

Since that time owing to decreased exports and lighter home deliveries, it is estimated that additional stocks to the extent of 5,000








Houston's Copper Circular.

Messrs. D. Houston & Co. say in their September copper circular: "There is 10 doubt that the declining tendency of the market has induced consumers to continue the waiting policy, but a renewal of activity may be expected the moment definite signs manifest that the market has touched bottom. Copper is in a peculiar position at present. Con sumption in this country continues to be normous, and at the active industrial centers across the Atlantic is also heavy as the latest statistics show, but for some reason or other the market is not getting the measure of benefit it ought to reap from the ability of the world to consume the metal at the rate it is now being absorbed. With the aggregate copper consumption in the United States England, France and Germany estimated at a very much larger total this year than last year, the market is neverthe less in anything but a satisfactory state and in seeking for a solution of this condition of affairs it must be at least
