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



The most important advance in valua ion was on the Kirkwood block. The ssessor had the figures at \$16,000, but the board raised it to \$19,000. Mr. Kirkwood thinks the advance is unjust, in view of the fact that the contract price of the building was only \$15,088. The board considered that the block is one of the best in the city so far as it earning capacity is concerned. Its loca tion was the principal thing taken into consideration. Mr. Kirkwood will likely go before the board next week and endeavor to have the valuation cut down The valuation of Charles Muck' block, formerly the Davis-Green build ng, was raised from \$11,000 to \$12,000. The Neeley block was advanced from \$10,000 to \$12,000. The valuation of E C. Anthony's property went from \$1,300 to \$1,800. Dave Caples' properties was advanced from \$4,300 to \$5,500, A number of other properties took an upward step, though very few of the valuation on the smaller residences were raised. The members of the board do not anticipate a stormy time at the meetings next week. It is thought that the val uations of the mining properties are not too high. The Negaunee mine, for in stance, is assessed at \$1,500,000. Whil this sum is considerably greater than the valuation of last year it is not considered exorbitant. The mine is now in much better shape than it was a year ago and the board considers that its vale has increased rather than decreased.
