TAX ROLL COMPLETED. City Assessor T. A. Thoren Has Devoted Much Time to Its Preparation.

The board of review of Negaunee will be in session next Monday and Tuesday, when the tax roll as prepared by City Assessor T. A. Thoren will be read.

Charles Breimengrover, supervisor of Turin township, was in Negaunee a short time yesterday morning. A meeting of the county board was held yesterday at Marquette, but Mr. Breimengrover took advantage of the early train and came up to see Prosecuting Attorney F. A. Bell relative to the action of a certain homesteader, who refuses to allow a team road to be built through his place.

The farmers of Turin township would be pleased to have a road leading to Little Lake. This would give them connection with the proposed new Goose Lake road and the road leading to Escanaba.

Mr. Thoren does not believe many changes will be necessary this year. He has given the work more careful attention than he did that on last year's roll and he thinks the taxpayers will be satisfied with the valuations as he has fixed them.

Mr. Thoren believes that the board of supervisors will have no occasion to raise the valuations, as was done last year because it was considered that the Negaunee mine was assessed below its value. The majority of the taxpayers at that time has not been forgotten by Negaunee people and it is hoped that the board will treat local taxpayers fairly this year.

BUT FOUR CHANGES ARE MADE

A. A. KIENHOLZ NEW INSTRUCTOR AT HIGH SCHOOL.

Comes Highly Recommended and Also Knows a Thing or Two About Athletics—Places for Three Normal Graduates.

With the exception of four changes, the list of teachers in the city schools will next term be the same as is the corps now serving in the school year drawing to a close. The school board has made its selections and has closed the various contracts, as follows:

 - Froebel school—Mary A. McKinnon, principal; Elizabeth A. Thiel, Emma G. Coles, Edith Blyth, M. Louisa Primrose, Rose E. Yungbluth, Della McCallum, Mary T. Dougher, Lucile Wallace.
 - Ely school—Mary Atfield, principal; Christine Campbell, Margaret Wenzinger, Georgia Rowe, Ada E. Bentley, Rosemary McCarthy, Mary Nelson, Elizabeth Crowley.
 - Third street school—Marie O'Meara, principal; Frances Russell, Nora McCarthy.
 - Fourth street school—Kate C. Wallace, principal; Isabel MacLeod, Nellie B. McCarthy.
 - Nester school—Mary C. Donovan, principal; Nellie M. Heardon, Flora B. McCarthy.

- In addition to the above, there are three new teachers who have not yet been assigned places. They are Lucile Bell, Mary B. Deasy and Nellie R. Connors, all of whom will graduate from the Normal this year.
- One Change in High School.
- In the high school, the only change is that of history teacher, F. M. Giles being succeeded in that position by Mr. Kienholz, who will also act as principal in place of Mr. Clark, who now officiates as such. Mr. Kienholz comes highly recommended, and the school board considers itself fortunate to have been able

to secure his signature to a contract. The young man is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and is now taking a post-graduate course at Lake Forest, in connection with which he is teaching two classes at the Armour Institute at a salary of \$80 per month. Mr. Kienholz also is said to be very proficient in athletics.

At the Froebel school, Miss Young is succeeded by Miss Dougher, having accepted a more lucrative position in the teaching corps of the Duluth schools. Of the present teachers at the Third street school, Miss Blanchard has resigned with the intention of entering the University of Michigan at the opening of the term there. Her place has not yet been filled, but will be by the appointment of one of the three young ladies unassigned.

At the North Marquette school, Miss McKnight will be succeeded by a new teacher as yet unassigned. The entire teaching corps next year will number forty-one, exclusive of Superintendent Thompson and those of the Normal school faculty who assist in the kindergarten department.

MUST BUY OWN CLOTHES.

City Shelves a Petition Asking Uniforms for the Police Officers.

The police, as do all other employees of the city, will have to purchase their own uniforms. At a meeting of the common council a few weeks ago a petition from the police officers was presented, asking that the city hereafter purchase uniforms for the force, the practice at Ishpeming and Negaunee being urged in support of the plan. The matter did not strike the aldermen favorably, but the petition was referred to the police committee for consideration. The committee has now reported that it considers it inexpedient for the city to incur the expense, and its recommendation has been adopted, thus shelving the matter.

OPEN UNTIL EIGHT.

Early Closing Rule Not to Be Observed Next Week.

Owing to the large number of strangers that are expected to be here during the Macabee celebration, the merchants of the city have decided to keep their places of business open every evening next week until 8 o'clock. And in view of the fact that many people will make use of the downtown streets during these evenings, the merchants will, for the purpose of making the streets appear more cheerful and attractive than they otherwise would be, run their window lights until 10 o'clock or later.

MEANS MORE DELAY.

Fire Destroys Plant Which Was to Furnish Material for New School.

The contractors who are building the two new school buildings have been seriously hampered since the work was first started, by the delay in the receipt of material, and now they are due for more bad luck of the same kind. The plant and stock of the Lewis Manufacturing company of Bay City has been destroyed by fire, Superintendent of Construction Wilson was advised yesterday, and as the concern has the contract to supply the material for the interior and exterior finish of the schools here, it means another delay of probably three or four weeks. The two structures are called to be completed by September 1, but with the latest misfortune it is extremely doubtful whether the contractors will be able to finish up by that time.

NEW BARN FOR POOR FARM.

County Board Appropriates \$1,200 for Its Construction.

The session of the county board yesterday was rather busy, exclusive of confined to routine business. All but one or two of the supervisors were present. The committee to which had been referred the matter of the disposition of the old county poor house stated that it had sold the structure to William Seaman of this city for \$150. The board acquiesced in the sale by adopting the committee's report. Only the frame portion of the structure is covered by the deal with Mr. Seaman, the stone and other material being reserved.

It was definitely decided that a barn be built at the new county farm, and for the purpose the sum of \$1,200 was appropriated. Other appropriations were \$800 for the repair of the new Goose Lake road, running south of Negaunee, and \$400 for the construction of a new bridge over Cherry creek at the point where it crosses the Chocoyay road.

The plans for the new court house, it was announced by Chairman Walter Fitch, would be ready for the inspection of the board at the next meeting. The board, after allowing a big gist of bills, adjourned to July 2.

FEARS FOR LAUNCHMEN.

Report of Disaster Up the Lake Caused Excitement Here.

Some little excitement was created about the city yesterday morning by a report that Frank Hoard and R. L. Francis had met with disaster while on a launching trip up the lake shore, or at least had been blown out into the lake. Considerable apprehension was caused and had resulted in the dispatch at an early hour of a tug up the lake on an investigating tour. While there was some ground for the report, the arrival of the two gentlemen yesterday afternoon put an end to the alarming rumors.

Mr. Hoard and his companion left Sunday for the Huron Mountain club with a launch load of supplies for that resort and for the Laidley party at the So-sa-wa-gaming club at the Yellow Dog. A landing was made at Pine river, and in the evening the launch was headed down the lake to the Yellow Dog. A stop was made there, and the lake was fast becoming turbulent the men put back to Big Bay for shelter. On Tuesday a gentleman who called at the club, expecting to find the launch there, misconstrued the answer to an inquiry as to the whereabouts of the craft, and through this the alarming reports arose. The two men, however, had waited until the sea ran down and arrived here yesterday much surprised to find that fears as to their safety had been aloft.

The tug made the run up to the Yellow Dog and returned about noon with the Laidley party.

MISSIONARY COUNCIL TODAY.

Dr. W. H. Oldham, field secretary of the General Missionary society of the Methodist church, arrived in the city from Chicago last evening and will today take charge of the missionary council which opens this morning at the M. E. church. This evening, Dr. Oldham will deliver an address which promises to be one of the best features of the entire program arranged for the assembly and which will bring the semi-annual gathering of the ministers of the Lake Superior district to a close.

Last evening at the church, a large congregation was present and the program was greatly enjoyed. The principal features were addresses by Rev. Mr. Coombe of Calumet and Rev. Mr. Crane of Newberry. Peter White, who was announced to speak on "pioneer preachers" in the upper peninsula, was unable to be present, being in Lansing at present, and his place was taken by Mr. Crane, who is one of the oldest ministers in the district. His talk, of a reminiscence nature, was very interesting. Following the exercises and speaking, an informal reception was held which was very largely attended. Refreshments were served.
