C. E. WILDE COMES HERE FROM KALAMAZOO.

BELL SUPERINTENDENT FOR U. P.

LIKE POSITION FORMERLY HELD BY G. D. SHERMAN.

E. C. Short, Construction Man, Transferred to Larger District With Headquarters at Minneapolis—Thousand 'Phones Here.

C. E. Wild of Kalamazoo has been appointed superintendent of the Northern division of the Michigan Telephone company and has already entered upon his new duties.

Mr. Wild has been superintendent of the Southern division with headquarters at the famous celery town. He is an expert in all the various branches of the telephonic service, and is considered one of the most valuable men in the employ of the corporation of which the Michigan company is a part.

Mr. Wild is one that has virtually just been created, although in many respects the appointment of the superintendent is a return to the method of handling the upper peninsula business in vogue over a year ago when the company inaugurated its aggressive campaign and constructed many miles of new lines.

Another change made by the Bell company is the transfer of E. C. Short, assistant superintendent of construction. Mr. Short has had in charge the construction work throughout the peninsula. He now goes to Minneapolis, where he will hold a position of like responsibility, his territory being in the Northwest and embracing a larger section of country.

He is succeeded here by Samuel Morris who has been division foreman for the Southern division. Mr. and Mrs. Short have made many friends during their stay in Marquette, and it is with regret that those have learned of their impending departure.

It is the intention of Mr. Wild to still further improve the local and long distance service wherever in the peninsula betterments seem to be necessary. Careful inspection of the various exchanges and lines will be made and where improvements are found desirable they will be undertaken.
