Began Work in 1861.

bogus checks payable to "Sam Eastman." They were for \$10 each, were drawn on the First National bank and purported to have been issued by the City Lumber yard, per F. C. Cole, manprinted with a rubber stamp. As was the case here, butcher shops furnished victims. Bogus cheeks were palmed off on three of them, while at a fourth which the fellow visited there fortunately happened to be not sufficient cash in the till at the time, the money havmade at each of the shops taken in, these being those conducted by Messrs. Quist, Wills and Scandling.

The checks were passed during the evening, and the next morning when they were presented at the bank, the forgeries were at once detected, the signature of Mr. Cole not being in the least like the genuine. The police were notified, and succeeded in ascertaining that the stranger had taken the night St. Paul train for Pembine. A deputy sheriff and other officers went there and ascertained further clues and at last accounts were in pursuit of the fellow with some hope of capturing him,

There was probably no sicture in the collection, however, that vas viewed with more general interest han the large, historical painting entitled, "The Story of San Juan Hill," and a number of its admirers expressed the hope that it could be added to the Normal's gallery, "The Village Smithy," "The Last Glow," the two dog pictures -in fact, many others too numerous to mention all had their favorites amon the visitors, and it was a feature noted the fireside or of the rising or setting sun. The effect in this particular, it would seem, could hardly be excelled, and it won for the painter many com-

olimentary remarks. People who did not attend the exhi pition should not fail-if they appreciate good paintings-to ao so at their carliest convenience. The visit will be found well worth the time and a pleas ure that has not heretofore come this way. The studio, at request, will be open to the public between the hours of 4 and 6 and 8 and 10 p. m., the time prior to 4 o'clock being given over to sittings for portraits or to work on other pictures as yet unfinished.
