Laidley said of the Chicago markets: "A trifle lower cables and good weather brought a lower opening, and wheat was heavily sold at the opening. Stop orders were reached in quantities and the market went off %c under Saturday. The strength in the coarse grains and rather fair clearances helped the price, and the close was only %c under Saturday's last series of the coarse der Saturday's last prices. This little shakeout today, we think, is a good thing for the market and we believe it will now be able to show some better

"Under the influence of good weather, corn opened lower, but after the early weakness it turned strong, closing 4c over Saturday. Large clearances caused the bulge at the close. While corn was helped by the strength in oats. we still believe that the May is going to see much higher prices. There is no question but what the market here is heavily oversold.

"Oats were lower early, in sympathy with the other grains, but turned strong on good buying, closing 4c over Satur day. The stocks in Chicago show very heavy decrease. Cash dealers re port that it is almost an impossibility to get supplies, and we look for consid erably higher prices.

New York a Traders' Market.

Walker said of New York: "The market opened at a recession from the closing prices of Saturday. There was not much commission buying and the traders began to sell the market, which they did with some success The fear of trouble with Union Pacific employees and the tightness of money prevented any buying of importance.
