Many of the strikers and sympathizers were armed with ice picks and poles seized from the wagons and in the fight the negroes were badly lacerated by these weapons. At 9 o'clock a caravan of thirty-eight

loads of beef, interspersed with five busss containing policemen, came out of the tock yards and amid hoots and cries of derision the crowd started down town. One of the most serious riots broke out in State street at the corner of Congress while the thirty-eight wagon caravan was moving along the latter street. At this place the mob made a desperate assault on the drivers, but was compelled to turn its attention to the police who came up on the run. Twice the bluecoats were driven back by the crowd but the third attempt to disperse the mob was successful. A number of heads were broken and several arrests made. 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


