TWO TONS OF SPECIMENS. Mineral Exhibit Men Did Well on the Gogebic Range.

Irving J. Shields of Hancock, superintendent in charge of the Michigan mineral exhibit for the St. Louis World's Fair, returned yesterday morning from the Gogebic iron range, where he and his assistant, Coburn Standish of Detroit, have been collecting ore samples and specimens for the past ten days.

Although some missionary work has been done in the copper country in the interest of the exhibit, the actual work of securing the copper display has not yet been started.

He stated, however, that Mr. Farwell, the Michigan commissioner who is directing the work in this state, has been greatly handicapped by lack of funds, while Montana and Arizona are not troubled in that respect.

The copper country exhibit will consist of rock and copper specimens from the different mines and from private collections; models of shaft and rock houses; shafts and mine buildings; also photographs showing the different processes in the treatment of the red metal.

A well-known mining man said yesterday that some apathy exists locally as to the work under way, probably arising from the fact that valuable specimens loaned by mining companies and private individuals for the Chicago World's Fair exhibit were not returned in good condition.

McKenzie & Foley opened their handsome new saloon in the new Foley block on Sheldon street, Houghton, for business yesterday. As soon as all of the fixtures are in place a grand opening will be held.

Thomas Duffy, superintendent of the Portage Coal & Dock company's coal docks at Ripley, opposite Houghton, was painfully injured while looking over the machinery in one of the hoisting towers on the docks late Wednesday afternoon.

Fred Francis, head carpenter for the Copper Range Railroad company, was painfully injured while supervising construction work on the street railway trestle that the Copper Range and Mineral Range roads are building over their tracks on the street railway branch from Albion to Centennial, Wednesday.

Superintendent of Public Works Foley of Houghton said yesterday that he did not turn off the water supply from the homes and places of business of some of the consumers last Monday, as he threatened to do, because the delinquents are coming around nicely with money to square up their old accounts.

GAVE INTERESTING TALK.
Dr. James Makes Short Address Before High School Students.

Dr. S. M. James gave an interesting address before the pupils at the high school Wednesday afternoon. He talked for thirty minutes on the general subject of physiology, hygiene and kindred topics and was attentively listened to, the lecture containing much information that was new to its auditors and being of little value from an instructive standpoint.

A feature of the talk was that portion which related to narcotics. Speaking of alcoholic beverages, the doctor said their use was not without benefit when properly controlled, and that for some medicinal purposes they were particularly advantageous. However, alcohol is not a food, but a stimulant, with great potentialities for evil. One of its greatest dangers lies in its effect in thickening the albuminoids, hardening the tissues and interfering with the peptic glands of the stomach.

The doctor in general deprecated the use of tobacco, which he said caused irritability of the heart and was disastrous to youthful organisms, stunting growth and having like evil consequences. He mentioned the fact that at Yale statistics of the effect of tobacco on members of the senior class had been taken for the past eight years. These have shown that the non-users of tobacco average 20 per cent taller and 25 per cent heavier than the others, while their breathing capacity is 65 per cent greater.

The danger in using cocaine, morphine and chloral was pointed out, while to many organisms the effect of tea and coffee was very harmful. Tea and coffee each contain practically the same amount of caffeine, and each are markedly stimulating. As far as nutritive elements are concerned, coffee has greater value than tea; it is less irritating and is generally safer.

The speaker laid particular stress on diet as a mission in preserving health, and in this connection spoke strongly of the merits of cereal foods. These he said were rich in proteides and added much in building up the cells and tissues. He recommended the more general use of wool as the best fabric for clothing, and on the question of ventilation dwelled strongly of the necessity of fresh air at night as well as day. Lung trouble, he said, is often caused by imperfect ventilation, while for sedentary lives there is nothing more beneficial than a systematic exercise of the lungs.

Dr. James is a thorough believer in the copious use of water, both internally and externally, and in his opinion the more pure water drank the better it is for humanity.

CURLERS AT SEA.
Do Not Know Whether They Will Be Able to Use the "Stanes" This Year.

The handful of Marquette curlers are more or less at sea as to the outlook for the season's sport, although it is now time to be planning for making ice and other preparations for the campaign which the "stones." It is not set- tled whether or not the game will be followed here this year, although it has been one of the winter pastimes for three seasons past. One thing is said to be about settled, namely, that there will be no rink at the old Polygonal works, out on West Washington street, this winter. The owners are averse to again renting it for rink purposes, thinking that the damage to the structure amounts to more than the rental. This would seem to stick the curlers and lovers of other ice sports, but they have not yet given up hope and one or two plans from which something may come for providing an ice surface, at least for curling, are under consideration. The Polygonal works served well both for curling and an ice rink and might be used again this year with success could the structure be rented. Although the building is very remote from the central part of the city yet a sufficient number of people patronized it last winter to give it favorable balance at the close of the season.

There has been some desultory discussion of a rink down town, but there is little reason to hope that anything will come of it. Everyone is agreed that such a rink would be a very desirable thing but no one is able to suggest a source for the money necessary for its erection. It would cost a great deal in a manner to make it permanent, and there are no philanthropists in the city who manifest any inclination of putting their money into any such venture. It really looks as if there might be no skating, curling or any other ice sports here this winter.

MORE IMPROVEMENT.
It Was Characteristic of the Boston Market Yesterday.

Paine, Webber & Co. said of the Boston market:
"The market has shown steady improvement today and the selling at the higher prices has not been heavy. Traders are generally working for a further rally and the chances favor further advances in the morning. We do not look for a prolonged upward movement and we think that on sharp rallies above this level stocks should be sold. The metal exchange quoted copper down a quarter of a cent, to 13%, today. The London metal market was steady. We understand that the decision of the Montana supreme court on the Amalgamated case may come Monday."

Hayden, Stone & Co. wired W. H. Laidley & Co. "Coppers were stronger and on any signs of activity in New York our market will improve. Stocks are strongly held and can be advanced very quickly. We believe Mohawk Copper Range, Osceola and Utah are held by people who will advance the market at the first chance. It is reported that Osceola will pay \$1.50 next month."

Tone Somewhat Bullish.
The Hadden-Rodee New York letter was as follows:
"There was a much better feeling around the street at the close today. Notwithstanding the highly professional character of the market it presents aspects that are very encouraging. At no time during the day was there any pressure to sell. Advancing prices for the first time in weeks failed to bring out securities. The professional trading element alone is skeptical, it insists that the market has been put up with the primary object of selling stocks, but it is doubtful whether there was much distribution of stock in today's market. For one thing the market was too narrow to receive them and another it was so professional that good selling could hardly have escaped detection. There has been a resumption of pool activity in a number of specialties and it is hardly to be supposed that these pools would have gone in for manipulation at this time unless they had assurance from the institutions on which they depend for financial support that they would be provided with funds. Some very shrewd observers think the market has turned for good and are enthusiastic over the prospect, but we should want corroboration such as has not yet been forthcoming before finally accepting this view."

NEW TOWNSHIP NOT OPPOSED

SUPERVISORS SEEM TO LOOK FAVORABLY ON THE PLAN OF SETTING IT ASIDE.

IDEA DISCUSSED WEDNESDAY

QUESTION WILL BE PUT UP TO BOARD WITHIN FEW MONTHS.

Northern Part of the County Promises to Develop Greatly - Good Roads Are Now the Craving Need.

The new township proposed for the northern part of Marquette county, to embrace the northern parts of the townships of Michigan, Champion, Ishpeming and Marquette, will, it is believed, meet with no serious opposition from members of the board of supervisors.

Several of their number in attendance at the session Wednesday inquired about the project, and wondered if the matter would be called to the attention of the board at this week's session.

Those who referred to the subject Wednesday said that they saw no good reason why if the property owners and residents of the northern part of the county desired to be set off in a new township they should not be allowed to have their way, and in no instance did a member of the board express himself as unfavorable to the project.

The acquiescence with which the project is received is largely explained by the fact that no one of the townships directly concerned, Michigan, Champion, Ishpeming or Marquette, will lose in favor of the proposed new township much land in proportion to the quantity that will be left in the respective divisions.

ation of a new township will result in more equitable taxation in the northern part of the county, as well as some increase in the aggregate of values fixed on various lands. It is said that inequalities exist, by reason of the inaccessibility of the lands, which has made it difficult for the supervisors to give all tracts just valuations.

Just now the thing of prime importance for this isolated district is good roads, and as has been already commented, it is this desire for good roads that has led to the agitation for the new township.
