Soon after the men went down to work they placed the powder where i would absorb some heat. It is assume that it got too close to the fire, causing the explosion. There were no other miners working in that particular part of the level, but most of the men in the mine heard the report and many rushed to the rescue of the entombed

Before entering the level some of the nen discovered that Tony Warala, an Italian, who was employed at timber work, had been overcome with the noke. He was not in the drift where explosion occurred, but it appear could not escape the smoke as i ssed through the workings. Waral was speedily removed to surface and ater to the hospital. Later it was reorted that he was all right, and would be around again in a day or two.

Nearly two hours passed before the

workmen could enter the level. When the rescuers reached the sub-level they found the lifeless bodies of the victims Both were removed to the Finnish Un ertaking rooms on First street.

At the mine both victims went by the young wife, who joined him here about vo months ago. They were married me three years ago, before he left Finland for this country. His age was twenty-six years. He held membership in the local Finnish Temperance

Leppamaki was single and about twenty-six years of age. He was a member of the Finnish tent of the Maccabees and he was also a member of the Uniform Rank of that order. He was a very popular young man and had many friends among his people. About a year ago he was injured in the mine and was confined to the hospital for three weeks.

The funerals of the victims will be held tomorrow afternoon, both at the same time, from the Finnish Lutheran church. The Temperance society will conduct the Pantti obsequies and the Maccabees will have charge of the Lepamaki funeral
