The entire side of the mountain was removed by the disturbance, and milbuildings and the mine entrances were buried under a pile of debris, in some places hundreds of feet deep. A dozen houses in the village were buried under the rock. The roofs were crushed like eggshells, and every one inside perished. All the men working at the mine on outside work were instantly killed. The exact number is not known, the records of the office being buried under an imnense pile of broken rock.

Men in the Workings Entombed.

The eighteen or twenty men who worked in the shaft are imprisoned by days to dig through the pile of rock and is not likely that even their dead bodies will be recovered for two or three weeks.

No attempt to compile a list of the lead has been made. The people of the town are panic-stricken, as the mountrees and early vegetation. tain is still scattering rock and no one knows how soon the disaster may be dudicated. The surviving inhabitants are livided between a desire to stay and a place of safety before they are overshelmed by a greater calamity.
