### BRINGS PEACE TO OMAHA.

Agreement to Settle the Strike by Ar-  
bitration Is Reached.

Omaha, May 8.—At a conference this  
afternoon between Governor Mickey and  
representatives of the business associa-  
tion and labor unions, a plan of arbitra-  
tion was reached. A committee of five,  
with the governor as chairman, will  
act as arbitrators. The committee will  
be agreed upon tomorrow.

President Crews of the Teamsters' union  
again spent the entire day among  
other unions existing their sym-  
pathies to go on strike if that is necessary  
to help the present strikers and he met  
with general success. Business through-  
out the wholesale district is at a stand-  
still.

### Railroad Strike in Australia.

Melbourne, May 8.—A strike involving  
eleven thousand men employed on state-  
owned railroads in Victoria was inaugu-  
rated at midnight, resulting from a dis-  
pute between the government and the  
employees regarding the right of the latter  
to affiliate themselves with trades  
unions.

### Chicago Laundry Workers Win Out.

Chicago, May 8.—Twenty-three mem-  
bers of the Laundry Owners' association  
today broke away from the organization  
and signed the peace demanded by the  
strikers. In consequence the other mem-  
bers agreed to arbitrate the differences  
with their employes.

### Beloit (Wis.) Machinists Out.

Beloit, Wis., May 8.—Three hundred  
machinists at the Berlin Machine works  
trucked today for a nine-hour day, an  
increase in wages and recognition of the  
union.

### AMERICANS BETTER OFF.

Senator Scott Compares Conditions Here  
With Those in Europe.

Paris, May 8.—Senator Scott of West  
Virginia is here after visiting Egypt,  
Turkey, Italy and Germany, making a  
study of the conditions of the European  
working classes, compared with the  
American working people, and also mak-  
ing an investigation of the equipment  
and condition of European soldiers, com-  
pared with Americans. Senator Scott  
is convinced the American workers "have  
higher wages and better homes, food and  
clothing and more of all the material  
comforts than the average middle class  
in Europe and are immeasurably better  
off than the working classes of Europe."

Senator Scott also considers the Amer-  
ican troops better from every point of  
view than those of Europe, particularly  
in education and general intelligence.

### A TRUST IN PEANUTS.

Michigan Capitalists in a Deal to Control  
the Industry.

Cincinnati, May 8.—The Confectioners'  
Review today says that a Michigan un-  
derwriting company has completed a  
combine of the peanut industry, that the  
American Edible Nut company will soon  
be incorporated in New Jersey with a  
capital of four millions and that it will  
absorb eighteen plants near Norfolk, Va.  
The yearly output within eighty miles  
of Norfolk is five million bushels.

### TELEGRAPHERS ASK INJUNCTION.

Want Western Union Enjoined from Dis-  
charging Members of the Union.

St. Louis, May 8.—The Commercial  
Telegraphers' Union of America today  
filed a petition in the federal court, ask-  
ing Judge Adams to issue an injunction  
restraining the Western Union Tele-  
graph company from discharging mem-  
bers of the union.

## Ishpeming and its Environs.

### ISHPEMING ORATORY WINS.

Marquette Loses the Debate on Unanimous Decision by the Judges.

The debate last evening between the teams representing the Ishpeming and Marquette High schools resulted in a victory for the local orators. The decision of the judges was unanimous.

The question argued was, "Resolved, that the United States and the several states should establish and maintain courts for the compulsory adjustment of disputes between corporations operating under franchises of a public nature, and their employers." Marquette had the affirmative.

Ishpeming was represented by George Erickson, Thomas Clancy and Elizabeth Carlyon. The Queen City debaters were Nathan Akerman, Homer Pearce and John T. Mackey. Hon. H. O. Young presided, and Frank A. Bell of Negaunee, prosecuting attorney of Marquette county; Professor Elmer D. Grant of the Michigan College of Mines, Houghton, and Oscar J. Larsen of Calumet, prosecuting attorney of Houghton county, acted as the judges.

The conditions governing the contest were that the question should be construed reasonably, according to the context and the dictionary meaning of the words, and the judges were instructed to render their decision on the following two points: First, the convincingness of the arguments themselves, and second, on the manner of presentation.

The average markings of the debaters on the affirmative side were figured by the judges at 264 on the first point, and 257 on the second, making a total of 521. Ishpeming's standings were 278 and 283, respectively, a total of 561 and an advantage over Marquette of forty points.

The debate, which took place in the auditorium of the high school, was attended by a very large assemblage, of whom about seventy were Marquette people. The arguments on each side were strong and showed evidence of careful preparation. Much enthusiasm was manifested. Several selections were rendered in pleasing manner by the high school orchestra.

The debate was highly commended by Mr. Larson, who declared it equal to any he had ever heard.

### DEATH OF MISS PERRAULT.

Miss Seraphine Perrault died yesterday afternoon after a very brief illness. She was home Sunday from Marquette, where she was employed as a clerk at Watson & Palmer's dry goods store, and went back the same evening. At that time she appeared to be in usual health, but Tuesday she was taken ill and came home. Her case was not considered very serious until Thursday, when the malady was diagnosed as peritonitis.

Miss Perrault was twenty-three years of age and had spent her entire life in Ishpeming. For a number of years she was a clerk in the dry goods department at Sellwood's, leaving there two years ago to take the position at Marquette, which she held at the time of her death. She had an unusually large number of friends, who held her in the highest esteem. The deceased was a member of the Alpena society and the Clerks' union. The funeral will be held Monday morning at 9 o'clock from St. Joseph's church.

### FIRE IN A PAINT SHOP.

Eman & Swanson's paint shop was the scene of considerable excitement yesterday afternoon. A little fire was discovered in the loft near the chimney and the smoke came out between the shingles, so that the entire roof appeared to be on fire. The department was on hand in a very short time and soon had a couple of streams of water at work, putting out the blaze in short order. The damage to the building is not very great, and is entirely covered by insurance. Some of the wall paper stored on the first floor was injured a little by water. People hastened to the fire from all parts of the town, and a good-sized crowd was assembled in front of the building.

### LOST FINGERS.

August Murray met with a painful accident a few days ago that cost him the loss of the thumb and parts of two fingers of his right hand. He was working at the Lake Superior carpenter shop, when his hand came into contact with a saw. Mr. Murray lost nearly all the fingers on his other hand in a similar accident last June, so that his last misfortune leaves him hardly crippled.

GOOD DELIVERY PROMISED ON STREET RAILWAY EQUIPMENT.

WILL BE HERE WITHIN SEVEN WEEKS

AMERICAN CAR CO. OF ST. LOUIS TO BUILD THE NEW CARS.

General Electric Company Will Furnish the Generator and Motors—N. M. Kaufman and Peter White a Special Committee.

N. M. Kaufman and Peter White, appointed by the directors of the Marquette City & Presque Isle Street Railway company a special committee to let the contracts for the new equipment for the local traction line, have completed their special duties, and the manufacturers are even now engaged in work on the new cars, the motors and the new generator. The cars will be manufactured by the American Car company of St. Louis and the motors and generator by the General Electric company of Schenectady, N. Y. Delivery in each instance has been promised within seven weeks, so that within two months or so, at the outside, the company should be thoroughly equipped with new cars and abundant power to operate them. The contract for the proposed new feed wire, and the electrical incidentals went to the General Electric people, along with that for the generator and motors. The companies to whom the respective contracts were awarded are among the best in the country, and the new equipment will be the finest on the market. The motors will be shipped to St. Louis for installation in the cars there, the American Car company only contracting to furnish the car bodies. The motors are installed when the work on the cars is but little advanced.

Messrs. White and Kaufman gave their personal attention to the matter of closing contracts for the equipment, and they played hard for every advantage, particularly in regard to delivery. In securing such favorable terms in this respect they were very fortunate indeed, as it was generally commented, when the announcement of the road's decision to thoroughly equip the line with new appliances was made, that the summer would be pretty well spent before the new rolling stock and generator could be received. However, by bringing pressure to bear and stating their case strongly, Messrs. White and Kaufman obtained exceptional terms from the manufacturers.

The cars that will be delivered here will be the best turned out of the American Car company's shops to date, and they, with the increased generating capacity, will give Marquette a street railway without a peer in the small cities of the Northwest. They will be twenty-four foot cars, finely finished and furnished. Their appearance will be stylish and attractive to a degree. Five of the cars are to be closed, the sixth open, and they are all to be equipped with motors, two apiece, each of forty horsepower, or eighty horsepower to a car. There will be a sufficient number of new cars for the complete operation of the system for all ordinary business, and except during the holiday and Sunday rushes they will be the only cars seen on the line. On special occasions the old rolling stock will be pressed into service to handle the crowds, and there is enough of it to afford expeditions service, particularly as there is to be an abundance of electricity to operate the motors. In all, the company will have some eighteen cars at its command.

The road's business is now being conducted by A. F. Koepeke, assistant to the treasurer, I. G. Kaufman. He has an office in the National Bank building, with entrance on Spring street.

### SCHOOL NOTES.

Grounds at the New High School to Be Graded at Once. The school trustees this week fixed the salaries of the teachers in the high school at figures which are expected to be satisfactory to members of the corps, increases of \$10 per month being granted all around. The positions of all the teachers are open to them for another year, if they desire to remain here, and it is expected that there will be little or no change in the present corps.

The board has decided to go ahead with the grading and improvement of the premises of the manual training and new high schools, and Peter White was appointed a committee of one to look after it. He discussed the matter yesterday with Street Commissioner French, and he has arranged to have the work undertaken at once. It will begin Monday, and will be completed as soon as possible, so as to have things ready at an early date for the seeding and sodding. The grounds at the school are now in substantially the same condition as when building operations ceased, and are badly in need of the proposed improvement. When the sod is well advanced and green, the grounds will present a highly attractive appearance.

The board has authorized Mr. Brace, who has been engaged as head of the manual training department that is to be started next year, to buy the necessary equipment and machinery, and he will go below to make the purchase directly on the conclusion of his school year at Janesville, where he is now the head of the manual training department in that city. The initial expenditures for the new department will be in the neighborhood of \$2,000, the donation of two Marquette men, made when the project was first broached two years or so ago. The members of the board look with favor on the manual training work, and they show an inclination to fit up the department in a first class manner.
