Occasion Most Brilliant.

The banquet was held in the Grand pera House, the interior of which was eautifully decorated with flags and lowers, the floral decorations being particularly elaborate. The thirteen banquet boards assed with roses and carnations. The ecasion was the most brilliant of its and ever witnessed in Canton, and few banquets held in Ohio have equalled it in beauty, elaborateness and interest.

Among the four hundred and fifty-sevn gentlemen assembled about the boards were some of the most distinguished men in the civil, public and po-litical life of the country. President McKinley was one of these men If during the lifetime of a generation

no crisis occurrs sufficient to call out in marked manner the energies of the strongest leader, then of course the world does not and can not know of the existence of such a leader; and in consequence there are long periods in the history of every nation during which no nan appears who leaves an indelible mark in history. If, on the other hand, the crisis is one so many-sided as to call for the development and exercise of nany distinct attributes, it may be that nore than one man will appear in order that the requirements shall be fully met. In the Revolution and in the period of constructive statesmanship immediately following it, for our good fortune it befell us that the highest military and he highest civic attributes were embodied in Washington, and so in him we have one of the undying men of history—a great soldier, if possible an even greater statesman, and above all a public servant whose lofty and disinterested patriotism rendered his power and abili-y—alike on battlefields and in council hambers-of the most far-reaching ser-

vice to the republic.

DEATHS FROM VIOLENCE.

Upper Peninsula Has the Highest Rate in which many government officers were for Month of December.

In the Michigan Monthly Bulletin of Vital Statistics for the month of December there is published the death rate for each of the geographical divisions of the state, with the important causes of death. In the whole state there were 173 deaths from violence. Of this number twenty-eight occurred on the upper peninsula, which exceeds the rate per 100,000 of population of any other division and also the rate of the entire state. For the state the rate was 82.9 and for the upper peninsula 120. Negaunee's death rate for December is the third largest of any town in the peninsula. There were eleven deaths during the month and the rate was 17.9 per one thousand. Five of the deaths were of people over sixty years old and were due to the infirmities of old age.

It has some deficiencies, however, and, as a remedy, the board of health recommends a longer tenure of office for registrars in order o secure greater efficiency.
