



The value of farm implements and machinery is \$761,261,550 and livestock \$3,078,050,041. The total value of farm property is \$20,514,001,838. The value of farm products in 1899 was \$4,739,118,times as many farms as in 1850 and 2 per cent more than in 1890.

A comparison by states indicates the most important states in agriculture Missouri, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania and New York. 

Scarcely any wood work has been used about the building. The walls are of solid brick and the loors are metal sheathed on the inside. All the fixtures will be of metal and the

The building is divided into three main mpartments. At the south end is the ining room, twenty by twenty-eight feet, supplied with tables and benches. In the centre of the building is the hanging room, twenty-eight by fifty hree feet. In the centre will be placed vo sets of clothes racks. Here the men vill change their mining rigs.

At the top of the room, projecting grough the roof, are four large ventilamber is sufficient. There are at pres at about 230 men, working in two hifts, who use the changing room Thus, during working hours, each man ean have a locker of his own.
