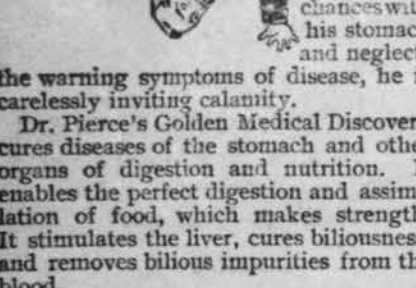


ACCIDENTAL?

COPPER MINING.

VIEW OF THE COPPER SITUATION. A correspondent who signs himself "Cupiferous" writes the Boston Transcript as follows concerning the copper situation:

Many opinions and estimates on copper have recently been advanced by both experts and non-experts, but after each has had his say and the several statements have been pondered, criticized and digested, it can safely be said that copper is in tremendous demand, and that the consumption of it is at flood tide.

A London cable showing a decrease in the last two weeks of 2,401 tons in the foreign visible supply of copper is taken to indicate some improvement in the statistical position of the metal. The foreign supply on April 1 was 28,124 tons. It has been steadily declining until on Sept. 15 it stood at 17,874 tons, the lowest for many months.

The Northern Construction company erected another temporary shed on the site of the new court house yesterday. It is the third that has been built since the company commenced work on the grounds.

People who have tried their luck trolling north of Presque Isle during the past few days have met with notable success. The season is fairly in swing, and good catches will reward the fishermen from now on until the trout refuse to take the spoon. Frank Ward landed a twenty pound fish yesterday.

W. J. Stevens, who has been day clerk at the Hotel Clifton for some time past, has resigned his position to take a place on the road as representative of the National Biscuit company. He will have a territory in the northern part of lower Michigan and will travel out of Milwaukee. Mr. Stevens left yesterday morning.

The Marquette & Southeastern system will give an excursion from Ishpeming, Negaunee, Marquette, and points down the line, to Munising tomorrow. The fare from Marquette, Ishpeming and Negaunee will be \$1 and the leaving time 8; 8:10 and 9:05 a. m., respectively. Returning, the special train will leave Munising at 6 p. m.

Oliver Morrison left yesterday morning, with a crew of twenty men, for Pine River, where he will put in a lumber camp for the Hebardis of Pequauning. Mr. Morrison has to build a new set of camps, work on which will start immediately. The present crew will be busy with this work for some time. When the camps are equipped and everything is in readiness for a start in the woods,

the force will be largely increased. In the neighborhood of sixty men will be employed when work is in full swing. The camp has a big season's cut ahead of it.

The school board met Thursday. It ordered a large bill of supplies for the new high school, including material and furnishings for the laboratory, various equipment needed about the new building, and 100 desks for the assembly room. Some of the necessary desks are already at hand and there will be a sufficient number when those included in the newest order are received.

The last of the South Shore D. & C. excursions to Buffalo departed this morning for St. Ignace, where the passengers will take the D. & C. steamer. The series of cheap excursions to Buffalo this year has been largely patronized and highly successful. The party which sailed on the "City of Alpena on the morning of the 17th numbered 225 people. They were landed in Detroit at 10:15 Thursday morning, after a delightful trip.

The Homesteaders' association is about to start work on the improvement of the Yellow Dog swamp road, so-called, running approximately from Sauk's Head to the Yellow Dog river. Between these points, for most of the distance of about two and a half miles, the road is nothing more than a mud hole in which wagons drag along in dirt and water, sometimes up to their axles. The homesteaders, by the expenditure of considerable money and by hard work hope to put the road in serviceable condition. When this work is accomplished, there is plenty of room for further improvements at other points. It is said that a number of bridges north of the Yellow Dog will be repaired or replaced.

The formation of an upper peninsula base ball league is again causing considerable comment at the Soo, where several enthusiasts have manifested their willingness to put their money into a league stock company, always providing that other cities can be interested in the scheme. The Soo News-Record says: "Manager Ryan, of the Leaders, will probably take the initiative in the matter. His idea is to form a circuit of six cities, taking in besides the Soo, Manistique, Escanaba, Ishpeming-Negaunee, Marquette and either Munising or Newberry. It is believed the people of the cities named would support a league organization and that it would prove a money-maker. Correspondence will at once be entered into with the ball players of the towns named and if the plan meets with favor a meeting will be called and an organization effected during the coming winter so as to be ready for play as soon as the season opens next spring."
