COPPERS QUIET. Volume of Transactions Very Small—A Bear Raid in New York.

Paine, Webber & Co. said of the Boston market: "A bear raid in the New York market was the explanation of the weakness in the general market today. Within a day or two these bears will probably be bulls again and working for a rally upon which to sell. It is a trader's market and nothing more. Copper sold down sharply in London at the opening and made only a partial recovery at the close. SCHOLARSHIP MEMORIAL FUND.

It Will Be Established by the High School Class of 1903.

The class of 1903 of the high school has about completed plans for establishing a scholarship memorial fund. The scholarship will be awarded each year to the graduate holding the highest rank in his class, for the purpose of providing means with which to attend a university. The special object of the fund is to give an opportunity of attending college to deserving students who would otherwise be deprived from continuing their education. The plan has not yet been worked out in detail and it has not been decided whether to specify the particular school that the recipient of the scholarship shall attend further than that it shall be a state university. The amount of the fund and the method by which it shall be invested have yet to be determined. DID NOT TAKE THE FISH.

Richard Trembath Discharged on Trial Before Justice Kennedy.

The case of Richard Trembath and Andrew Johnson, who were arrested for taking trout with a net, was tried before Justice Kennedy yesterday and resulted in the discharge of both the accused parties. The facts as developed at the trial gave the affair an entirely different aspect from that in which it had first been regarded.

It appears that Trembath and Johnson went to Humboldt Sunday to look over a piece of land near there that Mr. Trembath had acquired last winter. It was not the principal purpose of either of the men to attempt to take any fish, but Johnson, being provided with tackle, put his line in a stream and pulled up a part of a fish net. There were no trout in the net though it contained a few fish of other varieties. Johnson cut several slashes in the net with his knife, rendering it useless, and left it otherwise undisturbed. The man who entered the complaint happened to be near by and evidently did not wait to make inquiries or investigations, but searched out the game warden when he came back to town and gave the officer a very much distorted account of the occurrence. The man was not able to sustain his accusations or show that either Trembath or Johnson were guilty of any offense so the defendants were dismissed and the case discharged soon after the testimony was given. Attorney H. O. Young appeared for the defendants.

MUST OBEY THE ORDINANCE.

Marshal Says He Will Enforce Prohibition Against Use of Firearms.

The marshal and the police officers are on the look out for all violators of the ordinance prohibiting the use of firearms within the city limits. Numerous complaints have been made lately about the reckless shooting that has been going on in the vicinity of Mud lake. A number of persons who are presumed to be too young to know better have been keeping up almost a constant fire with rifles and shotguns over in that direction for the past few days. People have begun to fear that there may be a repetition of the tragedy of last fall, when a woman was instantly killed by a spent bullet fired in the city limits. The marshal desires that anyone who possesses information of offending parties should report to the police.

The ordinance in regard to the use of firearms is very explicit. It says: "No person shall fire or discharge any cannon, gun, fowling piece, pistol, revolver, air gun or firearms of any description within the corporate limits of the city of Ishpeeming without first having obtained a written license signed by the mayor and recorder of said city, which license shall limit the time of such firing and shall be subject to be revoked by the mayor or common council at any time after it has been granted." Violators are liable to a fine ranging from \$5 to \$100 or ninety days in the county jail, or both fine and imprisonment.
