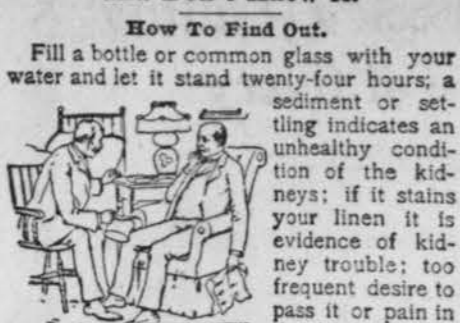

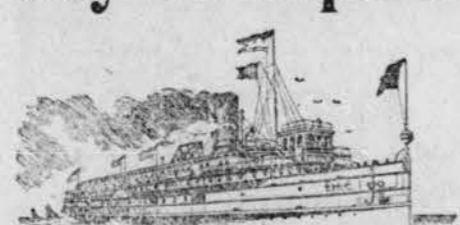

**HOME TEAM WON**

**BESSEMER DEFEATED IN GRIDIRON CONTEST SATURDAY.**

**SCORE TWENTY-TWO TO NONE**

**LARGEST CROWD OF THE SEASON SAW THE GAME.**

**Marquette Eleven Played in Better Form Than Usual, but Was Guilty of Much Fumbling—Defense the Visitors' Weak Point.**

About four hundred persons witnessed the Marquette high school team take the Bessemer eleven into camp on the local gridiron Saturday afternoon to the tune of 22 to 0. The day was ideal for football and this together with the fact there were still many visitors in the city who had been attracted to the educational association convention, brought out the largest crowd of the season.

**Story of the Game.**

Time was called at 2:30 o'clock sharp. Lewis, for Marquette, won the toss and chose the west goal. Bessemer kicked to Marquette. Graunstadt got under the ball and advanced it ten yards. Brown, Erickson and Rogers were used successfully and, after a little preliminary skirmishing, Erickson broke away from the bunch for a twenty-yard run and a touchdown. Lewis failed to kick goal. Time, 11:50.

On the third kickoff Graunstadt once more secured the ball, but was downed in his tracks. In the next series of plays, Rogers made five yards, Kraft ten and Erickson ten, bringing the ball to Bessemer's two-yard line. Here Marquette fumbled, was pushed back for three yards and, failing to make the requisite five yards, lost the ball. Bessemer kicked and, on a fumble, made twenty-five yards on the play. Marquette was penalized five yards. In the next two plays, Bessemer was pushed back for loss and forced to kick. The ball rolled out of bounds and was given to Marquette. Erickson skirted the end for fifteen

yards, but on Marquette's thirty-yard line the ball was fumbled and Osborne, of Bessemer, fell on it. Bessemer in turn, fumbled and time for the first half was called with the pigskin in Marquette's possession and on her forty-yard line. The half ended with the score 11 to 0.

**Second Half.**

Time in the second half was called at 3:30. Bessemer kicked to Marquette and secured the ball on a fumble. She made five yards and then, being forced back three, the ball was given to Marquette. The locals were penalized five yards on an offside play. Rogers was sent through the line for fifteen yards, but was called back on an offside play. In the next three plays Marquette made her requisite ten yards and then, using Erickson for six yards, advanced the ball to Bessemer's five-yard line. Here Bessemer took a brace and held Marquette for two downs. On the third down, however, Rogers broke through the line and crossed the goal for a touchdown. Lewis failed to kick goal. Time of play, 4:39.

Following the touchdown a dispute arose as to the condition of the ball, but after ten minutes' useless discussion play was resumed. Bessemer kicked to Graunstadt, who advanced the ball five yards. Marquette was again penalized five yards on offside play. The team, however, made the ten yards and Erickson scored fifteen more, but on a fumble by Rogers the ball was secured by Knight, of Bessemer. Bessemer advanced ten yards on the first down and repeated the trick once more, bringing the ball to Marquette's thirty-yard line. Fumbling then again gave Marquette the ball. A play around the end netted ten yards on the first down, and the revolving wedge gained ten more. Rogers made ten yards through the line, Ross a like number, Erickson fifteen and finally Kraft plunged over the line for the fourth and last touchdown. Lewis kicked goal. Time, 19:14.

In the next few downs, Martin, of Bessemer, got away for fifteen yards, and again for seven. Bessemer then had her only chance to score. There were still two minutes to play and the ball was on Marquette's five-yard line. The visitors, however, were held for downs, and the ball was passed to Marquette. Rogers, Graunstadt, and Brown footed up ten yards and time was called with the ball in Marquette's possession and on her fifteen-yard line.

**Visitors Lacking in Defense.**

Bessemer's line was weak, although equal in weight to Marquette, each team averaging 135 pounds per man. The visitors seemed lacking in defensive practice, but made respectable gains whenever they had the ball. The Marquette men showed a great tendency to fumble and were inclined to lose their heads at critical points in the game. However, the boys showed up quite well in team work and probably played in better form than at any game this season. For Bessemer, Martin and Osborne were the stars. Erickson, Rogers, and Lewis showed up best for Marquette, though Marquette's style of play demands team rather than individual work and hence does not give her players much chance for single effort. The last half dragged out for almost

an hour. A wire fence kept the spectators off the field and, as a result, the gridiron was clear of all save players and officials. The line-up of the teams was as follows:

Marquette—Erickson, left end; Graunstadt, left tackle; Osgood, left guard; Mitchell, center; Williams, right guard; Kraft, right tackle; Brown, right end; Lewis, captain, quarter; Whitman, right half; Rogers, left half; Ross, fullback. Bessemer—Kulaszwitz, left end; Bensko, left tackle; Sinecock, left guard; Kallender, center; Byrne, right guard; Ramquist, right tackle; Knight, right end; Jeffry, quarter; Martin, right half; Osborne, captain, left half; Bavden, fullback.

**MARQUETTE-NEGAUNEE LINE.**

Said Construction Work on Proposed Trolley Road Will Start Next Spring.

It is reported that the developments of the last few weeks practically assure the construction of the proposed electric line between this city and Negaunee, and that the actual work of linking the two cities by means of the trolley road will be inaugurated early next spring.

The line, it is said, will be financed by Toledo capitalists. D. W. Stem, the Cleveland man who is in this section as the representative of the syndicate, has made good progress in securing the right-of-way; in fact, it is reported that he has had to close deals with two or three parties—one a Marquette property owner—in order to complete the route. But little definite information can be obtained as yet concerning the plans of the promoters, but it is understood to be the intention of the syndicate to build a line closely patterned after that in operation in the copper country, between Houghton and Calumet. The snow problem, the chief obstacle to the successful operation of interurban electric roads in this northern country, has been solved in copperland, and for that reason, it is said, the elevated grades and other features of the construction of the Houghton-Calumet line are to be followed here.

It is not divulged whether the proposed line will, if built, be operated in conjunction with the local street railroads in this city and Negaunee, but it is presumed that such will be the case. It is the general opinion here that a road such as proposed would pay.

**STATUE TO PETER WHITE.**

Early Steps Likely to Be Taken on Don M. Dickinson's Suggestion.

The suggestion of Hon. Don M. Dickinson, made in his address Friday at the dedication of the new building at the Normal, that a large bronze statue of Peter White be erected at Presque Isle, has been extremely well received by Marquette people generally. It is the plan of the former postmaster general that the funds necessary to procure the monument be raised by popular subscription, and he indicated his desire of subscribing liberally to the project.

A number of leading citizens interviewed Saturday expressed great pleasure that it was proposed to this honor Mr. White, and pledged their hearty cooperation in the plan. It was suggested by several that a monument association be formed, and that a systematic effort be made to reach the many hundreds who it is known would like to contribute. It is likely that steps will be taken as an early date to launch the project. A statute to cost several thousand dollars is proposed.

**Upper Peninsula's First Citizen.**

The Detroit Free Press, in its issue of Friday, paid this tribute to Mr. White: "At Marquette today the state board of education and the faculty of the Northern State Normal school will celebrate the birthday of the Hon. Peter White by dedicating the Peter White Hall of Science. That is a good name for a building to receive at the time of its dedication, and it is a good name for any building to keep. No man has done more for the general development of the northern peninsula than has the Hon. Peter White. It is well that boards of education and faculties have begun to recognize the worth of his various services, and to honor one of the best friends that man or the northern peninsula ever had."
