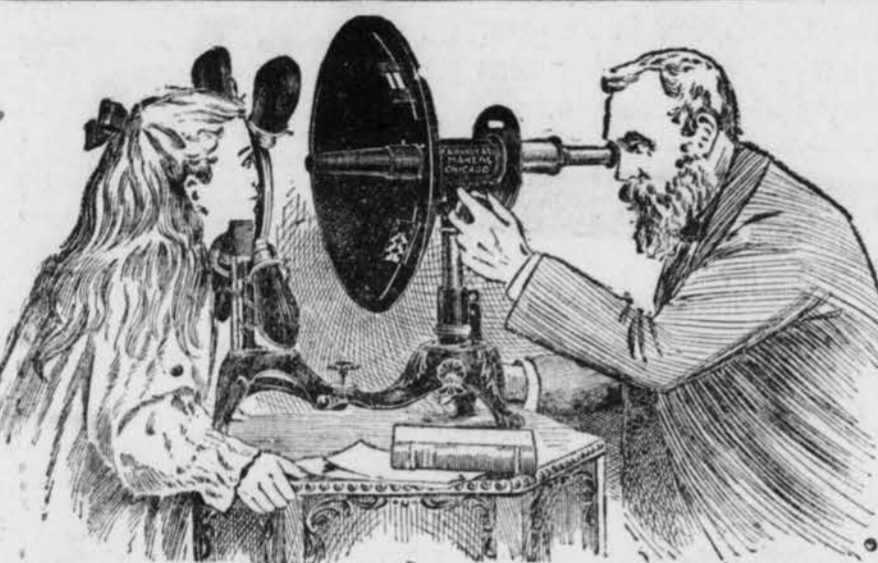

Report That Hancock Is to Lose Its Race Course. There is some possibility of the Hancock race course, which is owned by private parties, being sold, paved up, and used for other purposes, says the Hancock Journal. This would be a distinct loss to the town and the citizens should take steps to buy the property and retain it for its present use. The race course is one of the finest in the upper peninsula, and has been laid out on the only ground suited to track purposes in the vicinity of Hancock. It affords the only facilities which it is possible for Hancock to enjoy track events, and its destruction would be a distinct loss to the athletes of the town and citizens generally, as well as to horsemen. Its value to the town as an arena is also of importance. It affords a place large enough for the largest circuses or shows under canvas, to stretch their tents. Several shows have exhibited there which have attracted thousands of people to the town, and that in itself is a matter of money as well as interest. The track, situated as it is, fits in very nicely with the requirements of the town. As Hancock develops the necessity for a track and arena will become more urgent. A conglomerate company of preserving the excellent facilities they now enjoy in this respect, it is bound to be always a matter of general regret. An option has been obtained on the race course site and the property may be purchased at a very reasonable figure. The citizens should interest themselves to see that the property is not sold and divided up into lots. The purchase of the property by the citizens of the town is very feasible project from a business point of view. With the facilities of the street cars and the rapid growth of the town and surrounding country, there is no doubt that the property could be made to pay good dividends to the investors. It is understood that there is already a party ready to lease the race course at a figure which would insure a satisfactory return for the purchase price. The race track has an importance and use beyond the racing people. It is necessary to almost all athletic training, and is enjoyed by all who possess driving horses and is valuable as a place of public exhibitions. The loss of the Hancock Driving park would be felt by Houghton fully as much as Hancock, as the park is used by Houghton to a large extent during the summer season. Not only are Houghton horse races pulled off there but baseball and football games as well. In fact the driving park is the only place where sporting events of the kind may be had at Portage Lake. It is sincerely hoped in Houghton, as well as in Hancock, that the park will not be sold. A Houghton man held it under lease last summer. COUNTY JAIL INSPECTION. The county jail was inspected yesterday afternoon by the county jail inspectors, W. F. Miller, Judge of Probate Gray, and Rudolph Haas of Houghton, and Thomas Lyon of Calumet. The gentlemen will report on the sanitary and conditions otherwise of the jail at the next meeting of the county board to be held March 11. The jail is inspected twice a year. Sheriff Willis has thirteen prisoners at present, and takes pains in keeping the jail clean as clean as possible. Some suggestions in the way of improvements may be made by the inspectors. POSSESSES GREAT MERIT. Trimountain Mine a Property of Altogether Exceptional Value. The recent sensational advance in the price of Trimountain stock has afforded food for gossip and conjecture, both in Boston and here. There is no question that great promotion of the stock is held a few hands, and that the increase in price is due to manipulation to a large extent, but it should also be borne in mind that the mine, unlike some others in the Lake district distinguished by stock booms in the past, possesses very great merit. Whether the price is or is not too high is a matter for investors and speculators to form their own opinions on, but the mine itself is a property of altogether exceptional value. Exact returns from the mine are impossible to obtain, and all sorts of rumors are current, but it is known, from mill employes and others in a position to know the facts, that the percentage of mineral secured from the rock stamped is very high—higher than the returns from any other amygdaloid mine in the district, with the exception of the Champion, which is probably getting about the same returns as the Trimountain. The gratifying returns secured from the Baltic, for the phenomenal return given by the Champion and Trimountain fully verify the enthusiastic predictions made by believers in these three mines, which constitute the so-called "South range" group. The mines lie six to ten miles south of Houghton, and are developed on a very large scale. It does not seem unreasonable to predict that within five or six years these three mines will be turning out nearly or quite as much copper as the Calumet & Hecla is now making. Comparing new mines with the Calumet & Hecla or other, as a thing often done by over-enthusiastic promoters, but in this case the properties are so far developed that predictions of a great future are based on very substantial data. The proposed increase of the capital stock of the Atlantic mine to 100,000 shares, all the mining companies that mine up to the present average level. When the company was organized, some thirty years ago, the Michigan laws permitted a maximum capitalization of but 40,000 shares, as against 100,000 now allowed. Most of the older mining companies have increased their capital stock to the present average level. The Atlantic is now following the lead of the Wolverine and Tamarack, with 60,000 shares each, will remain the only important Lake mines having less than 100,000 shares capitalization, though in several cases the companies retain more or less stock unissued, in their treasury. The Franklin continues making about 250 tons of mineral per month, and developments at the conglomerate openings are being pushed aggressively. Captain Hosking has shown himself a good manager, and the mining and milling costs of the Franklin are probably as low as those of any mine in the Lake district. Owing to the opening of mines of native copper in New Jersey, New Brunswick and elsewhere, the Lake district is being driven on for experienced mill men. Until very recently native copper has been mined in this district and in Bolivia, the mines in the latter country being comparatively small. Native copper is distributed much more widely than is commonly imagined, being found, usually in small quantities, in many of the leading copper districts of the world. Samples of ore recently sent to the Deerpark smelter from the Superior mine in Algoma, Ontario, assayed from 6 1/2 to nearly 15 per cent copper. The Rock Lake mine, north of Georgian Bay, has a 200-ton concentrator completed at the mine, and is now arranging to ship several outcrops of concentrated ore weekly, to the smelter at Dollar Bay, until the new Canadian smelter is built. The cold fit that followed the collapse in the price of copper, in December, has worn away, and the mining men and investors of the Lake district are now facing the facts in a fairly cheerful frame of mind. The day of seventeen-cent copper has come, and is not likely to return again soon, but the Lake mines have been highly prosperous in the past with copper selling materially cheaper than now, and thanks to the money lavishly spent for new equipment during the boom years, the local mines are now, as a rule, in the best of condition, and capable of prospering with copper at the present range of prices. Experiments are being conducted on the Calumet & Hecla sands, and results seemed so far as encouraging. The largest amount of copper mined but not extracted, to be found at any point on the globe, is in the C. & H. tailings at Lake Linden. These tailings have been piling up for nearly thirty-five years, and have been accumulating at the rate of nearly 1,500,000 tons annually in the more recent years. The average amount of copper carried in the sands is probably a trifle under three-tenths of one per cent, and in a little less than one per cent, though the older sands are richer. The Calumet & Hecla sands, aggregating many millions of tons, carry an average of copper greater than the amount secured by the Atlantic mine, from rock stamped, and any practicable process of extracting the major portion of the values from these tailings will give several hundred million pounds of metal. Diamond drill explorations at the Arcadian have recently shown some rich cores, and the hole from which the cores were obtained will probably be developed into a shaft in copper, and are apparently of about the same average as the Isle Royale openings, on the same lodes a mile or two further south. Capitalists of the Lake district have recently secured control of the Pinto Creek Copper company, now opening mines in the same district as Arizona. Lake Superior capital heavily interested in a half dozen or more properties of promise in Arizona, this field being preferred to Montana for copper mining investments by the people of the Lake district. This is not due to any distrust of Montana, but the local conditions in that state are not as favorable to the investment of outside capital in copper mining ventures. The production area is so small that new mines of unusual promise are not opened frequently, and there is a great deal of local capital available for the development of Montana mines, while the re-
