Charges of Bribery by Miners.

Scranton, Pa., Sept. 26.—In a statenent today, District President Nichols accuses Michael Grimes, an ex-mine foreman, of being "at the head of a movement, inaugurated by the coal companies, to bribe a number of mine workers' locals for \$2,500 each to vote to return to work." Grimes denies the statement and the coal companies also say it is not true.

CHARGES MADE BY MITCHELL. Says Professional Criminals Are Acting as Coal and Iron Police.

Philadelphia, Sept. 26.—President Mitchell took up at length the charges about his cottage. of lawlessness on the part of the miners in a speech tonight under anspices of the South Philadelphia Business Men's league. He made the counter charge that the operators are guilty of lawessness in the employment of professional criminals as ecal and iron policemen. Mitchell said, in part:

Washington, Sept. 26.-An instance of ravery and devotion to duty on the part of an army nurse has been reported to the war department by Major General Chaffee, as follows:

"Alice Kemmer, of the army nurse orps, having been granted leave of abvoluntarily relinquished the same and took upon herself the care of two mallpox patients in an isolation hospital. One of the patients was the wife f an officer, the other an enlisted man. Miss Kemmer had never had the disease. nevertheless she fearlessly entered upon her self-imposed task and through April and May devoted herself to the care of he patients, living in the room with the flicer's wife, the enlisted man being in an adjoining room. 


