However, although this removal of the finishings is comparatively easy it takes much time, and thus it is probable that upwards of four weeks will elapse before the frame of the mansion is attacked with real vigor.

Until the expiration of this time only a small force of men will be employed by Mr. Van Iderstine, but when the work of demolition is in full swing some forty or fifty hands will be kept busy for a short time.
