POSTPONED THEIR TRIPS.

Finlanders Afraid They Will Be Forced to Enter Army if They Go Home.

The article that appeared in The Mining Journal Monday, warning Finlanders that they would become liable to military service in the Russian army if they returned to their native land, has caused no little concern among the local Finlanders who were intending to cross the water very soon for a summer's visit in the old country.

Most of the Finlanders here who are of legal age and fulfill the other qualifications of citizenship have taken out their papers and have become fully naturalized. They have the thought that could visit the czar's dominions and bid defiance to the Russian government if any attempt should be made to compel them to serve in the army, relying on their American citizenship for protection.

Russia, according to the state department circular published in these columns Monday, does not recognize the rights of Finnish Americans if they have left the land of their birth without imperial consent and if they return their acquired citizenship will be of no avail if they should fall into the clutches of a recruiting officer.

The knowledge of the conditions they will meet if they go back will probably keep many Finlanders who have been planning to cross the ocean during the coming summer, on this side of the water. The steamship lines plying between the United States and Finland usually do quite a large business in the summer months as the Finnish people travel back and forth more than any other nationality that is found in this region.

EXONERATES LIND.

Associate Editor of Superior Posten Takes Blame for Attack on Marshal.

I had no intention that later discoveries have proven to be misunderstood. Holter in this city, I wish to state that I was not conversant with the facts in aforesaid article, as he at the time was detained from the office by the sickness of his sister. HIS TROUBLES CONTINUE.

Father Frank Is Still at Odds With Congregation at Sheboygan.

An Oshkosh paper of Tuesday gives the following account of the latest developments in the squabble that has been going on between Father Frank, the former Ishpeming clergyman and his present flock at Sheboygan: As the result of two meetings held last night, Grace Episcopal church now has two sets of officers, one elected by the adherents of Father Frank and the other by the so-called opposition. Despite the fact that Rector Frank moved for an adjournment of the regular annual meeting for the apparent reason that he perceived a great opposition to him in attendance, a meeting was held and wardens and vestrymen for the ensuing year were elected. The rector asked for the adjournment on the assumption that the majority present had no standing under the canonical laws, not having been regularly attending the communion at the altar during the last six months. He refused to entertain any nominations by the opposition on the ground that many present had not the right to cast a ballot. At the close of the opposition meeting Rector Frank called his meeting to order.

The annual meeting of the parish was called to order by Rector Frank, who, evidently perceiving that he was entirely outnumbered, immediately asked for an adjournment. The opposition present, however, were determined the meeting should be held, and proceeded accordingly to the customary election. Treasurer Emma Heyn rendered a report up to the time she was excommunicated, and the acting treasurer pro tem, gave a superficial report, declining to go into details and refusing to recognize the legality of the meeting, though participating in the vote at the adjournment. A letter from the rector, charging Miss Heyn inferentially with misappropriating church funds in the event of her not surrendering the books and balances to him, was declared unkind, ungentlemanly, unchristian, and entirely unbecoming for and a vote of confidence was extended her.

Rector Frank, his attorney, and five partisans remained at the meeting. The opposition adjourned and Rector Frank then called his meeting to order and proceeded to elect Messrs. Rudolf and Koschene for wardens and vestrymen amenable to his orders, seven votes, including women, being cast.

The rector does not recognize the validity of the opposition officers, and declares the opposition overstepped the laws of the church. It is intimated that had last night's parish meeting been held as the opposition wished, manifested itself the rector would have resigned, but that under existing circumstances he will remain to fight to the finish.

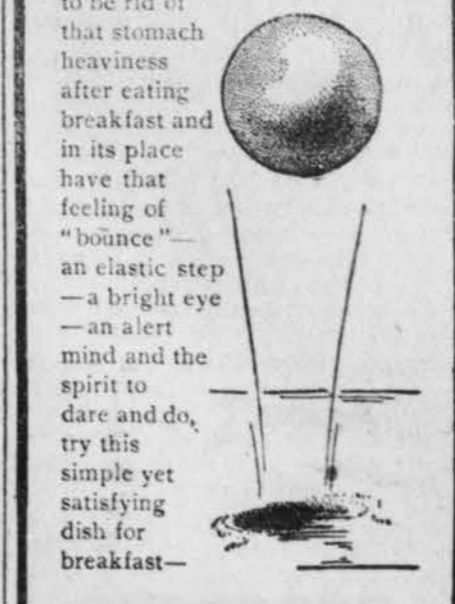

JAPANESE ESTHETICISM.

An Amusing Description of the Mikado's Soulful Soldiers.

If the British Tommy Atkins were to study the character of his Japanese brother-in-arms he would undoubtedly pronounce him a queer fish. His most striking characteristic is perhaps his gentleness and his estheticism.

I have seen privates walk hand-in-hand like little schoolgirls to certain famous gardens situated at a distance of perhaps seven or eight miles from their barracks, pay for admittance, admire the irises for hours, and go home again, having tasted all the day nothing stronger than weak tea.

At intervals during the hottest fighting in China in 1900 the Japanese soldier hastened to unfold a fan which he carried with him and to fan himself. Even in his louting he was esthetic, for the objects he brought away with him, when he did bring anything away with him, and that was, of course, very seldom, were bric-a-brac whose value the western soldier could not appreciate.

A marked difference between the Japanese soldier and the British lies in the fact that while King Edward's uniform has notoriously an attraction for nurses and general servants, the mikado's uniform possesses no such fascination. I have followed long processions of conscripts to barracks, but have never seen a girl waste a glance on them, and during a residence of over three and a half years in this country I have never once seen a soldier "swalking out" a girl.

It is different with sailors, who get more opportunity of seeing foreign countries and improving their manners.

CIRCUS IS COMING

AND ITS DATES CONFLICT WITH THOSE OF NEWSPAPER MEN.

FOREPAUGH & SELLS BROS. OUTFIT

PRESS ASSOCIATION MAY BE ABLE TO CHANGE ITS DATES.

If It Cannot Its Trip to This Region Will Be Almost an Impossibility—Big Show Will Demoralize Country It Visits.

The officials of the South Shore road have from time to time been up against all sorts of strange situations which have taxed their ingenuity, as well as their capacities for handling traffic. It is not to be expected that they have rarely had a more trying outlook than that regarding the Michigan Press association's proposed jaunt to Marquette and the copper country. In fact, it appears that the excursion will have to be given up unless the press men can rearrange their dates somewhat. The trouble is that the association and the Forepaugh & Sells Bros.' circus will come into conflict all along the line, according to the present schedule of both. A NOVEL SCHEME.

Group of Local Merchants to Do Independent Street Lighting.

The merchants on Front street between Main street and the South Shore cut, just below Washington, have arranged to do a little street lighting on their own accord. In this they are not actuated by philanthropy or a desire to see only the city lighting. Their motive is purely a business one. The scheme is of an advertising nature, and the businessmen who bear the expense of the extra lighting expect to profit as a result of the fact that their part of the main thoroughfare will be much more brilliantly lit than the other parts. They will install four Nernst lamps of 400 candlepower each, they to be distributed at equidistant intervals in the streten of street designated above.

R. H. Lee, Jr., representing the Nernst Lamp company of Peaburg, was here yesterday and together with Capt. Retalle, he closed the arrangements with the businessmen who will defray the expense of the special illumination. The lights will be ordered at once, and they will be installed as soon as received. They will probably be in use not later than a week from next Saturday evening. The Nernst lamps will burn from dusk until ten p. m. Mr. Lee has been introducing this novel advertising scheme in many cities in Wisconsin, and he has just made arrangements to give it a trial in Ishpeming. There the Hon. F. Branstad took all the extra light.

It is claimed that part of Front street where they are installed as light as day, so light that a newspaper can be read on the sidewalks. These lamps are already in use here, and their brilliancy has occasioned no little comment. They are to be found in Penill's, Prince's and Werners'.

The Nernst lamp is a comparatively new invention, although for commercial purposes it has been in use in Marquette for several months. It is upon an entirely different principle from any other electric lamp. Instead of using carbons, it has what are known as glowers. These glowers are small pencils about the size of a knitting needle in circumference and about an inch and a quarter long. They are made of some substance which is kept a secret and are of a white color. The glowers are tipped with platinum and are set into the lamp and fused with a contact post. When cold they are a non-conductor of electricity, but when heated they are a conductor.

The lamps have been under development for the last four years and have been used but about a year. The light is said to be the nearest approach to daylight of any artificial means of light. It has the advantage of casting a uniform light down as well as to the side and throws no shadow. It is claimed that the only point in which the ordinary incandescent lamp is above the Nernst lamp is in its greater economy. There is no flicker to the light and colors matched by its light will be found to match in the daylight. Each glower has a guaranteed life of 500 hours and it requires but 216 volts to a lamp, which is not a dangerous current, nor one which will affect telephones. It is operated by an alternating current.
