



It was liberal and impartial in it pplause, greeting the visitors heartily nd listening to them with the same onsideration they extended to the hom team. The line of argument was fol lowed and grasped intelligently cleathrough from the opening speech til Miss Carlyon closed the case for the negative. Each speaker occupied the entire fifteen minutes alloted to him and it is a testimony to the excellence of the lebate that interest never flagged dur ing the whole ninety minutes, unre ieved by any break in the continuou resentation of fact and argument.

Even a prejudiced person would b mistake in their award. Ishpemine superior to the opposing team no nly in the points on which the de on was made, but in almost ever ther respect that might be named. I lear grasp of the subject and logical levelopment of the arguments Marquette was easily outclassed.

Mr. Ackerman opened the debate, outlining the position of the affirmative. He defined the application of the ques tion, calling attention to the clause that the courts of compulsory adjustment should apply only to corporations op erating under franchises of a public nature and their employes. He selected railroads and street railways as the best examples of such corporations and dwelt at great length on the great injury wrought by great railway strikes. The only common ground on which cap ital and labor meet is that of sordid self interest; the interests of the public are disregarded. Labor unions disregard promises and are irresponsible Railroads are the creatures of the state and it is the duty of the government to have compulsory regulation of dis putes, because public opinion is not strong enough to bring about the deired reform. Mr. Ackerman quoted extensively from the reports of various

labor commissions and authorities in support of his claims. George Erickson spoke first for the egative. He said that since the affirative had failed to set up any arguents to be refuted the necessity was ighting. He set up a great array of nestions that he challenged his oppo ents to answer, asking them to prove he necessity of compulsory adjustment its practicability, its possibility in the ace of American thought and custom. He demanded that they prove its expediency and show that the innovation vould be politic. He asked that they outline the constitution and make ur of the proposed court. He required the ffirmative to suggest a method of reoving the legal difficulties that lie in ie path of the new scheme, to set forth ne basis of awards, how long they were hold good and how they would be uforced. He elaborated points showing that in each there was partial refutation to the claims of the affirmative. The freedom of the laborer would be impaired by any system of compulsion. strikes are often quiet withdrawals and he federal constitution insures the right any employe to leave the service of s employer without incurring criminal ponsibility. 



Chief Jackson Plans Changes in the Fire Department

Chief Jackson expects to introduce ome changes in the methods of the fire epartment that will result in much bet er service, besides being of much benefit the members. Among other things intends to improve the system of ignals, which is now unreliable and fremently misleading. At present fire larms are turned in to headquarters. the bell is rung violently the whistle at the water works plows and general onfusion and excitement prevails. The serson who sends in the alarm and the ne who receives it at the hose house probably know where the fire is located but the team starts out as soon as the first few men arrive at the hose house. eaving no one there to inform those who ome later where their services are needed. As a result only a handfull of men crive at the scene of the fire promptly; he rest come straggling along when they have succeeded in gaining their bearngs. If the fire is of any size a large

orce is needed to fight it at the start, lse disastrous results, that might easily have been prevented, are almost sure to ensue. The chief proposes to remedy the lefect in the present method by adopting a fixed system of signals so that a epeated at short intervals, will tell ex- tended. actly in what portion of the city the blaze is located. This could be easily aranged by having a different signal for ach ward.

A system of electric fire alarms would uestion if there is any necessity for it. he town is not so large but that a simler and much less expensive method could serve all present needs. Fires of serious nature are of very infrequent curance, anyway, and the department s given pretty good evidence that it an handle almost any blaze that is caable of being quenched, if only the darm is given with a reasonable prompt


