RIOT IN PATERSON
STRIKERS ATTACK SILK MILLS AND STONE WORKERS.
TWO PERSONS FATALLY INJURED
MOB IS CHARGED BY POLICE AND MANY SHOTS EXCHANGED.
Anarchists Are in Command and Threaten to Apply Torch Before Trouble Is Ended—Militia May Be Called Out.

Pateron, N. J., June 18.—This city was in the hands of a mob today and as the result of riots a number of persons were shot and two at least will die. The police were unable to prevent the mob from attacking the silk mills. The mob was charged by the police and many shots were exchanged. Anarchists are in command and threaten to apply the torch before trouble is ended. Militia may be called out.

Belles Commover, Entered for American Derby, Captures Special.
Chicago, June 18.—J. B. Ross, Belles Commover, an outsider in the betting in the American Derby, which will be run here Saturday, won the Derby trial special today at Harlem. The colt ran a marvelous race, covering a mile and an eighth in 1:53 2-5 and won in a gallop by three lengths. John A. Drake's Wyeth, in a desperate drive, beat out Lucian Appleby by a nose for place. Crusades, second choice in the American Derby, quit after he had run a mile.

Creede, Col. June 18.—The second serious fire in the history of Creede, occurred yesterday. Fully \$200,000 worth of property was burned. The fire occurred in what is known as upper Creede. That part of the town is in ruins and an entire block on Main street is destroyed. Six families are homeless. William Stewart and Fritz Zint are missing and are thought to have been burned to death. Many others were injured.

Chicago & Alton Train Derailed, One Fatality Resulting.
Kansas City, Mo. June 18.—The Chicago & Alton local passenger train No. 14, which left Kansas City at 8 o'clock this morning was derailed two miles west of Mexico, Mo., this afternoon, while running on schedule time. The engine and three cars were derailed. Engineer M. Kellart of Slater, was thrown out of the engine and killed. Thirteen passengers were slightly injured but all continued the trip to their destination.

Pittsburg, June 18.—Jones & Laughlin, iron and steel manufacturers, have voluntarily advanced the wages of all their employes excepting the tonnage men. The increase affects over 8,000 men and will average ten per cent.

CALL A CONVENTION
UNITED MINE WORKERS TO DECIDE ON SYMPATHETIC STRIKE.
WILL MEET IN INDIANAPOLIS JULY 17
INDICATIONS ARE SOFT COAL MEN WILL BE INVOLVED.
Nearly Enough Votes Now Secured to Order General Calling Out—Michigan Miners Favor Movement.

Indianapolis, June 18.—An official call for a national convention of the United Mine Workers of America was issued this afternoon from the national headquarters in this city by Secretary-Treasurer Wilson. The convention will meet here July 17 to determine whether the soft coal miners of the country shall go out on a strike to assist the striking anthracite miners of Pennsylvania.

FATAL FAMILY QUARREL.
Two Women Killed by Third in Cleveland.
Toledo, O., June 18.—Rose Wheeler, aged twenty-five, died here yesterday. Mrs. William Wheeler, aged sixty-eight, is dying from an assault made upon them by Mrs. George Leightner, aged twenty-six. The two families reside in a double house on Front street. The three women had been quarreling all day. There are conflicting reports of how the fight started, but before the outsiders got into the house Mrs. Leightner had inflicted twenty wounds on the body of Miss Wheeler. Her mother received almost as many. Miss Wheeler was dead and her mother dying. Mrs. Leightner was arrested. She says the deed was committed in self-defense.

TO DISBAR ATTORNEY S. H. DENT.
Denver, Colo., June 18.—Application has been made in the supreme court by the Colorado Bar association to have disbarred from practicing law Sidney H. Dent, trustee in bankruptcy of the United States for this district. Dent is a relative of Mrs. U. S. Grant. The charges allege that money was obtained by the exhibition of false letters, and making false statements concerning an application for a patent.

VICTORY FOR STEARNS.
Carries Twelve Wards in Grand Rapids in Republican Caucuses.
Grand Rapids, Mich., June 18.—Justice S. Stearns, candidate for governor, gained a signal victory in the Republican caucuses held today in Kent county. He carried every one of twelve wards in this city. In the county Governor Bliss carried thirteen townships and Stearns eleven. Stearns' forces will control the county convention by a large majority.

KING WILL REST UP.
Edward Foregoes Public Engagements to Prepare for Coronation.
London, June 18.—It was officially announced today that in view of the strain of the approaching coronation of King Edward's physicians have recommended his majesty to forego all public engagements for the next few days.

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FATAL SHOOTING AFFRAY.
Two Dead in Oklahoma City as Result of Three-Cornered Battle.
Oklahoma, City Okla. Ter., June 18.—W. T. McMichael, who shot and killed F. W. Johnson, a real estate dealer and a former rough rider yesterday, and who was himself shot, died today of his wounds. E. E. Brown, editor of the Times-Journal, who took part in the shooting and who was released yesterday, was re-arrested today upon the death of McMichael and held without bail. McMichael before he died asserted that Brown had shot him, while a bystander declares that McMichael's wound was from a bullet fired by Johnson.

ALL BOERS HAVE GIVEN UP.
Lord Kitchener Reports Work in Transvaal Completed.
London, June 18.—An official dispatch from General Kitchener reports that the surrender of Boers in the Transvaal has been completed. Lord Kitchener further reports that the South African constabulary is now under the direction of the civil authorities. His dispatch reads: "The surrenders since I last reported have been 915. The Orange River colony will be completed tomorrow. French reports from Cape Colony state that there are only 150 more to come in. I have handed over the South African constabulary to the civil authorities as the necessity for further military operations has ceased."

M'HUGH GIVEN THREE MONTHS.
Nationalist Member of Parliament Jailed for Contempt of Court.
Sligo, Ireland, June 18.—Patrick A. McHugh, Nationalist member of parliament for the North division of Leitrim, and proprietor of the Sligo Champion, who owing to his failure to appear in answer to a summons was arrested June 15, was today committed to jail for three months for contempt of court. McHugh, among a number of members of the United Irish League, is charged with conspiracy and intimidation in connection with the complaint of a tenant of a farm from which a member of the league had been evicted. During his trial for alleged conspiracy he asked the magistrates for their names. The chairman remarked that McHugh was only asking the question to cause an obstruction. Thereupon McHugh called the chairman "a damned liar" and refused to apologize, telling the magistrates he never expressed regrets to sweeps of their kind.

SEVERAL INJURED BY EXPLOSION.
Gasoline Blows Out Plate Glass Window and Flying Pieces Cut Many.
Guthrie, Okla., June 18.—Thirty-one persons were injured tonight by the explosion of a gasoline generator in the New York Hardware company's store. Fire broke out in the rear of the store demanding the attention of two fire companies. While the firemen were fighting the flames, a crowd gathered in the street before the front of the building. Fire ignited the gasoline which exploded blowing out the front of the store into the air making serious wounds where it struck the persons in falling. Archie McWhorter was fatally injured his skull being fractured.

DARK HORSE WINS.
John Mickey Gets Republican Nomination for Governor of Nebraska.
Lincoln, Neb., June 18.—John Mickey, of Polk county, was nominated for governor on the fourth ballot by the Republican state convention tonight. A large crowd packed the auditorium when State Chairman Lindsay called the convention to order this afternoon. The temporary chairman was Deputy Attorney General Norris Brown, who made an extended speech. Permanent organization was effected by the selection of Judge S. P. Davidson of Johnson county as chairman. The first ballot for governor resulted: Black, 202; Dinsmore, 94; Jenson, 109; Mickey, 132; Robertson, 252; Sears, 111; Van-Jusen, 54; Wilson, 146. Scattering, five. Necessary to nominate 537.

Pana, Ill., June 18.—William Lynn, who resides south of Pana, celebrated his 108th birthday today. An anniversary dinner was tendered him, at which 200 guests were present, all old settlers in the vicinity.

His Unique Career Attracts Attention of a Wisconsin Newspaper Man.

Fred Dougherty, for some time a staff correspondent on The Mining Journal, but now with The Evening Wisconsin of Milwaukee, recently gave Peter Fitzpatrick of this city, who retired from railroad work a few weeks ago, the following interesting mention, and with it was a picture of the veteran railroad man:

"P. F. has retired." This abbreviated message was quite sufficient to convey to every employe on the "north end" of the Chicago & North-Western Railway, and indeed to a large proportion of the population of the upper peninsula as well, the information that Peter Fitzpatrick, car dispatcher with headquarters at Ishpeming, being over the age limit and having completed the prescribed number of years of continuous service, has been retired on a pension based on a percentage of the salary he has been receiving for twenty years.

"It was in 1863 that Peter Fitzpatrick began work for the North-Western line as a brakeman, and with the exception of two years spent in the livery business at Marquette he had been in the service of the road ever since.

The advent of the telephone simplified his work somewhat, but subsequent years brought with them vasty increased shipments of ore, and if there was anything about to do, there were even longer hours at the telephone desk.
