Cramp Ship Building Company Obtains Loan of \$7,500,000.

Philadelphia, Pa., April 21.—Through the successful negotiation of a \$7,500,000 loan on terms which involve practical reorganization under new management, the William Cramp & Sons ship and engine building company has been saved from the imminent danger of having to pass into the hands of a receiver.

The loan is for the purpose of facilitating the reorganization of the ship building company, which has been somewhat restricted through the lack of sufficient working capital.

CITY BRIEVITIES.

Today's weather: Generally fair; stationary temperature; fresh northerly winds, becoming variable.

A uniformed drill will be held by the Marquette Light Infantry this evening at 7:45 o'clock at the Casino rink.

There was a little snow yesterday, though none of it clung to the ground. The thermometers registered freezing temperatures. A cold, stiff wind blew from the north all day, making it disagreeable to be about.

The College of Mines students who appear at the opera house this evening in a concert program will arrive from Houghton on the 1:15 train this afternoon, traveling in a special car. There will be about forty young men in the party.

R. P. Travers, formerly a resident of Marquette, who was engaged in business here upwards of twenty-five years ago in the firm of Kruse & Travers, is in the city. He now lives in Chicago. Mr. Travers is well-known by the older residents of the city.

A meeting will be held at the Hotel Marquette at 8 o'clock Thursday evening to discuss the proposed organization of a lacrosse team. All players of the game and others interested in the sport will be in attendance, as will also Percy Hartney, a member of the newly organized Houghton lacrosse team, who already is in the city in the interest of

the movement. There are a number of men here who have played the game in Canada and it is expected that a strong club can be organized.

The board of supervisors will meet Saturday for the transaction of business, and for the purpose of organization, it being the first session since the annual spring elections. The county clerk requests that all bills against the county be handed in not later than Thursday evening.

Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Ball left last evening for Redlands, Cal., where they will visit Mr. Ball's sister, Mrs. C. M. Smith for a number of days. Returning they will visit Lieutenant George E. Ball at Fort Keogh, Mont., for a week or more. In all Mr. and Mrs. Ball expect to be absent from Marquette about a month.

Last night's concert at the Presbyterian church netted the society of Christian Endeavor, under whose auspices it was given, about \$40. The money will be applied to a fund from which will be paid the expenses of the local delegate sent to the national convention at Denver in July.

Captain James Hooper and Captain Thomas Hooper left last night for the La Fortuna and La Jajoba claims of the Lake Superior Mining & Milling company, near Magdalena, in the state of Sonora, Mexico. They spent yesterday here consulting with officers and leading stockholders in the company. They will at once map out the work on both groups of claims and take steps to have their development pushed with vigor.

Advices from Lansing are to the effect that the house has passed a resolution providing that a committee of five from the house and three from the senate shall be appointed to go to Stillwater, Minn., penitentiary to investigate the binder twine industry in that institution. The junket, if the resolution goes through the senate, will be one of the longest that ever went out of Lansing, and will give the junketers a nice bit for mileage and expenses. The object of the junket is to determine and report whether it is feasible to introduce the twine industry in the Michigan prisons.

A delegation of Hancock and Houghton Pythians arrived last evening, bringing with them the silver cup which is to be presented to the degree team winning the contest at the reunion and jubilee of the order at Houghton on April 30. The cup was placed on exhibition at Bigelow's where it will undoubtedly attract much attention today. The visiting Pythians are bringing a strong influence to bear on the Marquette members to put their team into practice at once, but whether the enthusiasm can be brought up to the required point remains to be seen.

The committee of the Michigan Press association which has charge of the arrangements for the annual outing at the Soo will meet at the Palmer House, Chicago, this week, on the 24th, to discuss details of the program. It is likely that the subject of changing the dates of the gathering so as to enable the South Shore to arrange to transport the party to Marquette and Houghton counties will be brought up. At present, as announced in The Mining Journal a few days ago, the asso-

ciation's dates and those of the Foran-Sells Bros. circus combination conflict. General Passenger Agent Hibbard of the South Shore will likely meet with the newspaper men at the Palmer House.

At the council meeting Monday evening a committee was named to co-operate with the committee of supervisors in arranging and carrying out the program attending the ceremony of the laying of the cornerstone of the new court house Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The mayor and Aldermen Asire, Donovan, Ward, German and Anderson comprise the committee. The cornerstone will be laid on the northeast corner of the structure. The ceremony promises to be largely attended, particularly by Marquette people, although special rates on the railroads will bring many people in from other parts of the county.

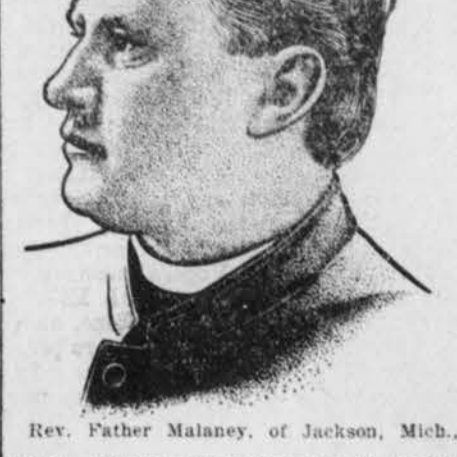
