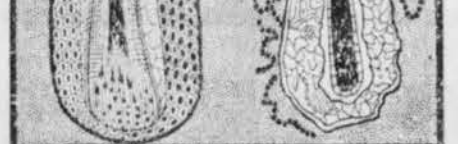

### ON DECORATION DAY

FINE PROGRAM OF SPORTS WILL BE GIVEN AT FAIR GROUNDS.

HORSE RACES WILL BE ARRANGED

PROCEEDS WILL GO TO IMPROVEMENT OF TRACK AND DIAMOND.

Upwards of \$1,000 Will Have to Be Spent on the Work—Public Must Help On Materially With Raising This Money.

The directors of the Marquette County Agricultural association met last week and decided to hang up \$2,000 in purses for the races to be held in conjunction with the annual county fair, the dates for which are this year September 1, 2, 3 and 4. This is the largest amount in purses that has ever been offered by the Agricultural association, and it should be effective in attracting a fine field of horses to Marquette.

The directors likewise decided to undertake extensive improvements at the track and grounds, appointing as a special committee to look after this work J. D. Mangum, Joe Pay and M. W. Shea. It is planned to practically rebuild the track, which has been in very poor condition in recent years, and to put in a first class base ball diamond. Ed Swan, who is driving Shea's Texas Jessie, and who has had considerable experience at the work, will superintend the rebuilding of the track. It is likely that a mixture of cinders and clay will be used on it. The committee is now figuring with the South Shore for the delivery of about fifty carloads of the latter material. The baseball diamond will be fixed up the first thing. It will be laid out so that the catcher will stand directly beneath the grandstand, making it available for use by the spectators. Considerable grading will be required, but when the projected improvements are finished the grounds will be in very satisfactory condition.

Program for Decoration Day. These improvements will cost money, a good deal of money, and the directors have planned a program of sports for Decoration Day, the proceeds to be applied toward the expense of putting the track and baseball field in condition, which will be in the neighborhood of \$1,000.

Marquette horsemen who are the possessors of animals with any pretense to speed will be urged to begin working them in preparation for entry in a program of local races, four or five events,

which will be pulled off for the entertainment of the Decoration Day crowd. The affair will be a little family matinee, as it were, and as the horses will not be marked there need be no hesitancy on the part of local owners to enter their animals. It is anticipated that there will be a general response to this invitation to help the association out. It is proposed to get along without cash prizes, cups and medals being offered the winners.

In addition to the racing there will likely be a baseball game between the Marquette team and the strongest outside nine that can be brought here for the game. There may also be a lacrosse game, if the newly organized team is in condition to play at that date. The admission price is proposed to fix at twenty-five cents, and the great amount of sport that will be offered for that nominal sum should attract one of the largest crowds of the season. The day, as usual, will be observed as a general holiday, and people will be casting about for just such amusement as will be offered at the fair grounds.

Fine Race a Possibility. It is not impossible that one of the features of the program will be a race between two of the fastest horses that have ever been driven in the north country. A few days ago the owners of Ella Ola, the Houghton flyer, challenged M. W. Shea for a race with his speedy mare, Texas Jessie, for a purse of \$1,000 a side the event to be pulled off whenever and wherever Mr. Shea pleased. Asked yesterday what he thought of this proposition of the Houghton parties, Mr. Shea said that he would be willing, conditionally on his driver, Ed Swan, pronouncing Texas Jessie fit, to race his horse against Ella Ola on Decoration Day here for a side bet of \$500. Mr. Shea said, however, that he would race only for this side bet, as he did not feel that he would be justified in asking the Agricultural society directors for any portion of the gate receipts. If the owners of Ella Ola are ready to arrange the details of a \$500 race it appears, therefore, that they can be accommodated on demand. Any such event as a loana file race between these two fine horses would bring thousands of people to the fair grounds.

However, irrespective of the result of the negotiations between the owners of Ella Ola and Jessie, the public owes to the Decoration Day program a cordial support.

The funeral of Mrs. Conrad Yungbluth was held Saturday morning, being largely attended. A good sized 15-penning delegation was present at the services. A. J. Yungbluth, a son of the deceased, being wellknown in that city.

A Menominee dispatch says that Judge J. W. Stone and Dr. B. T. Phillips and B. J. Brown of Menominee have taken steps to have organized an Ohio society of the upper peninsula, it to include all the prominent citizens of this region who were originally citizens of Ohio.

Hereafter on Sundays the South Shore will offer special rates to anglers who desire to go east of the city to the various wellknown fishing grounds. The special rates will prevail for points as far east as Croighton, and between Marquette county points and that station are to be found some fine trout streams from which big catches are made each year. The special rates were first in effect yesterday, when a considerable delegation of anglers went to various points down the line.

William A. Ross, chairman of the committee on amusements for the county fair, announces that he has engaged Professor Martin for the balloon ascensions, which will be a feature again this year. Mr. Martin was here two years ago, giving fine exhibitions. This year he is shot from a cannon in midair, then making a parachute drop to earth, the act being singularly thrilling. Mr. Ross has likewise closed arrangements with Monsieur Dubee, who has a monkey, dog and cat show, said to be one of the cleverest entertainments of the kind on the road.
