STRIKE AT BRIDGEPORT.

MOST OF THEM NON-UNION MOTOR MEN AND CONDUCTORS.

Attempt to Operate Railway Is Frustrated and Crowd Only Disperses When Firemen Bring Stream of Water Into Play.

Bridgeport, Conn., May 17 .- An at empt on the part of the street car comany to run cars today resulted in mot ciolence. At least fifteen persons were njured, among them twelve strike reakers-imported motormen and con-

A mob of at least a thousand surcounded the cars and the deputy sheriffs were powerless. They seized one man who had thrown stones, but Mayor Mulvihill ordered the deputy sheriffs and the policemen who had gone to their assistance to let the fellow go. During the argument the man escaped. Stones were flying thick and fast and the mayor nimself was struck on the head and painfully hurt. The deputy sheriffs began firing their revolvers in the air and the crowd fell back enough to allow the cars to be taken to the barns.

Firemen Take a Hand,

In front of the barns a crowd of 4,000 oon gathered and violence again broke out. The barns were pelted with stones, bricks and sticks. Mayor Mulvihill then ordered out the fire company to disperse the mob. The engine company soon had a stream playing into the crowd, and the mob finally dispersed. In addition to the trolley men injured. Roadmaster Davis of the trolley company was struck on the head by a stone and severely hurt. Deputy Sheriffs Plumb and O'Hendri were also painfully nurt, being struck at least a dozen times



With the exception of a few feet at the botom, where clay was encountered, it was sunk through quicksand of the most treacherous kind. Work was started April I and was carried on without a stop till the bottom was reached, the men working in three shifts, with four in each shift. The achievement is a notable one and will undoubtedly be far reaching in its results, for it seems certain that the new invention will revolutionize the present methods of sinking

Mr. Hoar and his partners will soon ndertake the organization of a company hich will contract to sink any kind of owners the exclusive use of the device and steps will be taken at once to have it fully patented. The model was found to work successfully in almost every detail and but few changes will be made in the steel model now to be built. Mr. Billings expects to leave for the Mesaba range this week to take part in he formation of the company. The eadquarters of the firm will be estabished at Hibbing, near which place the nodel will be used to sink another shaft.

A number of offers have been received and the company will have no difficulty in securing all the contracts it can han Mr. Billings says that mining op erations are very active in the vicinity of Hibbing. Many diamond drills are engaged in searching for ore.


