FINE ATTRACTION

M. W. SHEA HAS JUST ENGAGED IT FOR COUNTY FAIR.

MAN WILL BRING RUNNING HORSES

ONE OF THEM, T. H. McNUTT, RACES WITHOUT DRIVER.

He Scores and Starts Alone and Usually Wins His Race—Other Running Races—Preparations for Memorial Day Program.

M. W. Shea, chairman for the racing that is to be a part of the county fair program on the 2nd, 3rd and 4th of September, has just closed a contract with Albie Wooster, of Westfield, Wis., for one of the best track attractions that has ever been brought to the north country. Wooster owns a string of five fine pedigreed running horses, with all kinds of speed, which he races at county and state fairs throughout the country, and which command a big price. They will be brought here at a large expense, but the fair officers feel that the increased business that the attraction will draw will justify it. Wooster's horses include T. H. McNutt, one of the most intelligent animals that has ever stepped on a track, this fact being evidenced by the horse's ability to run and even win races without a rider. McNutt scores alone, but never starts unless the rest of the field is well up. If the field is rang back the horse turns, gets back to place and tries again. The exhibition is said to be one of the most interesting ever seen on any track and it will be a distinct novelty here. Besides the race in which McNutt runs, Wooster puts on other races in which his other mounts participate. He carries his own jockeys, but the local officials are at liberty, if they so desire and if they have capable boys handy, to replace them with riders of their own choice. Wooster's races, while of course not for blood, are strictly on their merits, and the horses are always ridden out.

The fair association is this year offering \$2,000 in prizes for the track events, the largest amount ever hung up here. In the free for all the purse is \$500, said to be the largest amount offered for any regularly arranged race on the upper peninsula. The program for the three days' meet, as announced by Chairman Shea, is as follows: Wednesday, Sept. 2—2:12 class, trot or pace, purse, \$300 Two running races, \$100 —Thursday, Sept. 3—2:18 class, trot or pace, \$300 2:35 class, trot or pace, \$100 Two running races, \$100 —Friday, Sept. 4—2:25 class, trot or pace, \$300

Free for all..... 500 Running race..... 150 It is the expectation that the track will be in first class condition by fair time. The committee to which was entrusted the task of preparing it for the season's racing is now waiting on the South Shore road for figures on handling the clay that will be needed for the improvement. It is probable that the material will be hauled in soon after they are received. It is likely that stretches of the track and the baseball diamond will be repaired before Decoration Day, when a program of sports will be pulled off there for the benefit of the track repair fund. The committee urges that Marquette horsemen get their drivers out and work them in preparation for taking part in the program. It is essential that a general interest be taken in the day's sport if the track is to be put in first class condition.

PARDON FOR M'KINDER.

He Is Now a Lifer in Marquette Branch of State Prison. A movement is on foot to secure a pardon for Edward McKinder, of New Lothrop, near Owosso, who was sent to Marquette prison four years ago by Judge Smith for a murderous assault on his wife. The board of pardons was in session last week in New Lothrop with Colonel John Northwood, who has interested himself in McKinder's behalf. McKinder's wife was a domestic four years ago in the home of County Clerk J. N. Martin, at Valley Mills. She had parted with her husband because of his drunkenness and cruelty and refused to live with him. He had often tried to get her to live with him and one day called on her to renew his petitions. She refused to step outside the house and he stepped in and followed her to a bedroom. Incensed at her refusal to leave and go with him, McKinder drew a revolver and shot her. Then he fled from the house threatening to shoot Mr. Martin as he passed. In a clump of bushes McKinder attempted to take his own life, but was prevented. In the circuit court, McKinder pleaded guilty to assault with intent to commit murder and was sent to Marquette for life. Mrs. McKinder is opposed to a pardon, fearing that McKinder will yet murder her.
