The United Kingdom still leads in aggregate commerce, the total being, \$3,573,000,000. The United States comes next with exports and imports amounting to \$2,258,000,000 and Germany is third with \$2,254,000,000. In relative growth in the last thirty years, however, the United States distances its great competitors. The increase has been 178 per cent, while that of the United Kingdom has been 62 per cent and that of Germany 60 per cent. Some of the smaller countries have made even greater gains than those credited to the United States; the Netherlands, for example, with a percentage of 345 and a total more than half that of the United States. Japan's foreign trade has grown from \$15,000,000 in 1870 to \$250,-000,000, and Canada's has advanced from \$147,000,000 to \$423,000,000.

Roderick, chief of the state bureau of mines, issued toay, shows that the total production of anthracite coal last year was 36,911,-551 tons, a decrease of 22,994,400 tons ompared with the production for 1901. due to the five and a half months strike. To mine this coal, 300 lives were lost and 561 men were injured out of a total of 148,141 men employed. In 1901, working full time, 513 men were killed and

The total production of bituminous coal last year was 98,947,170 tons, an increase over the previous year of 18,-032,934 tons. The report also shows: oal regions, 135,386, an increase of 17,-784 compared with 1901; persons killed 456, an increase of 156; injured, 861, an increase of 202.

There were 14,741,091 tons of coke produced in the state last year.
