MINER MEETS DEATH.

John W. Kahma Was Killed Yesterday Morning at Section 16 Mine.

John W. Kahma, a Finnish miner employed at the Lake Superior Iron company's Section 16 mine, was killed yesterday morning about 10 o'clock. Kahma was standing on a ladder bearing ground, when suddenly a large mass came down on him. The ladder broke and he was partially buried beneath the ore. His skull was badly crushed and he was dead before rescuers reached him.

The Council Transacted Routine Business Wednesday Evening.

The city council held a quiet meeting Wednesday night. A petition, signed by ten people of the sixth ward was read, asking the city to pay half the expense of laying a sidewalk on Third street, near Park, the reason being that the sidewalk is mostly used by people going to and from the cemetery. The petition was referred to the committee on streets and bridges.

It was decided to allow not more than \$100 for paying the expenses of sending the chief of the fire department to Detroit during the firemen's convention to be held there in October. Alderman Barnett spoke in favor of an appropriation to pay the salary of a second assistant librarian, to make a subject catalogue for the library. It was decided to allow \$25 or \$30 a month for that purpose.

The committee on claims and accounts reported favorably on bills amounting to \$5,546.79. The estimate of the appropriations and expenses for the coming year was not ready and the council adjourned to meet again Sept. 25.

FELL DEAD.

Anna W. Kakkuri, a Finnish woman, fell dead while working at her home on Barn street yesterday. She is survived by her husband, who is a miner, and two children, one two years, and the other ten months. She was twenty-three years of age. The funeral will be held Saturday from the Finnish Lutheran church. Rev. Statius of Negaunee will officiate.
