

PORTAGE LAKE CANAL TRAFFIC. Interesting Data for Last Month Issued from U. S. Engineers' Office.

Although October is usually counted le through the Portage Lake ship canals, there was a decided falling off in the number of vessels passing through, But, although the number of boats was smaller, the total tonnage was larger in proportion than in September, and the total cargo showed a big increase, especially in the upbound vessels. 
