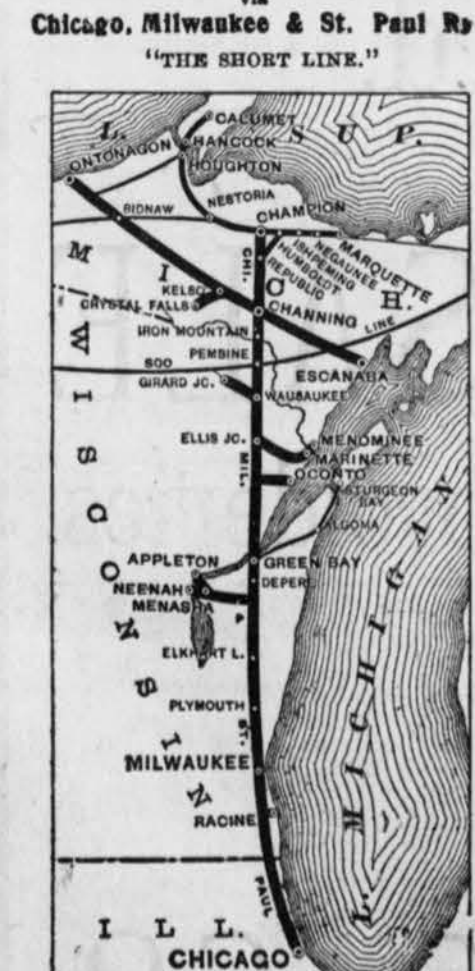

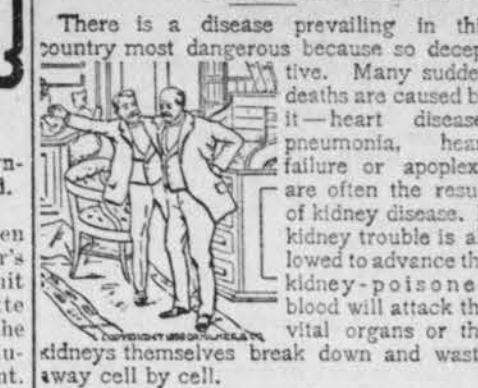
Shipping Machinery to California.

BUSY IN INTERIOR

SMALL FORCE REMOVING FINISHINGS AT LONGYEAR MANSION.

TASK WILL TAKE COUPLE OF WEEKS

ULTIMATELY BIG GANG WILL BE WORKED ON THE EXTERIOR.

Demolition of Building Biggest Work of Its Kind Ever Undertaken in North County—Expense Will Be Great.

During the past few days C. C. Van Iderstine has made a start with the demolition of the Longyear mansion. He has about half a dozen men employed on the premises, but it will be some time before the public is able to observe any progress with the work of destruction.

As The Mining Journal has mentioned these finishings are in sections. They were shipped to Marquette ready to be put in place and they are keyed together in a simple manner, which makes the work of their removal comparatively easy.

It will be possible to remove and ship them with very little damage and they will be received at Brookline, unless there is some accident in shipment, in fine condition for use in the proposed new Longyear mansion.

However, although this removal of the finishings is comparatively easy it takes much time, and thus it is possible that upwards of four weeks will elapse before the frame of the mansion is attacked with real vigor.

Until the expiration of this time only a small force of men will be employed by Mr. Van Iderstine, but when the work of demolition is in full swing some forty or fifty hands will be kept busy for a short time. Then the activity at the mansion will compare only with the busy scenes that attended its erection.

The tearing down of the house is certainly the largest piece of work of the kind that has ever been undertaken in the north country and it is said that it is one of the biggest jobs of structural demolition ever undertaken in the state of Michigan. Beyond this it is claimed that never has a private home of equal value and of comparative newness been torn down, with a similar purpose, in the middle west.

The demolition of the mansion will cost a large sum and the transportation of the parts that Mr. Longyear will use in his proposed new Brookline home will be another big item. On the former expense no estimate is at present available, for though contractors can easily

figure approximately on the erection of a building similar to the Longyear building, few of them, owing to a lack of that kind of experience, are able to make even a rough guess at the expense of tearing it down. There are many elements which enter into the calculation, but it is safe to venture that the cost will be large enough for the erection of a new private home that would be a notable ornament to any city on the upper peninsula.

C. C. Van Iderstine is the best man that could be found to have charge of the work, as he is thoroughly acquainted with the building and its construction, having superintended its erection.

"LIBERTY BELLES."

Musical Comedy at Opera House Saturday Evening.

"Liberty Belles" was at the opera house Saturday evening. It was there with the scale of prices that prevails for many of the best attractions that visit Marquette, and as a result there were many wrothy theater-goers at the conclusion of the performance. "Liberty Belles" is a light, frothy musical skit, put on with three elaborate special settings, a bevy of fairly presentable girls, and a number of clever actors. It has some good songs, notably "De Trop" and "The Drum Major," and although it is an insipidly foolish thing it is healthy and clean. Although there were the usual disgruntled minority of formidable "kickers," the house, as a whole, seemed very well pleased and gave the "Belles" a very favorable reception.

However, judging from the comment in the foyer after the play and the number of people who have come out of their way to register their protests with The Mining Journal there are many people who think that even the pink pajama girl was not sufficient excuse for the scale of prices. To be brief, they assert that without having any drastic fault to find with the "Belles" they were not worth the money. They point to the fact that the same schedule of prices prevailed Saturday night as was in force for the Jefferson engagement and claim that such an arrangement is manifestly unjust, there being no possible comparison between the two attractions. The charges for the "Belles," with which the fault is found, were \$1.50 for divans and \$1 for single seats in the lower part of the house.

That the "Belles" were high at the price is probably a just criticism. They would give much better satisfaction at seventy-five cents and \$1.

HERE WEDNESDAY NIGHT.

Griffith Will Appear at Opera House in "Macbeth."

Wednesday evening Marquette people will have an opportunity to see John Griffith, the well-known actor, in the role of Macbeth, in Shakespeare's tragedy. He is traveling this season under the management of Helen Benedict, who is said to have given "Macbeth" an unusually complete production of scenery and electrical effects and to have provided Mr. Griffith with an able supporting company.

"Macbeth" appears to have been one of the latest, as it is one of the greatest, of Shakespeare's dramatic achievements. It is believed to have been written and first performed some time between the years 1603 and 1610. The traditions on which the plot is founded, are related by Hollingshed in his "Chronicles," first published in London, 1577; and also by George Buchanan in his Latin "History of Scotland." Not only the historical outline, but the principal incidents of the drama, may be found in the works of these writers. The prophecy of Macbeth's destiny and that of Banquo's issue, the interview between Macduff and Malcolm, and the influence of Macbeth's wife, whom Hollingshed describes as "burning with unquenchable desire to bear the name of a queen," have all a legendary or semi-historical foundation in truth.
