



AGREE ON MANCHURIAN TREATY.

Early Signing of Convention by Russian's and Chinese Expected.

London, Saturday, March 29 .- The ekin correspondent of the Times cables that Paul Lessar, the Russian minister. und Pring Ching, president of the hinese foreign office, have agreed upon he main conditions of the Manchurian onvention, and an early signing of the greement is expected.

The evacuation of three provinces will e carried out in three successive periods of six months from the signing of onvention. Various vague conditions uch as "if the state of the country peraits" are to be excluded from the agreement. It is stipulated the convention nust be ratified within three months from the day it is signed.
