinet, justices of the supreme court, army and navy officers...

Speech of Secretary Hay. Mr. Hay said in part: For the third time the congress of the United States are assembled to commemorate the life and death of a president slain by the hand of an assassin.

Uselessness of Such Infamy. The stupid uselessness of such an infamy affronts the common sense of the world. One can conceive how the death of a dictator may change the political conditions of an empire; how the extinction of a narrowing line of kings may bring in an alien dynasty...

Hellish Growth of Hatred. What a world of insoluble problems such an event excites in the mind. Not merely in its personal, but in its public aspects it presents a paradox not to be comprehended. Under a system of government so free and so impartial that we recognize its existence only by its beneficence; under a social order so purely democratic that classes can not exist in it, affording opportunities so universal that even conditions are as changing as the winds, where the laborer of today is the capitalist of tomorrow...

Both are in custody.

FAKE CONCERN BANKRUPT. Chicago Guarantee and Trust Company in Hands of a Receiver. Chicago, Feb. 27.—The Surety Guarantee & Trust company, with an alleged capital of \$1,000,000, went into the hands of a receiver today as the result of bankruptcy proceedings.

GOESTO MOUNT VERNON PRINCE HENRY VISITS TOMB OF WASHINGTON. PLANTS LINDEN TREE ON SWARD. WASHINGTON RELICS ARE ALSO INSPECTED. Large Crowds Watch the Arrival of the Royal Visitor and the People Cheer Him Cordially.

They are charged with being responsible for the death of John S. Kirk, a watchman, in a battle two weeks ago in the district.

REVENUES IN CUBA. Washington, Feb. 27.—The division of insular affairs gave out today a statement showing that the customs revenues in Cuba for the calendar year 1901 were \$15,029,388, compared with \$16,009,922 for 1900 and \$14,894,974 for 1899.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH. Three Ironwood Miners Sit Over Burning Box of Powder. Ironwood, Mich., Feb. 27.—By mere chance three miners were saved from being blown into bits in the Iron Belt mine today. They were employed on the night shift, and after eating dinner went into the mine to work. Two boxes of powder had been placed on the steam pipes and formed convenient seats for the two miners, and the other laid down beside them.

GERMANY NOW CUTS IN. Reichstag Is Asked to Further Peace Negotiations in South Africa. Berlin, Feb. 27.—Petitions were presented to the reichstag today suggesting that the house take action for the furtherance of peace negotiations in South Africa. They were referred to the imperial chancery. Count Von Buelow. Several members of the house indulged in unlimited vituperation of Great Britain, asserting the only possible explanation of the refusal to admit German Red Cross nurses and ambulances to South Africa was that the British were ashamed to allow the world to have a glimpse of the scandalous conditions prevailing there.

ATTEMPTS AT TRAIN WRECKING. Obstructions Are Placed on Burlington Tracks Near Hastings, Neb. Hastings, Neb., Feb. 27.—Two attempts have been made to wreck Burlington passenger train No. 3 a short distance east of this town, and detectives are here today making an investigation. No. 3 reaches Hastings in the night. Ten days ago the engine was derailed and partly wrecked by running into a pile of ties. Tuesday night of this week the same obstruction was encountered at nearly the same place, but the engineer saw the danger in time.

ALLEGED ANARCHIST ARRESTED. Salvo Giouani Admits He Intended to Kill State Attorney of Illinois. Chicago, Feb. 27.—Salvo Giouani, an alleged anarchist, was arrested today upon his own statement that he intended to kill State Attorney Deenen. He had been ejected from Deenen's office early in the day. He alleges Deenen kept him in jail eight months without cause. He attempted with a razor to slash the policeman who arrested him.

OIL GUSHER GOES WILD. While Being Exhibited Section of Pipe Suddenly Bursts. Beaumont, Tex., Feb. 27.—One of the big six-inch oil gushers was being exhibited here this afternoon when it blew out a section of pipe connecting the gate valve and went wild. It is throwing a solid stream of oil tonight and there will be much trouble in shutting it off. It is estimated the well is wasting 2,000 barrels of oil an hour.

HOLDS UP BANK CASHIER. Robber Secures \$1,500 in Cash but Is Captured. Glencoe, Minn., Feb. 27.—William Matthews, a locomotive fireman, this morning put on a mask, entered the bank of Plato, overpowered the cashier and took \$1,500 from the safe. He caught a freight train for Glencoe and was arrested here, confessing the crime. All the money but ten dollars was restored.
