CHICAGO FIRM CHOSEN TO PLAN THE NEW LIBRARY.

BEDFORD STONE TO BE USED

IT IS AN INDIANA LIMESTONE OF LIGHT COLOR.

Architects Have Had Much Experience in This Work, Having Planned Many Carnegie Libraries.

The trustees yesterday afternoon named Patton & Miller of Chicago as the architects for the new Peter White library, to be erected next summer at the corner of Front and Ridge streets.

The following resolution was adopted, without dissent: "Resolved, That the new library be constructed of Bedford stone."

Patton & Miller are a well-known firm who have been very successful in library architecture, this, in fact, being one of their specialties.

The Bedford stone, mentioned in the foregoing resolution, is a light limestone, quarried at Bedford, Indiana.

Patton & Miller will be informed at once that they have been designated as the architects, and they will have a representative here next week.

It will require six weeks at least to get the plans, but it is hoped that they will be finished in that time.

It is definitely settled that the board will build next summer. As has been stated in The Mining Journal, the old Watson dwelling on the south lot of the site has been disposed of.
