



CONTRACT LABOR ABOLISHED IN ILLINOIS PRISONS.

EIGHT-HOUR DAY PROVIDED FOR

CONVICTS WILL MAKE ARTICLES

Other Legislation Enacted Prohibits Child Employment in Some Lines of Work and Effectually Regulates It in Other Branches,

Springfield, Ills., May 8.—David Ross ecretary of the Illinois state bureau of labor statistics, today declared that the law just enacted by the Illinois general assembly regarding convict labor is the most advanced legislation of the kind anywhere of record. It becomes effective July 1, 1904. It abolishes contract labor and provides for the emdoyment of convicts, not to exceed eight hours per day, in the manufacture of articles used by the state and the various political divisions thereof. It is substantially a duplicate of the meastrial commission.

The legislature also enacted a new law prohibiting the employment of children under fourteen in certain lines of occu pation. The act specifically provides employed at any gainful occupation more nore than eight hours in any day, and neither shall children under sixteen be employed at occupations which involve Ventura.

ISHPEMING ORATORY WINS.

Marquette Loses the Debate on Unanimous Decision by the Judges.

The debate last evening between the eams representing the Ishpeming and Marquette High schools resulted in a victory for the local orators. The de ision of the judges was unanimous.

The question argued was, "Resolved that the United States and the several states should establish and maintain ourts for the compulsory adjustment of disputes between corporations operating under franchises of a public nature, and their employers." Marquette had he affirmative.

Ishpeming was represented by George Erickson, Thomas Clancey and Elizabeth arlyon. The Queen City debaters were Nathan Akerman, Homer Pearce and John T. Mackey. Hon, H. O. Young resided, and Frank A. Bell of Negaunee rosecuting attorney of Marquette coun y: Professor Elmer D. Grant of the Michigan College of Mines, Houghton and Oscar J. Larsen of Calumet, prose uting attorney of Houghton county cted as the judges.

The conditions governing the conteswere that the question should be con trued reasonably, according to the con text and the dictionary meaning of th vords, and the judges were instructe to render their decision on the followin two points: First, the convincingne of the arguments themselves, and, second on the manner of presentation.

The average markings of the debater on the affirmative side were figured by the judges at 264 on the first point, an 257 on the second, making a total of Ishpeming's standings were 278 and 283, respectively, a total of 561 and with a fresh coat of paint, an advantage over Marquette of forty

The debate, which took place in the auditorium of the high school, was at tended by a very large assemblage, of whom about seventy were Marquette people. The arguments on each side were strong and showed evidence of careful reparation. Much enthusiasm was maniested. Several selections were rendered n pleasing manner by the high school






