The reply of Assistant Commissioner Richards, of the interior department at Washington, to the petition of a certain sect of the Donkhorists to be allowed to settle on public lands in the United States, where they would be free from molestation by the authorities and free to "obey God's laws rather than man's," is a model of diplomatic smoothness and common sense.

Not only did its sturdy team win a victory, well earned, even if not decisive, but the management of the game and the people of the city showed that they were true sportsmen by providing a fair field and no favor. There was nothing in connection with the contest that anyone could take exception to.

THE NEW FUEL AT SEA. As might be expected, American steamships are leading the way in the use of oil as a fuel on the high seas. Some time ago the new fuel was successfully employed by the one American transatlantic line on its moderate-speed steamers.

The advantage of oil over coal as indicated by our experience is that 20 per cent more power can be obtained from the same boiler. Nor is this the only advantage of oil as fuel on steamships. It uses means an important saving in shipboard labor. Firemen and coal passers on American steamers in foreign commerce are paid wages fixed by the general standard on shore in America and in the absolutely protected coastwise trade. That is, they receive substantially twice as much money as is given to men who do the same work on foreign steamships.

The engineers of the Nevada found, on their return trip, when they were ordered to run at a speed of only 10 knots as an experiment, that they saved only 191 barrels of oil, though they lost a day's time. The conclusion is, therefore, that it is more economical to use the maximum power of the boilers and engines with oil as a fuel than it is to reduce the speed quite contrary to the practice with coal.

It is the belief of the engineers of the American-Hawaiian Company that oil is even better adapted as a fuel for fast passenger ships than it is for freighters. They predict that oil will soon be used exclusively to heat the boilers of the Atlantic greyhounds. So thoroughly convinced are these American steamship managers of the superiority of oil over coal that they are arranging for an oil storage plant at St. Thomas, in the West Indies, where their long-voyage ships may stop for fuel bound from New York to San Francisco. The oil would be brought to St. Thomas direct from the Texas oil fields.

It is authoritatively stated that the Pennsylvania road will advance its freight rates on the first of the coming January, and last week the western lines, represented at a meeting in Chicago, agreed to advance from seven to nine cents the rate on a hundred pounds of flour and grain from the Missouri to the Mississippi. Last week also the Central Freight association, comprising all roads running east from Chicago and St. Louis, met to consider an increase of fourteen per cent on the same commodities between Mississippi points and the Atlantic seaboard.

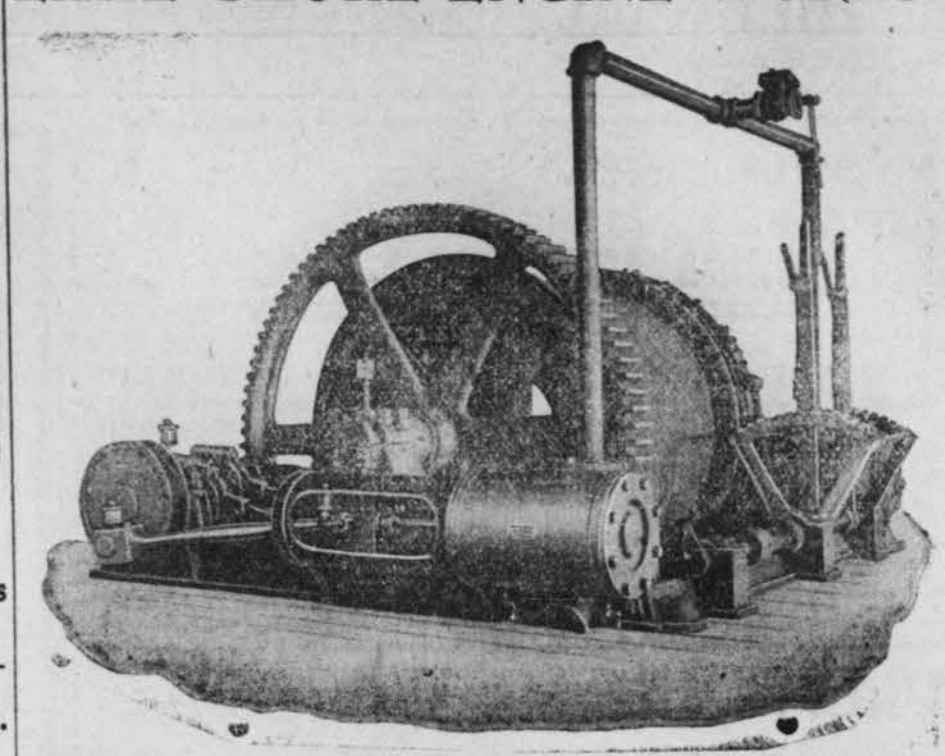

LONG SEASON PROBABLE.

Prospects Favor a Late Closing of Navigation.

According to Marquette marine men and the captains that are making this port, the prospects for an unusually late close of the season of navigation are unusually good. November, for the past eight days, has proved a dream of fair weather, and the month as a whole has been to date much fairer than the average. The prospects for a continuance of these mild conditions seem favorable.

Most of the mines are still shipping and the boats are making good despatch. It looks at present as if the insurance companies would stop taking risks at the usual time, but, of course, those boats which do not carry hull insurance will not be affected. A few years ago there were not many boats that sailed without hull insurance, but there are many now. The Pittsburgh Steamship fleet of more than 100 boats, the Davidson fleet and the wooden Gilchrist boats are included in this class. It is probable that many vessels will continue running long after the expiration of their insurance if the ice conditions permit.

Hull insurance expires on lake boats at noon Dec. 5, but all vessels that get between the piers on their outward voyage by noon of that date are insured until they reach their destination. There are but two exceptions to the insurance rule. The steamers Rochester and New York, of the Union Transit line, are insured until Dec. 12, one week later than other boats. It is not known how this arrangement was secured, but it was through a contract extending over a period of years.

IS TWO THIRDS OVER

LITTLE TIME IN WHICH TO KILL THE FURTIVE DEER.

SLAUGHTER UNUSUALLY LIGHT

BUT NUMBER OF HUNTERS HAS BEEN GREATER THAN EVER.

Lower Michigan Nimrods Have Shared in the Ill Luck—Shipments to Southern Michigan Very Small.

The deer season is over two-thirds gone, and it behooves hunters who have not yet been successful in getting their annual trophy of the chase to hasten to the woods. Counting today, there are but six days left in which the game may be legally killed. Sunday is the last day of the season. Then there will be a day or two during which carcasses will be brought in from the woods, a few last venison steaks and roasts, and the great sport of the north country will be off for another twelve months.

The season of 1902, it is now apparent, will go on record as being one of the hardest for the hunters in the late history of the deer stalking sport on this peninsula. This being true, the slaughter has been much lighter than the average. This means that there will be an abundance of game next year and that next summer the outlying homesteaders will have to mount guard over their cabbage and potato patches and growing crops or the deer will eat them out of house and home.

This tale of light slaughter is no fable, but a cold, hard fact. There is a rare agreement of testimony in regard to it. All hunters say that this has been an unusually hard season in which to get a deer, and many who have never failed to get at least one buck or doe have this year come home from their annual hunt empty handed. The proportion of the hunters who have exhausted all their license tags is unusually small, and it is said that the majority of those who paid their seventy-five cents, or dollar, as the case might be, for the season's clerk or his deputies could return their licenses untouched and get their money back, if the law provided for such a proceeding.

Many Hunters Out.

If this has been one of the lightest seasons on record in point of killing of deer, it has likewise been one of the heaviest in point of number of hunters. From all the counties in the game country come reports of unusually heavy sales of licenses. County Clerk Ross up to yesterday had disposed of some 1,735, compared with 1,530 last year, a very material gain. Dealers report that the sales of guns and ammunition have been rather above the average.

There was little diminution in the number of lower Michigan hunters who sought the north country this year, although the action of the railroads in regard to excess baggage charges, the transportation of game, etc., was calculated to make the trip more expensive. Either the grangers were unusually flush, or their zest for deer hunting made them careless of expense, for they came north in about the usual numbers. However, they, too, have been tripped up in their hunting by the unfavorable weather conditions and reports from the straits, where it is possible to keep tabs on the shipments of venison to the lower part of the state, indicate that the lower has been a great deal of a disappointment to them. Where in former years anywhere from a hundred to two hundred carcasses have gone through daily the number this year has been restricted to thirty or forty.

Yesterday's snow undoubtedly brought cheer to the men in the woods and hope to the hearts of those who have to date hunted unsuccessfully. It, while small in quantity, will be of material assistance in tracking game, and if it is added to other falls within the next day or two it is probable that the killing in the rag end of the season will be heavier than at any other time. The lack of snow has been the chief handicap of the hunters. It has made it hard to get about noiselessly, and also to track the game. It has also furthered the escape, often to death in some trackless swamp, of wounded deer. Second to the lack of snow, the abominably wet weather of the first week of the open season was the important factor in thwarting the hunters.

NO MORE CARDS.

And the Pupils of the High School Rejoiceth.

Last week Superintendent Thompson made an announcement which was received with considerable favor by the pupils of the high school. He stated that hereafter the practice of giving out cards containing the monthly standings of the individual pupils would be given up. The marks will be kept in a record book, and the innovation entails no change in the manner of keeping track of the school work. In case any pupil falls below seventy-five, the passing mark, his parents or guardians will be notified of the circumstance, but in case his work is satisfactory no attention will be called to it. In every instance where there is anything special which should be called to the attention of the pupils' elders this will be done. The innovation is popular among the pupils, who have never looked with particular favor on the old card system. It is expected to work in a very satisfactory manner.

RATES FOR ANN ARBOR.

If Party of Fifty is Formed, They Will Be Arranged.

General Passenger Agent George W. Hibbard of the South Shore informs The Mining Journal that if a party of fifty upper peninsula people can be formed his road will give its members a most advantageous rate to Ann Arbor, where the western football championship will be decided Thanksgiving day in a battle royal between the Michigan and Minnesota teams. Following will be the round-trip rates, if the party is formed: Soo, \$11; Newberry, \$11.50; Munising Junction, \$12; Marquette, \$12.50; Negaunee, \$13; Ishpeming, \$13; Houghton, \$13; Hancock, \$15; Calumet \$15.50, and Lake L'Annis, \$15.50.

Marquette people who are desirous of taking advantage of this proposition are requested to notify C. E. Wright, city ticket agent, before 6 p. m. today. There has been little discussion of a trip to Ann Arbor, pending the announcement of the railroad rates. It will be seen that a good rate is offered. It is believed that the party of fifty will be made up, as interest in the game is intense north of the straits.

JACKS' HAVE UNION

WOODSMEN HAVE AT LAST PERFECTED AN ORGANIZATION.

FIRST LODGE AT THE SOO

IT WILL BE EXTENDED ALL OVER MICHIGAN AND ONTARIO.

New Order Is Designed to Protect the Men and Elevate Their Trade from Its Present Level—The Officers.

Although the woodsmen are one of the most important classes of labor in the great northwest, through all the years of their pioneering work in opening up this great country for the farmer, miner and urban population they have never been organized, and it is only now that they are being looked upon together in some organization for their mutual advantage has been taken.

The Brotherhood of Woodsmen has been instituted at the Soo, and it is planned to extend it through the entire upper peninsula and Ontario. M. Fraser of the Soo is president, and the secretary is David McNew of the same place, with whom any parties wishing to join the Soo lodge or to form lodges in other parts of the upper peninsula should communicate.

The president's statement in connection with the new order contains full information concerning its purposes and aims. It follows: For the present the Brotherhood of Woodsmen offers no pecuniary benefit, but many and important benefits will be derived from membership therein, especially by those who follow lumbering in the woods or in the mills. The Brotherhood was organized primarily to unite the woodsmen and kindred workers, to promote their general welfare, to protect and advance their interests, social, moral and intellectual. In many cases hitherto the lumbermen have not had a fair show. If they had had, their condition today would be much better. As it is, many who once followed lumbering have risen above their surroundings, and in spite of the severest obstacles, are today the leading exponents of law and order throughout the country. In fact, some of the most energetic men in our communities today once belonged to the much looked down upon lumbering class.

Advantages of the Brotherhood.

There is nothing more conducive to harmonious relations between employer and employe than a fair understanding between man and man. This has not been the case, unfortunately, in too many instances, with the result that the employe always got the worst end of the stick. The reason is not far to seek. He stood alone, had nothing and nobody to back him. The Brotherhood of Woodsmen will endeavor to do away with this. By rearranging the schedule of wages, a man will know when he is hired what he is to get. Under this rule, if he is hired for \$30 a month and found not to be worth that price, the employe will be bound to let him know that fact at the end of a few days, or let him go. If nothing is said and the man is kept on for three or four months, he certainly will be considered entitled to the wages at which he was hired. By this means the Brotherhood will be the means not only of securing a better class of men for the woods and the mills, but also of making better men out of the present class. Strikes are not anticipated, as no misunderstanding should arise which cannot be properly adjusted by cool, careful consideration and deliberation. Members of the Brotherhood feeling themselves aggrieved can always have their grievance promptly looked after by the grand lodge, which will take the necessary steps for legal redress when necessary without any further expense to the aggrieved member. Provisions are made to look after sick and disabled brothers, providing hospital or medical treatment, and, in case of death, where necessary, a decent

burial. The conditions of the men in camp life will also be properly looked after, as well as the manner in which settlement should be made with them, in order that they may not have to lie around for days before securing their hard-earned money.

The legislative department of the Brotherhood will be an important feature and should render to the organization the most effective service by fully supporting all non-partisan measures introduced that may affect in any way the progress of labor organization and by using all possible influence against any measures detrimental to the interests of labor in general.

COPEPERS MORE ACTIVE.

Copper Range Was the Leader in the Boston Market Yesterday.

Paine, Webber & Co. said of the Boston market: "Coppers were more active today, and, on the whole, firmer in tone. There were good rallies in a few stocks, with Copper Range the leader in point of strength. New York reports a better demand from consumers for the metal. The outlook is that there will be more active trading in coppers; that they will be a buy on reactions and a sale on rallies, and that they will gradually work higher. The New York market continues to approve of specialties. It is active and offers a good opportunity to traders who are quick enough to sell and take profits on the rallies."

Hayden, Stone & Co. said: "There was a good deal of manipulation in the market today. Copper Range sold off to 35 1/2, and was then put up to 35 3/4. There was a better market in Ironarago, Quincy, Calumet, and, in fact, many coppers were being bought in a quiet way."

Chicago Shows Improvement.

W. H. Laidley said of the Chicago market:

"Although confronted with somewhat heavier receipts, rather good weather and unresponsive cables, wheat opened at about Saturday's close, to a shade higher, and continued firm until the visible supply statement showed an increase of over three and a half millions, a great deal more than was put up to 35 1/2. The market broke off, closing 3/4 under Saturday. The northwest receipts were considerably heavier. The cash demand here, and at both Duluth and Minneapolis continues good. New York reported twenty boatloads for export. The market has had a natural reaction, and should be bought upon any further break."

"Corn opened slightly above Saturday's prices, and, while the December option continued to show the same weakness it has demonstrated of late, the May held strong, at about Saturday's close, until near the end of the session, when it also felt the effects of continued pressure and closed slightly below Saturday. The receipts were heavier and the estimates very much so. We still believe in the long side."

"Oats were the strongest feature of the market today, opening higher and continuing to advance, closing 1/2 above Saturday. The stocks in Chicago were extremely small, and the cash demand in excess of the supply. Oats have been sold so freely that a big short interest has been created, and we expect to see them three or four cents higher. Provisions opened strong and higher, although the receipts were somewhat in excess of the estimates. Late in the session the market eased off in sympathy with the grain, but closed at a good advance over Saturday. The cash demand is good, and there is also a big short interest in the provision market. Consequently we look for higher prices, and advise purchases upon every break."

An Up and Down Market.

Walker said of the New York market: "The market opened steady and later developed some strength, but the buying was not very aggressive, except in some of the specialties. During the middle of the day the market was very dull, but, in the afternoon, it developed weakness. There was quite heavy selling of stocks and prices broke sharply. Traders found a great many stop orders. There was no news of importance, and the market closed weak and with a good deal of pressure. We look for an up and down market for some time to come."
