MUCH LAWLESSNESS AND GROW-ING DISORDERS EVERYWHERE.

D. Murray's, Militia Now Is Camped in Five Counties, but the Rioting Continues and Still More Soldiers Are Likely to Be Ordered Out.

> Philadelphia, Sept. 24.—Of the ten anhracite coal-producing counties of Pennsylvania, state troops are tonight camped in five. Despite the presence of troops, rioting and general lawlessness continue in the entire hard coal territory. If the disorder contines, Governor Stone will be compelled to call out adlitional soldiers.

While there has been no big general riot, the disturbances have been of such serious nature as to cause the authorities much apprehension. Every effort is being made by the sheriffs of the counties affected and the troops to prevent the disturbances from growing to such an extent as to cause bloodshed. Reports are coming in from every section of non-union men and others being either shot or clubbed. Houses of workmen have been burned or dynamited, and attempts have been made to hold up coal trains or to derail them. Coal is being shipped from many
