

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

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

NEW HIGH RECORDS ARE MADE IN NEW YORK MARKET.

SCENE ON THE FLOOR IS ONE OF GREAT DISORDER.

Dealings Are on an Enormous Scale and Profits of Bull Clique Greatly Increase as the Panic-Stricken Bears Frantically Cover.

New York, May 14.—Another new record for cotton was established today; in fact, many of the older members agreed change situation. it was doubtful if any season in the entire history of the exchange compared with today's. The big feature was the price-11 cents-made by July in the last half hour of the trading. At the same time August sold at 10.73, May made a new record at 11.42 and spot was quoted at 11.60. These prices were the highest in twelve or thirteen years.

The transactions were of an enormous volume. At times the scene of the floor was one of the greatest disorder, and the rush of the covering demand threw the pit into a demoralized condition. At the opening the trading was by far the most active of the season and on the upward rush May sold at 11.40 cents. July at 10.99 and August at 10.67, all

Some of those who were short even brought some cotton! back from Liverpool, and it is understood that several larger lots have been sent on here from points in New England, secured from mill men and dealers

At the present market price, about five million dollars' worth of actual cotton will thus change hands here during the closing deal in this May option. The profits of the bull clique are now estimated at about ten to twelve millions.




