Since Nov. 15 the Michigan mine has shipped about 25,000 pounds of mass copper to the smelters.

VESSELMEN HAVE MADE LITTLE MONEY THIS SEASON.

TRAFFIC LESS AND EXPENSES MORE

GRAIN MOVEMENT LIGHT AND COAL SHIPMENTS MEAGRE.

WAR NOT REVISITED

ENGLAND'S COURSE IN VENEZUELA UNPOPULAR AT HOME.

TAXPAYER FEARFUL OF THE COST

LITTLE TO GAIN AND RETREAT WOULD BE WELCOMED.

Suspicion Britain Is Being Used as Pawn by Germany, Which Alone Will Profit and Which Is Determined to Teach a Lesson.

London, Dec. 14.—The British people would be regarded as idiotic a month ago, the suggestion that within that time they would be engaged in another war, with Germany as an ally. Yet they find themselves in just that position now in Venezuela.

Consequently the attack on Venezuela is not popular. Besides, there is a widespread impression that the British squadron in Venezuelan waters is doing Germany's work, and that, apart from the payment of the indemnity, Germany would profit far more than England by the successful outcome of the venture.

Therefore, having undertaken the movement against Castro, Germany must carry it through and this "saver her face," as the Chinese say, in South America. The Germans will, if need be, carry on the struggle, even if England withdraws, and the Venezuelans on the other hand, will fight the Germans alone fully as readily as they would fight England and Germany together.

BITTNER HARD HIT FIRE CAUSES HIM FROM \$10,000 TO \$12,000 LOSS.

Building and heavy stock. FIREMEN HAD HARD WORK SAVING SECOND STRUCTURE. Fire's Origin Was Likely Spontaneous Combustion-Others Were Slight Losers by the Flames.

H. E. Bittner was hard hit yesterday morning in the severest fire that has occurred in Marquette in many months. Flames destroyed the building on South Third street devoted to his vehicle, wagon, harness and farm implement business.

When questioned by a Mining Journal representative last evening, Mr. Bittner said that he had not had time to figure out his loss exactly, but he roughly estimated that it would run between \$10,000 and \$12,000. He estimates that his stock was worth from \$6,000 to \$8,000 and the building represented an investment of about \$4,000.

Other sufferers from the fire were William Winters, William Fassbender and Mrs. Mangum, the two latter occupying the upstairs suites of dwelling rooms in the building adjoining on the south.

Alarm at 9:15 a. m. The alarm was turned in at 9:15 o'clock, and when the firemen reached the scene the flames were already firmly seated. It required but a few minutes to show that the building was doomed.

Large Crowd Looked On. The fire was witnessed by large crowds, which filled the adjoining streets. It occurred just at the right time to catch many people returning from and going to St. Peter's cathedral.

The misguided zeal of the men and boys who applied themselves to saving Mrs. Mangum's and William Fassbender's household goods caused much lament and, at the same time, regret, as much unnecessary damage was wrought.

The department did very efficient work at this blaze and they had an excellent pressure of water. It is greatly to their credit that they confined such a hot fire to the building where it originated.

Ishpeming and its Environs.

VALUATION SOARS
TAX COMMISSION EVEN EXCEEDS COOLEY AND ADAMS ESTIMATE.

RAILROADS ASSESSED \$208, 212,500
ON THIS BASIS THEY WILL PAY SOME \$3,500,000 TAXES.

Result of Commissioners' Work Will Occasion Surprise, as Such a Heavy Increase Was Hardly Expected.

Manville Jenks arrived home Saturday night from the lower peninsula, where he has been engaged in his work as a member of the state tax commission. The commission has completed its labors for this year in connection with fixing the valuation of the railroads of the state and submitted its report Saturday night. According to the findings of the commission the total valuation of all the lines now operating is \$208,212,500, over \$6,000,000 greater than the Cooley and Adams estimate. This increase will be a big surprise to people who have watched the work of the commission closely. It was confidently predicted Friday that the estimate would be in the neighborhood of \$190,000,000. The amount of taxes that the railroads will pay on the valuations fixed by the commission will be \$2,850,429.12, which is almost double the sum they paid last year. But the figures may not pass muster before the board of review which meets shortly to remain in session for four weeks. The companies will then have an opportunity to present arguments or pick flaws in the assessment. But the figures have been prepared with great care and the attorneys of the companies will have to fight hard to get any reduction. The commissioners have been engaged in their task for months and have kept a large force of clerks busy digging up the details and getting them into proper order. The task of compilation has been a stupendous one for the previous assessments were not followed and original sources of information had to be consulted.

The taxation of railroads means a good deal to the commonwealth because all other taxes are raised or lowered in proportion to what the companies pay. "Equal taxation" has produced a crash turmoil in the state ever since Pingree started on his memorable crusade against corporations that were not standing their share of the burdens of taxation and if the work of the commission has been thoroughly and fairly done the vexed question will have been settled, temporarily at least. HAS 148 LIQUOR DEALERS.

Report of the County Treasurer Gives the Amount of Liquor Tax.
The report of the county treasurer giving the amount of liquor tax in the county has just been issued and it contains several interesting items in regard to the liquor business. Ishpeming is the wettest place in the county, having forty-eight liquor dealers. Two of these dealers sell wholesale, but all the rest are retailers. Though this city leads the list in the number of saloons, Marquette turns more revenue into the treasury for liquor taxes. Ishpeming contributes \$21,641.34 to the fund, while the county seat pays in \$25,323.34. The difference is due to the fact that one or two wholesale houses in Marquette hold licenses for selling both spirituous and malt liquors and pay a higher license. Then, too, a number of Ishpeming dealers have held their licenses for less than a year and so pay less than \$500, the yearly tax.

BIG DEAL CONSUMMATED.
H. O. Young and Samuel Mitchell have Purchased Valuable Arizona Property.

Word was received Friday from H. O. Young stating that the titles and lands to be and Captain Mitchell have been inspecting in Arizona and have carefully examined the titles. The property is one in which many people from this county are interested. Some 30,000 shares are held in Marquette and Houghton counties. In fact, the mine is entirely in the hands of upper peninsula people. Captain Mitchell and Captain Chynoweth of Calumet visited Arizona in the early part of November and secured options on it, and it was on their recommendation that the stock was taken so readily, at \$10 per share. The tract is located about twenty miles from Bisbee. It is of wide extent and gold, silver and copper have been found in it. The copper prospecting. The Bisbee papers say that the Michigan people have secured a valuable property. All the treasury stock has been sold and paid for, but the money will not be paid into the hands of the owners of the fee until the titles have been re-examined and their validity is perfectly assured. The stockholders feel very much pleased with their investment.

COAL GOES UP.
Ishpeming People Will Have to Pay \$5 a Ton for Their Anthracite.

Just as the people were beginning to congratulate themselves on the prospect of getting their coal bins filled at an early date at a uniform price of \$8.50 per ton, they are disappointed by the discouraging news that every consumer will have to dig up an extra half a price, now \$9. The Consolidated announced a short time ago that its stock of anthracite would go at \$8.50. Mr. Bronson, however, found it necessary to pay \$1.50 per ton freightage to Escanaba at the instance of \$200. This with the railroad freight charges added, the coal will cost the concern fully \$9 per ton delivered here, and there will not be a cent of profit, even at the advanced price. In the copper country, where the coal is hauled direct from the boats, \$9 is the prevailing charge. Mr. Bronson arrived home from Pennsylvania Thursday. He says the eastern states are still in the grip of a serious coal famine and are as bad off as this section. Proximity to the coal fields seems to have made no difference in the distribution and people in New York state fare the same as those in northern Michigan. The wholesalers are besieged by dealers from all parts of the country and are forced to turn many away empty handed. Mr. Bronson says that he was offered \$2 per ton more for his cargo than it had cost him, and, in addition, was offered the entire expense of his journey, but he refused to part with the fuel he had tried so hard to secure. He felt that it would have been an injustice to the people of Ishpeming and Negaunee to have come home without the coal and was willing to sell the cargoes here at a price that would merely reimburse him for what they had cost.

OUT OF PRISON.
Jack Ryan, who was a political prisoner at Jamaica for two years and two months, was released Oct. 10 and is now in Leadville, Col. He will remain there for some time until his health, which was badly broken during his imprisonment and as a result of wounds received in battle, is restored. Before his capture Mr. Ryan had done valiant service in the ranks of the Boers. He fell into the hands of the English when desperately wounded and surrounded by the bodies of numbers of his foes. Mr. Ryan was located at Leadville previous to going to South Africa. He plans to return to South Africa as soon as his health permits, but will visit Ishpeming before taking his departure. Ryan's crime was treason against the British government and he was deported to Jamaica along with other members of Cronje's army in which he was an officer. Mr. Ryan's reputation as a diamond drill operator extends all over the world. He has worked in all the mining regions in this country and in various portions of Africa and South America. His work is well known on all the iron ranges of Michigan and Minnesota. He left here nearly fifteen years ago and since then has visited nearly every mining field that offered an opportunity for the exercise of his profession.

IT'S ONLY A DREAM.
Duluth Paper Does Not Believe That Woodsmen Will Organize.
The Duluth Evening Herald does not take any stock in the reports of the projected organization of a woodsmen's order, with branches throughout the north country. It says:
Regularly at this period of the season, every year, some would-be genius conceives the idea of a woodsmen's union, to include all of the men working in the lumber camps of the Northwest. That the scheme is preposterous and would fail of its own weight is claimed by all intelligent men interested in the lumber movement. They ridicule the idea that the class of men, as a general rule, are such as would support any organization along the line of a union.
Another thing that would, it is claimed, effectually prevent the organization of a brotherhood of the woodsmen is the shortness of the logging season, for the men are employed from five to six months every year in logging operations.
With the high wages now paid by the loggers and the generally conceded excellence of the food furnished the woodsmen at the various camps, the logging operators claim that the men who work in the woods are positively living in luxury compared with the woodsmen of several years ago, who were paid less wages, lived on much plainer food and came to the city with less frequency to spend their money.
It is agreed by the railroad officials who transport men and the labor agencies that hire men that fully two-thirds of the regular number of men employed in the woods every year are now at work at their regular vocation. That the loggers will not have an easy time in securing the services of the other third of the woodsmen for the next few months, when most in need of skilled labor, is conceded by many operators. The greater part of logging work is unskilled, but there are some skilled men required, such as head sawyers, four-horse drivers and top-loaders, and men of this class are scarcer than ever this year. Skilled woodsmen can earn this winter all the way from \$35 to \$60 per month, according to the nature of the work.
In some of the northern Wisconsin districts woodsmen were so scarce this winter that the loggers had to import a lot of green hands from Chicago, and a great deal of trouble with losses are reported in many instances.
