Cannot Add Wines, Etc., to Soda Unless They Have Liquor Dealers' License. Washington, Dec. 16.—Commissioner Yerkes has decided that druggists and others who sell soda water drinks, claret soda, or similar beverages to which distilled spirits, wine or any compounds thereof are added in any quantity, however small, are required to pay the special tax for retail liquor dealers under the internal revenue laws. Under old rulings, druggists and others were allowed to add to soda water and other soft drinks an inappreciable quantity of listilled spirits or wines for flavoring



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



There is only about 150 tons of blacksmith's coal in sight at Fine Christmas Present this port, and the supply is away below the needs for the ensuing months until the opening of navigation again. Most people are of the belief that the blacksmiths use hard coal screenings, but this is not the case. The coal they purchase sweetheart, then come in and for their forges is a special product, desirable for its freedom from dirt, grit and sulphur, and produced at about three points in the coal fields. Marquette county alone uses somewhere in the reighborhood of 1,000 tons of this fuel each year.

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
