

Y organization of a Detroit company for Information on financial matters gladly the purpose of manufacturing fuel from (12-27-1m) peat comes word that the department of agriculture at Washington is going to conduct a thorough investigation of the structions that require large forces of peat supply in northern Michigan. Peat is found in many parts of the peninsula and in the immediate vicinity of this city there are large deposits of excellent quality. Peat has been an article of fuel in Europe for hundreds of years, but the methods of gathering and drying it have been very crude and half its latent energy as a heat producer have not been realized. The process that the new Detroit company probably intends to employ is along the line of a recent invention which ensures the use of practically every atom of combustible mat-The peat is first dredged out and dried by mechanical means. The drying will be completed in a rotary dryer minor charges from which the city and by the use of lime. After being mixed with lime and petroleum the process is completed by running the material through a briquetting mill and pressing it into briquettes. 


