

It Will Go Into Commission the First of the Month.

The new Wolverine stamp mill at Traverse Bay will go into commission cents. Aug. 1. On this point there is no further room for doubt, as the coming week will mark the completion of all the changes necessary in shifting from the old mills to the new one, says S. J Beasan in the Hancock Journal, Instead of poor rock, sand will be used in filling up the bins. Next week the railroad grade will be changed when the Mineral Range will provide a full complement of rolling stock for all purposes. The stamp mill proper is in complete readiness, while at the mine the new twenty-drill compressor is ready for service, thus completing the surface equip ment of the Wolverine company practically for all time, as the two active shafts, which are all that will be necessary, are permanently provided for in the matter of operating facilities. The shaft and rock houses are substantial. the mine shops ample, while a sufficient number of dwellings have been erected to accommodate those of the employes who wish to rent them. 

The edifice will be the most expensive nurch in the city. It will be a mode convenience and only first-class ma erial will be used in its construction. e dimensions will be 96x94 feet.

The basement will be divided into sev ral apartments. The intermediate de artment will have a seating capacity of 400 and will be surrounded by eight lass rooms, each 12x13 feet. Each oom will have a seating capacity o All the rooms will be shut off from the intermediate department by liding folding doors, so that the entire sement can be thrown into one room. 'he doors will double up in accordiat sape and, when folded, will take up ery little space. The upper part of ne doors will be glass, to admit light rom the main room.

In the north end of the basement will a kitchen, connected with the interdiate department by means of dou-

nile about \$120,000 of the county's mon-<del>᠘</del>^^^^^^^ having been expended in this work. his is not a fair estimate, however, f the cost of the roads now being constructed, as in the early history of our road making the results were not commensurate with the expense, owing to perfect equipment. The county now has \$12,000 in road making machinery, consisting of an Austin Stone crusher, a twenty horse power gasoline engine, tools, etc., and the work is done at a

minimum expense. Good roads are gold mines, but this was not always accepted as an axiom, and some years ago it took much argument to get the people to consent, and then only reluctantly, to what appeared to be an extravagant expenditure of public funds. To say nothing of the onsequent appreciation in the value of farm lands and the increased travel to and fro from the towns, statistics not now available show that good roads pay for themselves on an average every four years, in the saving in cost to the farmer of hauling his produce to market.

The extension of our county built roads has had one marked influence. The townships all over in the county have felt the force of a good example, and the improvement in township roads within the past few years is very conspicuous. Last week the county road commissioners invited the county board of su-

pervisors to make a tour of inspection. This was done for the purpose of famtelligently pass upon the appropria tions that will be asked for next fall.
