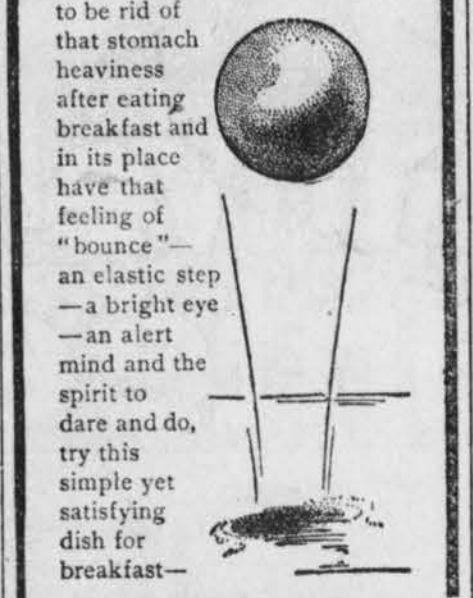

Ishpeiming and its Environs.

STANDS WITH CLERKS.
One of the Largest Merchants Believes Thoroughly in Early Closing.

The question of early closing of stores is provoking a good deal of discussion. When the pros and the cons that have been presented are carefully considered the early closing advocates seem to have scored the heaviest, and it is likely they will have no difficulty in holding their position but may be able to develop enough strength to extend the plan even further and secure the closing of stores at least five nights in the week at 6 o'clock straight during the year, with no intermission except for a few nights during the holidays. According to the present agreement there are six days in the year when the stores are closed all day, and three half holidays. Monday evening is open night till 8 o'clock and Saturdays and pay days the business places are closed at any hour that suits the proprietor. A period before Christmas and Fourth of July is reserved during which the stores may be opened to suit the convenience of the owners.

Wednesday, A. W. Myers, the head of one of the largest firms in the city, came out very emphatically in favor of restricting the open evenings to Saturdays and pay days, the night before the Fourth of July and ten days before Christmas, thus cutting out the open night on Monday entirely besides shortening the other opening periods. He said that the trade at his store evenings is not large enough to pay for the extra light and fuel that is consumed. So far as the complaint that the customers are dissatisfied with early closing is concerned he said he did not believe it because he had not heard a single complaint from one of his customers. The people have become accustomed to the arrangement as it has been tried for over five years and they are suited with it. The decision rests with them and cannot be affected by any action of the clerks or merchants, so long as the public has expressed its approval of the plan of early closing there is no need of adopting any half way measures, but the plan should be carried out thoroughly and on every evening, with the possible exception of pay nights and Saturdays, all stores should close promptly at 6 o'clock, not as a concession to anyone, but as a simple matter of economy. Mr. Myers said that so far as he knew most of the store keepers were heartily in favor of the present plan, but he would anticipate some kicking if an attempt was made to adopt his more radical ideas on the subject. He is convinced, however, that a short trial would prove that they are correct.

FUEL FROM PEAT.
Detroit Company Organized to Make It—Government Investigating Supply.

Simultaneously with the report of the organization of a Detroit company for the purpose of manufacturing fuel from peat comes word that the department of agriculture at Washington is going to conduct a thorough investigation of the peat supply in northern Michigan. Peat is found in many parts of the peninsula and in the immediate vicinity of this city there are large deposits of excellent quality. Peat has been an article of fuel in Europe for hundreds of years, but the methods of gathering and drying it have been very crude and half its latent energy as a heat producer have not been realized. The process that the new Detroit company probably intends to employ is along the line of a recent invention which ensures the use of practically every atom of combustible matter. The peat is first dredged out and dried by mechanical means. The drying will be completed in a rotary dryer and by the use of lime. After being mixed with lime and petroleum the process is completed by running the material through a briquetting mill and pressing it into briquettes. The fuel would be absolutely free from sulphur and would be much superior to coal on this account. Peat, besides existing in large quantities on this peninsula is found in the adjoining parts of Minnesota and Wisconsin. It is found in nearly every state in the union, but the beds vary in the quantity of the finished product that they are capable of yielding. Where there is a large percentage of moisture, the product will be smaller. There is an almost inexhaustible supply of a good quality of peat around Ishpeiming, and within the city limits there is enough to furnish fuel for the whole town for years, if it was properly treated. The investigations of the department of agriculture above referred to will include, it is said, these deposits.

"MACBETH."
Aiden Benedict's latest successful attraction is John Griffith in a revival of "Macbeth". The theme of the drama is the gradual ruin, through yielding to evil within and evil without, of a man, who, though from the first tainted by ambitious thoughts, yet possessed elements in his nature of possible honor and loyalty. Macbeth had physical courage, but moral weakness. Once his hands were dyed in blood, he hardly cared to withdraw them, and the same fears which had tended to hold him back from murder, now urged him on to further murders, until slaughter almost reckless became the habit of his reign. Griffith will be at the opera house on Tuesday evening, Jan. 27.

TO ENLARGE COMMITTEE.
Elks Will Ask Non-Members of Lodge to Assist in Opera House Project.

The members of the local lodge of Elks are meeting with much encouragement in their proposed opera house venture. Many of the citizens have signified their intention of subscribing for stock regardless of the returns they will receive upon their investment. The whole town talked theater yesterday. All feel certain that the present movement will result in the completion of the house in the time mentioned in yesterday's Mining Journal. It is the purpose of the Elks to open the house without one dollar indebtedness hanging over it. Sufficient stock to meet all obligations will be sold and every dollar of the amount subscribed will be collected before the opening night. The committee representing the Elks met last night and the citizens to take stock and assist in launching the enterprise. The amount of stock will be confined to the cost of the property. With a view to obtaining the good will and support of non-members and citizens generally, the Elks committee has invited the following citizens to lend a helping hand: J. A. Fish, Thomas Walters, H. F. Heyn, August Swanson and W. H. Johnston. These gentlemen will be invited to meet with the Elks committee for the purpose of devising ways and means of disposing of the stock and the transaction of other business connected with the enterprise. The stock will be offered for sale within a few days and so far as can now be judged it will sell freely.

MUNICIPAL COURT.
Opponents of Idea Think It Would Be an Expensive Experiment.

The proposed municipal court is meeting with opposition on the ground of expense. It is claimed that the court would be a costly luxury for the city and that offenders would have to be "soaked" a good deal harder than they are now if the salary of a judge and his assistants, together with the other expenses of maintaining the court, were to be secured from fines.

The Soo experiment has often been referred to by the advocates of a police court. It is claimed that the Lock City is very well satisfied with the court and that it is a great saving to the municipality, turning a net profit of \$1,300 per year. But it is contended that the experience of the Soo will not apply to Ishpeiming. The population there, while not much larger, if any, is of a somewhat different character. Large numbers of men of all nationalities have congregated there temporarily to work on the canal and other constructions that require large forces of unskilled manual laborers. Many of these people are turbulent and irresponsible and frequently require the attention of the police. The other class is the class which support the municipal court. The court is not, however, as said by some here, given jurisdiction in civil cases, that being attended to by the sole remaining justice, but derives its revenue from the fines of those who are brought before it on criminal charges. The judge receives a salary of \$1,500 per year and is allowed the assistance of a clerk, who receives a salary of \$750.

Here the conditions would be much different. The number of arrests on minor charges from which the city would receive a fine is smaller than at the Soo and would not be sufficient, it is asserted, to pay the expenses of a judge. Minor offenses are generally classed as "drunk and disorderly," and under the present an average of about \$8 in fines and costs is assessed against prisoners brought before the justices. Only 130 drunk and disorderly cases were brought up for trial in ten months in 1902. The record for the other months was not obtainable, but taking thirteen as the average for a month the record for the year was 156. With \$10 as an average

fine for each drunk, the revenue that the city would receive if there were a police court would only be \$1,560, which is said to be too high an estimate.

Of course the Soo plan would not need to be adopted completely here and some variations could be made in it so that it would suit local conditions better, but the hard fact remains, according to those who oppose the idea, that the income would be very slim indeed if exact and equal justice were meted out to the prisoner who happened to come up before the court. A competent man could not be secured for the position on much less than \$1,500 per year and a clerk would probably be necessary. In the light of these facts, a municipal court would be more of an expense than a saving to the city. This is the contention of its opponents—but, on the other hand, it is asserted there would be no harm and not great expense in at least trying the plan.

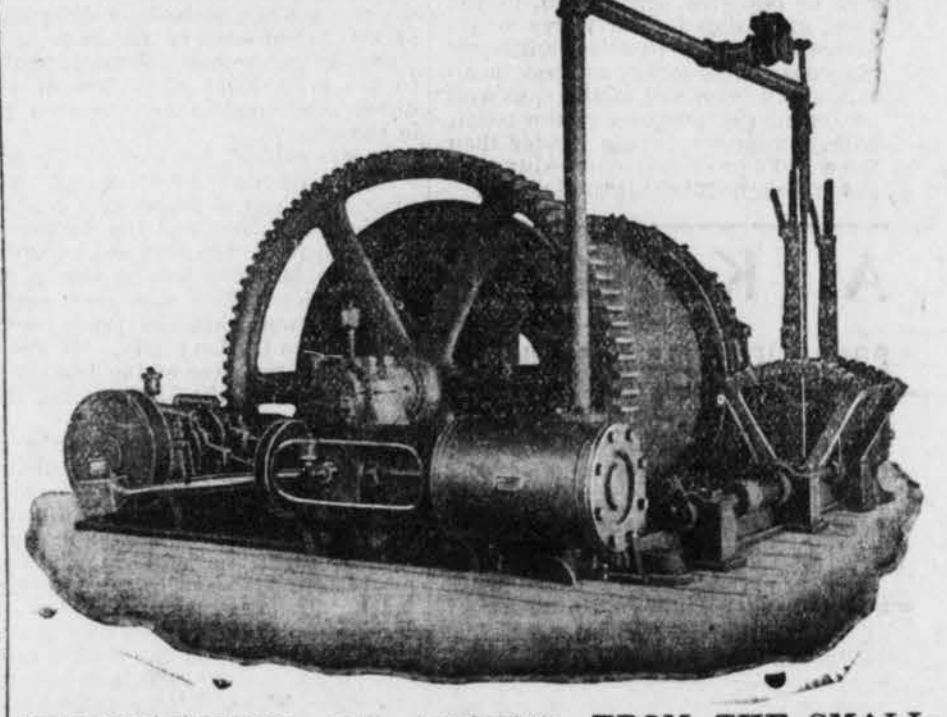

TRIP IS POSTPONED

JUNKETERS WILL NOT BE HERE UNTIL WEEK AFTER NEXT.

LEGISLATURE ADJOURNS ON 30TH

UPPER PENINSULA VISITORS TO LEAVE SUNDAY, THE 1ST.

There Will Be Two Parties, the Larger of Which Will Visit This Section—Details of the Proposed Excursion.

A change in the plan of the prospective junketers to the upper peninsula will bring the legislative party to Marquette a week later than has been expected...

Plans for entertaining the legislators here have been partially formulated and they will be completed in good season.

Says the Detroit Journal of the junketers' plans:

There will be as usual two separate junkets during the ten days' legislative recess. The bigger delegation will be the one to go direct to the state institutions in the upper peninsula.

The big junket will consist of upwards of fifty persons. The members of the committees on upper peninsula state institutions of both houses, their wives, some favored outsiders and newspaper men.

The party will arrive at Mackinac Monday morning, leaving almost immediately for Trout Lake, where the three cars will be transferred to a train on the Soo line, going direct to Newberry, where the state asylum will be inspected.

If it is possible the party will be carried to Marquette Monday night ready to begin the visiting of the normal school and prison bright and early Tuesday morning.

On Wednesday afternoon or Thursday morning the junketers will get to Houghton, perhaps stopping at Ishpeming on the way. At Houghton there will be enough sight-seeing to occupy two days, with the mining school and the mines. Leaving Houghton, the party will go to Chicago over the Chicago & Northwestern via Milwaukee.

Saturday and Sunday will be spent in the Windy City, and the start for home made Sunday night, so that the legislators may be in their seats for the convening Monday night.

The smaller junket party will be confined to one Pullman car. They will leave Detroit on Saturday morning, going to Drayton Plains to see the new state bass hatchery. Sunday morning they will arrive in Grand Rapids, going from there to Mill Creek, thence to Paris and Harrietta, where they will arrive Tuesday afternoon.

Arriving at the Soo Wednesday noon, two days will be spent in inspecting the hatchery of lake and brook trout and whitefish there, and in seeing the Clergue steel rail mill in the Canadian Soo in operation at night.

At the invitation of Senator Fuller of the senate fish committee, a stop over on the way home will be made at Escanaba, Senator Fuller's home. At Escanaba is one of the sites in contemplation for the proposed upper peninsula hatchery.

This junket will arrive in Chicago Friday morning, waiting over to return home with the larger party.

K. W. Cottrell, who for years acted as the host for the Michigan Central on the upper peninsula junket, has been extended an invitation to be present this year.
