Pro and con, con and pro, are bandied the arguments of the vivisectionist and the anti-vivisectionist, of the vaccinationist and the anti-vaccinationist, until the public, to be truthful about it, is somewhat weary of it all. Vaccination is practiced because it prevents smallpox and because it is made compulsory by law. Vivisection is one of those terrible things that, if a necessity, should be kept out of the public view and, if not, should be prevented. Probably the conscientious surgeon, with a love of his kind implanted in his heart, would practice vivisection with the highest and purest motives and obtain from his researches the very best results. The physician or scientist who would needlessly torture a brute is too nearly the level of his victim ever to be of use to mankind, Doubtless, while mankind endures there will be those who insist upon vivisection as a necessity in research and those who contend that its practice should be punished as criminal.

The city of Ann Arbor has presented the regents of the state university with a seven-acre tract, in convenient neighborhood to the campus, to be used for a botanical garden and arboretum. It is specified that no buildings be erected on the tract, but otherwise the regents will have complete control of the land. The seven acres compare favorably, bota in extent and character, with the sites of the famous European botanical gardens, and in time the state university should boast thereon one of the most complete and variegated gardens to be found in the country, and certainly the finest in the state. The site offers exceptional advantages, both for the growta of aquatic and land plants, ar ranged so as to exhibit them, as wel as other biological groups, in their nat ural surroundings. Space will be avail able for seedlings and economic trees and shrubs, and it will also be possible to cultivate material for investigative pur poses. The new garden will prove great ornament and aid to the univer sity, and the regents will doubtless avai themselves of the possibilities of Ani Arbor's gift without loss of time.




