The senate committee on foreign relations today agreed to recommend the adoption of an amendment to the Cuban reciprocity treaty providing that the reduction of 20 per cent in the tariff on Cuban sugar shall not be further reduced by any preferential rate given to another country. The action was taken at the instance of the beet sugar men. Friends of other reciprocity treaties object to the sugar amendment to the Cuban treaty. They fear it will interfere with the negotiating of reciprocity trea ties with other sugar countries.

Paris, Jan. 14.—The entire disappear ance of the sardine shoals from the coasts of Brittany has caused unparalleled destitution in that frugal and thrifty portion of the country. Public subscriptions today were opened in this city and throughout the republic for the relief of the starving fishermen.

Of recent years the trade had grown to immense proportions and the fishers were prosperous, but now all is gone. All the tradesmen of the region are ruined, since it is the custom there to year and then receive payment when the season of the eatch comes round. It is believed that by one of the unaccountable changes in the movements of fish the entire catch has changed its feeding ground for a more southerly haunt and is now off Portugal.

Several million francs will be needed in a short space of time if the famine is to be checked, and even after then, unless experts succeed in finding out the cause of the disappearance of the fish and devise some means to induce them to return to their former feeding grounds, scores of villages on the Breton coast will become the habita-Aion of the seagull and the outcast.



KNOCK IN THE HEAD IS BEST. Why Cattle Killing by Elecricity Is De-

During the rectn visit here of a party of Hollanders, who inspected the Kansas City packing-houses, they noted with wonder that while nearly every operation about the big plants was per formed mechanically, especially by the aid of electricity ,the killing itself was still done by hand. Hogs, they remarked, were stuck in the throat with a keen knife, while cattle were rapped on the head with a bludgeon, or shot. "Why do they cling to those primitive methods?" they asked, "when elec tricity would do the work so much more humanely?"

The question found an echo in the mind of a Kansas City man, and he set out to investigate and ascertain last And he found out that, while the packers would doubtless be glad to adopt electrocution as a means of killing their animals, it was not practicable "In the first place," explained F. M Bernardin, an expert electrician, "th places where the cattle are killed are very wet. Blood is everywhere. So is water. It would be exceedingly dangerous to use electricity in such places. A man might catch hold of an electrode and be killed before any one could tell what happened. The danger element is accentuated by the dampness.



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

H. Andrus of Ishpeming; secretary, Dr. H. J. Hornbogen; treasurer, Dr. G. D. Beech of Champion; director for three years, Dr. T. A. Felch of Ishpeming; two years, Dr. J. H. Hudson of Negaunee; one year

Dr. Anderson of Grand Marais. In addition Dr. F. MacD. Harkin was named a delegate to attend the meeting of the State Medical society to be held in Detroit on the 11th and 12th of June.

Further important business transacted by the association was the approval of two resolutions presented by Dr. George G. Barnett of Ishpeming. They provided that the secretary be instructed to notify the county representatives in the state legislature that the society would be gratified to have them undertake work looking to the passage of two important measures, calling for the complete and proper registration of births and the establishment of the coroner's

The Proposed Measures.

Michigan has today no adequate sysa model and is working in a very satisfactory manner. It is about as complete as it possibly can be, and it give full death statistics for the state each

There is no reason why the birth record should not be kept in just as complete and satisfactory a manner, and its mportance merits that it be given more attention than it has yet received. This is a question to which the state legislature may well devote some of its time and the Marquette County society is ang wisely in given serious attention.

The physicians propose, in requesting the abolishment of the office of coroner that the prosecuting attorney be made coroner in fact, with power to associate with himself in the investigation of coroner's cases a competent medical man, or, should the ease demand, medical men.

The argument is that the coroner's duties are partly legal and partly med-ical and that the best service cannot be obtained when they are left to the tender mereies of a man who is neither lawyer or doctor. Of course under the present system there are some good coroners, but, it is claimed, that fact does not alter the obvious faults in the sys-

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
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
