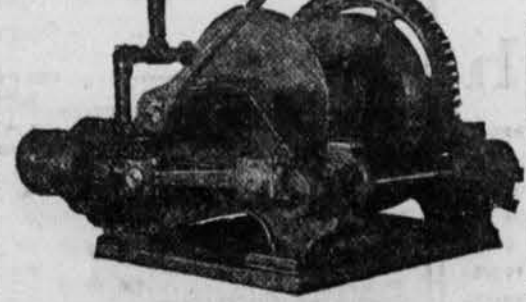

The cabinet today approved the decision of the president and Secretary Hay that the government of Panama must ratify the canal treaty before action relating to its ratification by the senate is taken. It is expected the treaty will be returned to Washington bearing the seal of the Panama government early in December. The president then will transmit the treaty to the senate with a request for its ratification.

China Gives Recognition.

Panama, Nov. 20.—The Chinese vice consul has officially notified the junta that China has recognized the defacto government of Panama.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 20.—Officials of the foreign office say that Russia doubtless will recognize Panama in due time and will welcome the construction of a neutral canal.

J. J. HILL GIVES UP JURY ACQUITS THEM

WILL HONOR THE DECREE DECLARING RAILWAY MERGER VOID.

Securities Company Will, It Is Stated, Keep Hands Off the Management of the Various Lines Involved.

Philadelphia, Nov. 20.—President Hill, of the Northern Securities company, was in the city today. In this connection, the Record says:

"From an authority close to Mr. Hill, it was learned that, on the advice of counsel, it has been decided to advise every right granted under the New Jersey corporation law to the Northern Securities company, excepting that of purchasing such securities as the management may see fit to obtain from an investment view point.

The right to vote stock in the Great Northern, Northern Pacific and Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railways is to be renounced, as is also the right of the securities concern to have any voice in the management of those railroads.

"The securities company is to declare before the federal supreme court that each of these big railroads is to be continued under separate managements, and that there is to be no community of interests agreement between them; in fact, they are to be maintained as separate companies, and each is to have individual management and offices, as before the merger under the securities company charter.

"The meaning of this, according to one of the attorneys for the securities company, that the judgment of the circuit court of appeals, which is to have, before the federal supreme court that each of these big railroads is to be continued under separate managements, and that there is to be no community of interests agreement between them; in fact, they are to be maintained as separate companies, and each is to have individual management and offices, as before the merger under the securities company charter.

LEAVES ESTATE WORTH MILLIONS.

Former Governor Drake of Iowa Dies After a Brief Illness.

Centerville, Ia., Nov. 20.—General F. M. Drake, former governor of Iowa, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Henry Goss, in this city today. He was stricken with diabetes several days ago and had been gradually growing worse ever since. No alarm was felt until late yesterday evening.

General Francis Marion Drake was born in Rushville, Ills., Dec. 29, 1839. He was elected governor of Iowa in 1895.

SUPPORTS SHIP SUBSIDY.

Senator Hanna Talks to Naval Architects at New York.

New York, Nov. 20.—Senator Hanna was one of the principal speakers at the banquet of the naval architects tonight, responding to the toast, "The Merchant Marine and Subsidy." He spoke emphatically in favor of a subsidy, which he said was one of the issues in the recent Ohio campaign and had been well received. He had told the farmers that if there should be war between this and any other important maritime country, their grain would rot in their stoves without an auxiliary to our navy. He believed that if the people understood the question of subsidy better, there would be little opposition to it.

10,000 EMPLOYEES AFFECTED.

Eastern Manufacturers of Bar Iron Decide to Cut Output 50 Per Cent.

New York, Nov. 20.—At a meeting of manufacturers of bar iron east of Pittsburgh today, it was decided to reduce the output by 50 per cent and to run the mills on part time for an indefinite period, owing to over-production. About ten thousand employees are affected.

HIS HEAD WAS BLOWN OFF.

Florence, Wis., Nov. 20.—The premature explosion of a blast in a logging road at J. W. Malloy's camp today killed a man named Johnson, fatally injured two others and slightly hurt two more. Johnson's head was blown off.

FIRE LOSS AT MINNEAPOLIS.

Minneapolis, Nov. 20.—The Leonard-Baule Shoe Case company's factory, together with a warehouse and four dwelling houses, was totally burned tonight. The loss is \$100,000.

FRENCH MARINES ARE LANDED.

Minister Powell Reports Fighting in Progress at San Domingo.

Washington, Nov. 20.—The state department tonight received a cablegram, dated Nov. 18, from Minister Powell, at San Domingo City, saying that there was fighting there and that a French war vessel had landed marines to protect foreign citizens.

WOULD MAKE CUBA A STATE.

Bill Introduced in Senate Invites Republic to Join the Union.

Washington, Nov. 20.—Senator Newlands of Nevada today introduced a joint resolution, inviting Cuba to become a state of the United States upon terms of equality with the states of the Union. It provides that Porto Rico shall become a province of Cuba.

WOMAN WILL DIE.

St. Paul Mother Gives Poison to Children and Herself.

St. Paul, Nov. 20.—Mrs. Frank Kovariki, fearing death as a possible consequence of the birth of a child, gave two of her children carbolic acid and drank some of the poison herself. Physicians summoned saved the children and hurried the woman to a hospital. There the surgeons performed an operation. They think the babe will live, but little hope is entertained of the mother's recovery.

MILLER AND JOHNS, ON TRIAL AT CINCINNATI, GO FREE.

Verdict a Surprise, in View of Court's Instructions, and Friends of Defendants Hold a Jollification.

Cincinnati, Nov. 20.—D. V. Miller and Joseph M. Johns, who have been on trial during the week on the charge of conspiracy to extort a bribe from John J. Ryan, made by the postoffice department, were acquitted tonight. The jury in the first trial, a month ago, disagreed. Today the jury was out six hours. It is understood the majority favored acquittal from the start, and a unanimous vote was reached after an examination of the documents used in evidence.

The verdict was a surprise, as the friends of the defendants considered the judge's instructions so strong that they expected nothing better than disagreement. Following the announcement of the verdict and the retirement of the court officers, the friends of the defendants engaged in a tumultuous jollification.

The government officials state that this case is not like any of the postal cases pending, as this case simply dealt with the action of Miller when he was assistant attorney in the postoffice department.

Machen Trial Postponed.

Washington, Nov. 11.—The trials of the postal cases of August W. Machen, the Groff brothers and Mr. and Mrs. Lorenz, arranged to begin here next Monday, have been postponed until Jan. 11, the government not being ready to proceed.

NO ATTEMPT AT RESCUE.

Execution of Desperado Horn Passes Off Quietly at Cheyenne.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Nov. 20.—Tom Horn was hanged here today for the murder of Willie Nickell, the fourteen-year-old son of K. P. Nickell, an Iron Mountain ranchman. No attempt at rescue was made and the execution passed off quietly.

WILL DEMAND SPEEDY TRIAL.

Senator Dietrich Leaves for Omaha to Answer to Indictment.

Washington, Nov. 20.—Senator Dietrich will start for Omaha tomorrow morning to surrender to the authorities in that city because of his indictment on a charge of conspiracy in connection with postoffice patronage. Senator Dietrich reiterated tonight the assertion that he would demand an immediate hearing.

CLASH AT WRECK.

Sheriff Refuses to Permit Burning of Debris Containing Bodies.

Peoria, Ills., Nov. 20.—Sheriff Clay and Superintendent Barnard of the Big Four wrecked today. Barnard wanted to burn the wreckage, but Clay insisted that the five bodies unaccounted for should be found before the debris is burned. The people insisted that the sheriff's position be respected.

SAILED ACROSS OCEAN ALONE.

Daring Navigator in 10-Foot Boat Arrives at Gibraltar.

Gibraltar, Nov. 20.—The Columbus, a sailing boat ninety feet long, in which Captain Eisenbraun left Boston on Aug. 11 alone for Marselles, arrived here today.

LEAVES FOR THE PHILIPPINES.

Chicago, Nov. 20.—The Twentieth United States infantry, which has been stationed at Fort Sheridan, left today for San Francisco on its way to the Philippines.

ROBBERS LOOT IOWA BANK.

Marshalltown, Ia., Nov. 20.—Three robbers wrecked the safe of the bank at Green Mountain, ten miles north of here, early today. They secured \$1,000 and escaped.

CHICAGO STRIKE SEEMS NEAR END

INDICATIONS POINT TO THE EARLY REFERENCE OF THE DISPUTE TO ARBITRATION.

PEACE PLAN MAKES PROGRESS

FINAL SETTLEMENT LIKELY WILL BE REACHED TODAY.

Mutual Concessions Are Made and Pending the Outcome a Virtual Cessation of Hostilities Has Been Declared by Both Sides.

Chicago, Nov. 20.—But two points prevented a peaceable adjustment of the street railway strike today, and the indications tonight are that these obstacles will be finally overcome and a settlement will be reached tomorrow.

A virtual cessation of hostilities has been declared by both sides while the present peace negotiations are in progress, and as all the interested parties appear to be making every effort to bring the struggle to an end, there seems likelihood that all differences will be modified to such a degree that arbitration will follow.

Peace Commissioners Confer.

Colonel E. R. Bliss, general counsel for the company, and Clarence Darrow, counsel for the strikers, were today given authority by each side to act for the parties to the controversy. These two had a conference and agreed upon a basis for settlement which will be submitted to the company's directors tomorrow for final action. The decision of the board of directors then will be made by the Harrison and the aldermanic committee, who will submit it to the executive board of the strikers' union.

After the conference between Messrs. Bliss and Darrow, it was learned that the company had made two propositions to the union. These were:

First, the company shall have the right to discipline and discharge employees as it shall choose, but that this shall not be construed to mean that any discrimination is to be made against union or non-union men.

Second, the company shall formulate methods by which the grievances of its employees shall be adjusted in the future.

The understanding was that the company laid down these two proposals as basic principles which must be granted by the union before further negotiations can be entered upon.

Accepted by the Union.

Attorney Darrow submitted the company's proposition to the union, after which he said that the strikers had accepted the proposal with material modifications. In their turn, the men submitted a proposition on the routing of cars. This is a matter that will come before the board of directors of the company tomorrow morning for its consideration.

Four of the company's lines trunk lines were kept open for traffic today, the cars being under police protection. Mr. Darrow, who represents the strikers in the negotiations for a settlement, was one of the representatives of the coal miners before the board of arbitration selected by President Roosevelt to settle the anthracite strike in Pennsylvania.

MINISTRIES IN ACCORD.

Britain and Italy Reach Agreement Concerning Foreign Affairs.

London, Nov. 20.—The Associated Press understands that as a result of a conference yesterday between Foreign Minister Tittoni and Foreign Secretary Lansdowne, perfect accord has been reached between Great Britain and Italy on matters affecting their foreign policies.

BIBLE BARRED FROM SCHOOL.

Nebraska Supreme Court Issues Writ of Mandamus Against a Teacher.

Lincoln, Nov. 20.—The supreme court of Nebraska today issued a writ of mandamus against the teacher of district school No. 21 of Gage county, ordering her not to read the Bible to her pupils. The case was tried some time ago, the supreme court deciding that sectarian knowledge should not be imparted in the public schools. The teacher contended to read the Bible, however, and Daniel Freeman sued for a writ of mandamus.

GRATEFUL TO ROOSEVELT.

Federation of Labor Wires Thanks for Pardon of Alleged Murderer.

Boston, Nov. 20.—The American Federation of Labor today ordered a vote of thanks telegraphed to President Roosevelt for his response to the appeal of the federation in pardoning Ephraim W. Clark, who has been serving a life sentence for murder. One of the seceder Borden's mutineers.

SECRET DIES WITH HIM.

Denver Italian Who Fought Duel With Priest Succumbs to Wounds.

Denver, Colo., Nov. 20.—Joseph Sorbie, who was shot Wednesday night in a desperate struggle with Rev. Father Leary, succumbed to his wounds today. The secret of the tragedy was probably lost when death claimed both men.

SHIP FROM NOME OVERDUE.

Fearful at Seattle the Steamer Discovers Will Never Reach Port.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 20.—The steamer Discoveria, which left Nome Oct. 16 with fifty or sixty persons on board, including thirty-one passengers, has not been sighted since Oct. 28. Shipping men believe she will never reach port.

His charming little sheet, usually devoted to the selling of everything and everybody in sight, has come out this time with a revival of the old and charitably forgotten story of Henry Ward Beecher and Mrs. Theodore Tilton.

He even prints an alleged deathbed confession of Mrs. Tilton, says that Beecher tried to shield her name in court and generally succeeds in stirring up many things with which the public has never had any concern. With the might-expected result he has inspired some of the eastern papers to hunt up the daughter of Mrs. Tilton and try to extract a statement from her on the subject. What earthly good can it do any one and why cannot meddling, meddling persons of the Hubbard ilk be so pressed and relegated to the oblivion they deserve?

The Cleveland Iron Trade Review says of the situation:

As the close of the season of navigation approaches, the prospect for the ore business is far from satisfactory. Reports from furnaces show that they have large stocks on hand, so large that few will need to take much ore from dock this winter. It is expected that there will be more ore on dock Dec. 1 than there was last year and that a very large part of it will stay there until spring. Owing to these conditions, an officer of a company which operates extensively on both the old and new range predicts that the total shipments for 1904 will not exceed 15,000,000 tons. Others do not take so gloomy a view, but admit that shipments next year will probably fall below those of this year, which will be about 24,000,000, or 3,500,000 tons short of 1902. The Pittsburgh Steamship Company has finished its shipments of ore for the season and its vessels not out of commission are haul-

The tenth annual meeting of the Daughters of the Confederacy held at Charleston, S. C., recently, distinguished itself by enacting a law to the effect that whenever "Dixie" is played or sung in any public assemblage every "Daughter" must rise and remain standing to the finish. What a fine thing it is to have two national anthems in one nation.

Football is attacked in a new manner. Usually its brutality is harped upon, but Professor Goodell finds that it is unesthetic and that it is only tolerated because the public taste remains altogether too barbaric. This is very interesting, but its safe to say that football will continue to be cherished, may just because it is rather barbaric, while poetry of motion is sought in other sports.

Prizes of about \$40,000 each are to be given to Dr. Neils R. Finson of Copenhagen for discoveries in physics and medicine and to Guglielmo Marconi for his wireless telegraphy invention; \$40,000 is to be divided between Henrik Ibsen and Bjornstjerne Bjornsen for their literary achievements. These awards are called the Nobel Foundation prizes, the result of the will of Alfred Bernhard Nobel in 1896. The awards are in the hands of three academic bodies in Stockholm and up to date no American has been lucky enough to be named.

It is interesting to observe that the Soo, which raised a good deal of a fuss last summer when the copper country baseball teams recruited its players, has now succeeded in obtaining for the coming season's campaign nearly all the members of the 1903-04 Portage Lake hockey team. It makes a great deal of difference whose foot is pinched. The Portage Lake team is principally a Hancock-Houghton aggregation. Those towns did not bother the Soo last summer. So the motive of revenge cannot enter. It is just pure, human cussedness, which is forever cropping out in all of us.

Cuba is now entering on its first era of rapid transit. By the new train service it is possible to go from Havana to Santiago in twenty-five hours, as compared with three days in the years of the Spanish regime. Now the journey may be made cheaply and with comfort; then it was highly expensive and quite devoid of modern traveling conveniences. The development and improvement of the service between Havana and Santiago is a fair indication of a movement general for the whole island, where railroad expansion, with its manifold benefits and the healthy currents and impulses to which it gives impetus, has been one of the most notable consequences of the American invasion.

ing coal and grain. It is believed that the steel corporation has enough ore in furnace yards and on dock to last it nearly through the summer of 1904.

While there are many opinions concerning the law designed to secure the punishment of hunters who carelessly shoot human beings in the woods, there is unanimity on one point, namely, that if the law is continued on the statute books it should be so amended as to provide against the man who shoots and runs away. That it was not so framed in the first place was an oversight that cannot be too soon made good. It seems inconceivable that one hunter should shoot another and then clear out without waiting to see what he could do for the sufferer, but this thing has already happened on the upper peninsula a number of times this year, notably in the case of Mr. Fenton, of Escanaba, wounded near Manistique this week. Fenton was deserted by the man who shot him, and would in all probability have died had not members of his party come to his rescue within a very few minutes.

The present law makes no provision for the prosecution of the miscreant who fled, leaving his victim to live or die, as might be, in the woods. It is clearly apparent that an amendment, fixing some degree of murder for such cowardly desertion, is necessary. Then the cravens will be afraid to run away.

Superintendent of Public Instruction Fall's report, just made public, shows that in 1902 the people of Michigan spent over \$10,000,000 on education, and had a school population of 728,182, with an enrollment in the schools of 513,688, being an increase of 3,637 over the previous year. Only seventy per cent of the school population was actually in attendance. It is explained, however, that this discrepancy is largely made up of young people between the ages of five and eight and seventeen and twenty years. Many parents of the former consider them too young to go to school and most children leave their books when they are about seventeen or eighteen years. The report credits the state with 7,294 districts and 8,104 school houses. The total number of teachers was 18,262 and they were paid \$4,997,758.69. The total expenditure for rural and graded schools during 1902 was \$9,207,106.36, or a per capita expenditure of \$11.11 for the total school population, or \$17.92 for the pupils enrolled. The University, Normals, Agricultural college and College of Mines were given \$915,065.60 by the state and the various other state schools \$408,465.60, making the total of expenditures for educational purposes no less a sum than \$10,277,827.

BUILDING WILL COST \$50,000.

Working Plans for College of Mines Gymnasium Are Ordered.

The board of control of the Michigan College of Mines met in the office of President F. W. McNair Thursday afternoon and looked over sketch plans presented by Charlton, Gilbert & Kuenzli, Milwaukee and Marquette architects, for the proposed new gymnasium. The work was satisfactory and the firm was instructed to draw up working plans. D. Fred Charlton of Marquette was present to explain the details of the sketches. The members of the board present were: Walter Fitch of Beacon, president; James MacIntosh, Calumet; William Kelley, Vulcan; W. E. Parnall, Calumet, and H. S. Goodell, Painesdale. Work on the gymnasium will be started next spring. The cost of the structure will be \$50,000. To date about \$2,000 has been subscribed through the efforts of the members of the board of control, the faculty and students. There are hopes of raising the balance of the money during the winter. The gymnasium will be a notable addition to the college and one which the students will appreciate. It will afford a pleasant means of relaxation from work during their leisure moments.

BADLY INJURED.

Conductor Wern Has Narrow Escape from Death.

Charles Wern, a freight conductor in the employ of the Mineral Range railroad, slipped and fell between two cars at the Lake Superior Smelting works at Dollar Bay late Thursday afternoon and was badly injured. His breast was severely crushed. The train was moving slowly and the engineer was able to stop in time to prevent the cars from passing over the unfortunate man's body. Wern had been run over and killed. As it was, he was extricated with great difficulty. The fact that one of his arms was across his breast at the time saved him considerably, although the member was badly bruised. Several of his ribs are broken. Wern is one of the oldest employes on the road. He formerly was in charge of the freight train between Marquette and the copper country.

NOT LOST AS REPORTED.

The steel steamer W. H. Gratwick has not been lost on Lake Superior as was reported from Duluth. She passed down at the Soo last Saturday but in some unaccountable manner her passage was overlooked. The oversight gave rise to the report that she had foundered on Lake Superior and that Captain Riley and his crew of twenty men were lost. While a lookout was kept for her on Lake Superior, the boat was steaming safely down Lake Huron on her way to Lake Erie with a cargo of iron ore. She started from Two Harbors, twenty-four miles east of Duluth, last week Thursday.

HOUGHTON TEAM LEADS.

The Houghton team of the Houghton County Bowling League is now in first place. It won three straight games from the Lakes on the Dee alleys at Houghton Thursday evening. On the Dretler alleys in Hancock the Dees of Houghton won two out of three games from the Dretlers, while on the Mitchell alleys the Millers of Calumet took three games from the Hancock. The Calumets won two out of three games from the Mitchells on the Miller alleys at Calumet. All of the teams have now played twelve games each. Last Tuesday evening the Millers and Lakes played a postponed series on the Ketterbach alleys at Lake Linden which evened up the number of games for each team. The Lakes took all of the three. The good work of the Millers Thursday evening, however, pushed their percentage up quite considerably.

CHURCH FAIR IN PROGRESS.

The annual fair of St. Patrick's Catholic church of Hancock was opened by the ladies of the auxiliary society to the Ancient Order of Hibernians and the Woman's Catholic Order of Foresters in St. Patrick's Hall last evening. The proceeds will be turned into the church treasury in the hopes that the amount will be sufficient to wipe out the church indebtedness, which amounts to about \$1,500. The fair will continue this evening and next week. Supper will again be served this evening, with chicken pie as the chief attraction. A turkey supper will be served on Thanksgiving day. A musical program will be rendered each evening and there will be many features of interest in the way of contests and games. Dancing may be indulged in later in the evenings. All kinds of fancy articles suitable for Christmas presents will be on sale.

FOOTBALL GAME IS OFF.

Owing to the recent heavy fall of snow, the proposed football game between the Hancock and Marquette High schools at the Driving Park on Thanksgiving Day has been called off. AN INTERESTING CASE.

Ownership of Building Made Historic by Murder Is in Dispute.

An interesting civil case is now occupying the attention of Circuit Judge Streetor. It is that of August Massi of Hancock vs. Morris Levine of Hancock. Massi started the action to recover a residence property in West Hancock which he claims Levine secured by fraud. Levine, according to Massi, the property from being taken up by the creditors of a defunct Calumet business firm, for which Massi was one of the bondsmen. He, at Levine's instigation it is alleged, decided the property to Levine. Levine gave him three promissory notes, each for \$500 in payment. Massi further alleges that Levine later got the notes back on the latter's promise that he would return the deed for the property. Levine, however, kept both deed and notes, according to Massi, hence the latter's appeal to the courts.

The building in dispute has considerable of a history. It was in that dwelling that an aged couple by the name of Kramer were murdered some eight years ago. The crime still is a mystery no clue to the identity of the murderer having ever been discovered.

Massi's attorney is Louis Legris of Houghton. Levine's case is in the hands of W. A. Burritt of Hancock. The trial has been on since Wednesday.

Managers of copper country ice rinks did have to have ice for skating on Thanksgiving Day but the weather turned warmer yesterday and the opening of the season is now doubtful.

Presiding Elder C. M. Thompson of Marquette conducted a quarterly conference meeting at the Lake Linden M. E. church Thursday evening. He has returned home, having finished his series of engagements in the copper country.

Frank Bertrand of Laurium was fined \$25 and costs by Justice Trahen for not sending his son to school regularly, but upon the plea that Bertrand obeyed the law in that respect in the future sentence was suspended.

"Arizona" pleased a full house at the Calumet theater last evening and, judging from the seat sale, it will be greeted by a large audience at the Keredgette, at Hancock, this evening. The play is giving great satisfaction everywhere.

County Clerk L. H. Richardson to date has issued 1,206 deer hunting licenses, exceeding the total number for the season last year by about 250. Applications are coming in daily and before the end of the season it is likely that the number of licenses issued will be near 1,400.

H. A. Vandercreek, who recently resigned as director of the Calumet & Hecla band to take charge of Ames' Second Regiment band at Michigan City, Ind., left Thursday afternoon for that place. His departure is generally regretted, as it is felt that the Calumet & Hecla band what it really is.

Frank Jones, a member of the Portage Lake Lake Ice League, last summer left Houghton yesterday for the Soo, where he will join his brother, J. H. Jones. They will establish a painting business in that city. J. H. Jones will play goal for the Soo hockey seven during the coming season.

J. C. Thomson, the local agent of the Anchor and Western lines of boats, said yesterday that he would have only three more freighters here this season. The Schuyllin is due today, the India about next Monday and the Mahoning about next Wednesday. The season will end for both lines with the coming of the Mahoning.

The rate from Houghton to Chicago and return over either the Northwestern or St. Paul roads for the Michigan-Chicago football game was \$12.85, equivalent to one fare. The rate from Hancock will be \$12.90, while from Calumet it will be \$13.35. The tickets will be sold Nov. 25 and will be good to return until Saturday evening, Nov. 28.

Dr. O. H. Shockley, of the staff of physicians at the Northern Michigan General hospital at Laurium, has left for New York city, where he will take post-graduate work in some of the leading hospitals. He expects to be absent four or five weeks. Dr. Shockley has been house physician at the Laurium hospital since it was opened about a year ago.

Charles Abel, who directed the Calumet & Hecla band promenade concert at the Light Guard Armory at Calumet Thursday evening, may be retained as the permanent leader of the band. His program was much appreciated. Mr. Abel is a talented musician. He has not been in Calumet long, arriving from Toronto only a few weeks ago to take charge of the theater orchestra work.

M. M. Foley, superintendent of public works of Houghton, has cautioned all water consumers to protect their meters from the frost. He states that any

meters that may be damaged by frost or by persons thawing them in case they are frozen, will be held responsible, and unless they are repaired or replaced the water will be shut off. The common sense instructed Mr. Foley to issue the order to that effect.

A. P. Iler, the veteran Calumet newspaper man, who has been city editor of the Copper Country Evening News for the past two years, has retired from the strenuous life to devote his time and attention to his photographic and specimen business. Joseph Glasson, who has been his assistant on the News for several months, succeeds him. Mr. Iler has been in the newspaper business in the upper peninsula for thirty-five years. He represented The Mining Journal at one time in the copper country and did excellent work.

Agent Loftus of the Union Transit company states that he expects four more boats of his line here before the season ends. The steamer Ward is due to arrive on or about Nov. 27. The Portage is due Nov. 29; the Rochester about Dec. 1, and the New York about Dec. 3 or 4. Barring heavy blows the vessels will adhere to that schedule. Each of them will take out copper cargoes, all the way from 1,000 to 1,500 tons each. The smelters in the Portage and Torch Lake districts are now working day and night and Sundays to get out as much of the red metal for shipment by boat as possible.

MINING NEWS

PARNALL APPOINTED.

Copper Country Man to Become Superintendent of the C. & A.

Samuel A. Parnall, who has been in charge at the property of the Higgins Development company, in the Warren district of Arizona since work was started there last spring, has been appointed superintendent of the Calumet & Arizona Mining company. The fact of the appointment, which had been rumored for some days, was confirmed yesterday. He will succeed Superintendent L. L. Merrill, who is compelled to retire on account of ill health. The appointment probably will take effect the first of the month.

Mr. Merrill's health has been failing him for the last six months and he is unable to continue his present work any longer. He has been in charge of the mine since the first and has succeeded in making it one of the greatest copper producers in the world. Mr. Merrill is one of the directors of the company.

It was said yesterday by a man close to the Higgins management that Mr. Parnall would still be retained by the Higgins people in an advisory capacity, if no other. It is believed that he can spare the time to direct the development work under way until the mine reaches that stage when it will require more time and attention.

PRICE STEADINESS INDICATED.

Little Probability of Much Fluctuation in Quotations of Copper.

The resumption of work at the Amalgamated mines in Montana has removed the only strong bull factor from the metal market, which has lapsed into great dullness. There seems no prospect of any sudden rise in the price of metal, neither does it seem likely that there will be any material decline in the near future. The stocks on hand are sufficient to provide any easy market, in which neither producer nor consumer is squeezed. The buyers manifest considerable incredulity regarding the small amount of refined copper on hand, and it is not natural that they should do so, for they have been badly fooled in the past, and have come to look upon all estimates as mere guesses, regardless of the responsibility of the source whence such estimates come. American production for 1933 will show a substantial increase, but nothing remarkable.

The American copper industry has grown so large that the law of averages applies, and the percentage of increase can be forecasted quite accurately, this ranging from 6 to 10 per cent annually. The demand for the metal in Europe continues good, but in the United States there is a perceptible slackening, due primarily to the fact that the Quinys, but probably to a greater extent to actual lessening of demand for manufactured products, in sympathy with steel and other staples.

Franklin.

No. 8 shaft of the Quinys, on the Mesnard tract, is showing better ground at present than formerly. This shaft is to be connected eventually with the Pe-wabic, or North Quinys shafts, at a depth of about 4,000 feet. The connecting program will start entirely under the Franklin mine. The shafts of the old Franklin would have been very valuable to the Quinys, two or three years ago, but their value, while still considerable, is growing less with every passing month, and the price of \$150,000, recently mentioned in the press, is probably considerably more than the Quinys would be willing to give for the old Franklin. Inasmuch as the old Franklin is of but small value to the present owners, and would be useful to the Quinys, it is to be hoped that an amity of many years standing, but which has greatly ameliorated of late years, will be bargained out on the congruous terms to the mutual advantage of both parties. The present large production of the Franklin is coming mainly from the Junior mine, which with a single shaft is turning out more rock than any of the local authorities considered possible two years ago. With the completion of an additional shaft on the conglomerate lode, the Franklin will be able to push its three-stamp mill to the utmost. The question of tonnage is a vital one to the Franklin, as the percentage of copper is low in its rock, and profits depend upon a heavy production, which Capt. Hoeking is giving.

Michigan.

Stamping on Michigan rock was begun by one head at the Mass mill, Keweenaw Bay, on Wednesday of last week. A yet no returns have been secured, but no special effort was made to ship

Had the Michigan management been composed of boomers, it would have been a very simple matter to have furnished the mill with a few thousand tons of selected rock from the "branch vein" and other openings other than the amygdaloid, which would have given greater returns than secured by even the Calumet & Hecla. Fortunately the management of the Michigan is in the hands of men both experienced and conservative, who are working with a view to developing a permanently valuable property, rather than attempting to make a record run and have the price of shares, Sensationalism in mining is no greater success in the long run than it is in any other line of business.

Tamarack. The decision of President Bigelow to proceed vigorously with the equipment of No. 5 shaft at the Tamarack is received with pleasure by local shareholders. EASY SAILING FOR THE CUBAN BILL

DEMOCRATS DECIDE NOT TO OBSTRUCT ITS CONSIDERATION IN THE SENATE.

WILL POSTPONE TARIFF FIGHT

DISCUSSION WILL BE ON THE MERITS OF THE MEASURE.

Attitude Adopted by the Caucus Means Early Action on the Reciprocity Legislation, but Possibly Not at the Present Session.

Washington, Nov. 26.—The Democratic caucus at a caucus this afternoon decided to consider the Cuban bill on its merits and to confine their discussion to the bill itself without bringing in collateral questions. This means that no tariff amendments will be offered and that the tariff question will not be discussed. The Democrats say that in abandoning the fight on the tariff, but that they believe they can reach the tariff in some other way.

Sharp Debate in the Senate.

The Senate held its longest sitting of the session today, beginning at noon and adjourning at 3:15 p. m. The entire time was consumed in debating a motion to refer the Cuban reciprocity bill to the committee on foreign relations. Political lines were sharply drawn, the Republicans advocating such reference and the Democrats contending the measure should go to the committee on finance. The motion finally prevailed without division.

Morgan Stays on Canal Committee.

The Democratic caucus today selected the minority representation on the Senate committee. Senator Morgan retains his position on the canal committee, and with him are Carmack, Taliaferro and Gorman. For foreign relations, these were named: Morgan, Bacon, Money, Clark of Montana and McGraw. Senator Gorman of Maryland was made a member of the finance, canal, irrigation, library, postoffice and printing committees.

House Opposes Senate Plan.

The suggestion has been made that the time for the vote on the Cuban bill be fixed about the middle of December, and that the extra session adjourn sine die before Thanksgiving. Strong opposition to this has developed in the house on the ground the special session was convened for a special purpose and it would be discourteous to the president to adjourn before final action is had on the Cuban bill.

House Session Very Brief.

The house was in session but five minutes today, adjourning until Tuesday.

The Iowa delegation was unable to agree on a judge for the northern federal district of Iowa at its meeting today, and adjourned until Monday.

STATE OF THE NATION'S TRADE.

As the Situation Is Found This Week by Bradstreet's and Dun & Co. New York, Nov. 26.—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say "Colder weather has greatly stimulated retail trade, and incidentally has quickened the jobbing demand in seasonable lines. In some sections the inquiries for holiday goods exceed last year's, the feature being the high grade of the materials taken. Interior retailers, helped by the propitious agricultural conditions, are reported meeting their obligations more promptly. The farming interests are apparently in good financial condition, an inference that seems to be evidenced by the fact that they display unwillingness to part with their surplus products at anything less than their own satisfactory prices. The railway earnings still show a good increase in gross receipts, those for the first half of November being 5 1/2 per cent.

While the foregoing are favorable developments of the week, the fact must not be overlooked that labor troubles, the gloomy outlook for building, the closing down of iron and steel mills, blast furnaces and leather tanneries, and the continued hesitancy in the buying of practically all commodities are factors that mar the industrial as well as the commercial fabric.

The wheat (including flour) exports for the week total 2,974,000 bushels, against 5,278,000 in this week of last year. For the twenty weeks of the current year the total is 64,876,000 bushels, against 108,257,000 in 1902. The export of wheat is 1,392,000 bushels, against 243,000 in the week a year ago; for the twenty weeks of the present year the aggregate is 72,983,000 bushels, against 2,388,000 in 1902.

As Noted by Dun's Review. R. G. Dun & Co.'s Trade Review will say: "Labor organizations are accepting reductions in wages without controversy, which has removed one threatening industrial factor, and in several branches of business orders are more numerous; but in the steel industry there is little expectation of liberal buying until 1904.

Construction work is decreasing despite optimistic reports of more building permits issued last month than a year ago. A week has passed without further reduction in the prices of iron and steel, and the sentiment in the trade favors stability at the present position. Machinery and hardware have felt the reaction less than far that structural material and other heavy shapes, while new shipbuilding plants and machinery for the Panama canal are encouraging features of the future. The minor metals are quiet, aside from some speculative indications at London.

The orders for cotton goods increased gradually, both for immediate shipment and forward delivery, and there is less disposition on the part of purchasers to secure concessions in quotations. Woolen goods await the stimulus of lower temperature, and meanwhile the tone is not firm.

The failures this week numbered 249 in the United States, against 266 in the week of last year.

BRITT GETS THE DECISION.

San Francisco, Nov. 26.—Jimmy Britt was given the decision over Martin Canole, the New England fighter, at the end of the twentieth round here tonight. Milwaukee, Nov. 26.—Charles McKee of Philadelphia was awarded the decision over Hugo Kelly of Chicago at the end of six rounds tonight.

HISTORIC PAINTING PRESENTED.

Washington, Nov. 26.—A painting by the French artist, M. Chartran, representing the signing of the protocol of peace between the United States and Spain, presented to the government by H. C. Frick of Pittsburgh, was today accepted by President Roosevelt.

PAROLE REFUSED.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 26.—The state board of control today refused to parole Frank H. Hamilton, the Minneapolis newspaper man who is serving a sentence for killing Leonard Day, the millionaire, in the West Hotel, at Minneapolis, Nov. 25, 1900.

TODAY'S WEATHER.

Washington, Nov. 26.—The following is the weather bureau's forecast for Upper Michigan: Fair and warmer Saturday; rain or snow Sunday; increasing south winds.

AGRICULTURAL SCHOOLS FAVORED.

Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 26.—The convention of the National Grange closed today. Resolutions were adopted favoring the establishment of county and district agricultural high schools.

DEPRESSED STOCKS.

Rise in the Call Money Rate Has Adverse Effect on Prices. New York, Nov. 26.—The prices of stocks received a setback today after a further moderate movement during the early hours of the session. A plausible reason for the reaction was a flurry in call money rates, which ran up to 8 per cent late in the day, causing apprehension that tomorrow's bank statement might reveal some unfavorable developments. So far as the currency movement of the week is concerned, there is nothing to show important loss of strength by the banks, the apparent decrease in cash being limited to a few hundred thousand dollars.

A large calling of loans today by several great banks necessitated a shifting of loans and caused the rise in the money rate. The purpose of this call was explained as due to syndicate requirements, including the United States Steel conversion syndicate. The call loan rate ran off to 5 per cent again before the close.

The opening transactions in United States Steel preferred and in bonds were on an enormous scale. The bonds were at one time 2 points above last night, but closed with only 1/2 gain. United States Steel preferred fell as low as 1 1/4 under last night and made a net loss of a point. Southern Pacific came into the market in speculative attention, and was lifted an extreme of 2 1/2 points. 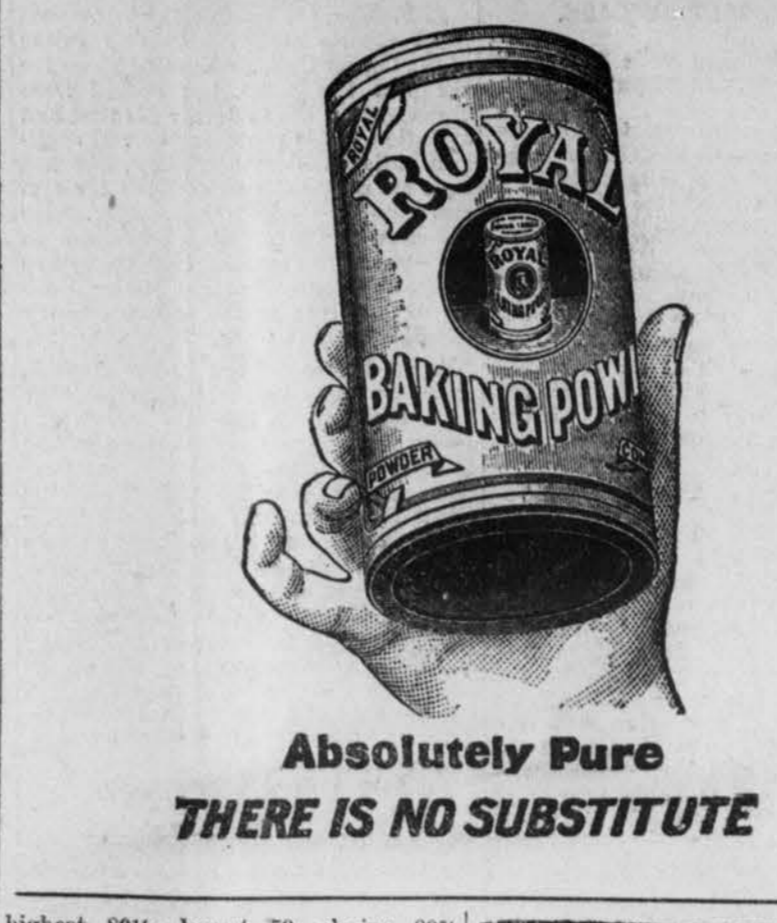

CHICAGO GRAIN MARKETS.

Chicago, Nov. 26.—The demand for December wheat from short interests was extremely urgent today, owing to the critical situation in the Northwest, and with but small offerings the market ruled strong throughout the day. The sentiment was bullish from the start, higher cables and smaller receipts at the Northwest being the incentives that brought out a good demand with the opening sales. December opened a shade lower to a shade higher, at 79 1/2, but with active buying by shorts and local traders the price advanced rapidly. On the advance there was selling to secure profits and some sales for short account, which resulted in the market easing off slightly at times, although the tendency was constantly toward a higher level. The report of a big decrease in stock at Duluth for the week was an added cause of anxiety to the shorts. December closed 1/2 higher. The strength of December helped May. Liverpool closed 1/2 lower to 3/4 higher. On the coast twenty-five boatloads were taken. December opened at 79 3/4.

Upper Peninsula.

Menominee's big \$850,000 beet sugar factory, the first in the upper peninsula, is now in full operation. The factory, which has a capacity of 1,000 tons a day, will run steadily night and day until all the beets contracted for have been turned into sugar.

Truman A. Turner is another man who has been found guilty of violating the game laws. He is a resident of Bellevue, Mich. He came before Judge Shepley at the Soo this week and pleaded guilty to having knowledge of the unlawful killing of a beaver without notifying the authorities. He was fined \$10 and costs.

The primary departments of the Newberry schools are being depopulated by an epidemic of mumps, which is prevalent about town. First it was the whooping cough that played havoc with school attendance, and now the mumps are having their innings. Half the youngsters in town are going about with their heads tied up and their faces swollen out of all proportion.

The board of directors of the Cream City Development company, a Milwaukee corporation on whose land in D-ta county oil was struck recently, held a meeting at Milwaukee this week to consider the proposition of development. The board decided to improve the property by building tanks and piping to the railroad track, a distance of two miles.

Three-fifths of the stock of the company is held in Milwaukee," said Director Kempf after the meeting. "We own 3,040 acres of land, and control over 10,000 acres with the railroad running through our property. Since our strike, 125 leases of land have been recorded in our Delta county, mostly by the Michigan peninsula company, controlled by Pittsburgh parties. Owners of property in that section have jumped their price from 50 cents an acre to \$25. A large bed of fuel oil, several acres in extent, and from three to ten feet deep, has been discovered on our property."

No Evidence of Murder.—Prosecuting Attorney Conrick returned to the Soo from DeTour where he was held a petition of the residents of that town asking for an investigation into the facts leading up to the death of the late Mrs. Fred Hardy. Both the prosecuting attorney and Sheriff Hardy had previously looked into the matter thoroughly and had come to the conclusion that neither the circumstances or the evidence was such as to warrant putting the county to an expense of several hundred dollars in disinterring the body, a post mortem examination and an expert analysis. The only positive evidence came from Dr. Cameron, who said that Mrs. Hardy had admitted taking the medicine containing strychnine, which is believed to have been the cause of death of her own accord. There was nothing in all the statements made by other witnesses examined by the prosecutor to offset this and there was no one among the petitioners who would formally make a complaint charging that a crime had been committed. Mr. Conrick, after again going into every phase of the question, decided that the request of the petitioners would only result in needless expense as nothing could be gained thereby. This probably closes the incident.

W. H. Laidley & Co. said of the wheat market: "Although cables were lower, there were buying orders from the start, on lighter northwest receipts, and the prices worked slowly up all day, closing at 74 1/2. A notable feature was the immense quantity for sale at 79, up in the millions of bushels. This was absorbed largely by bullish professionals and will be for sale again at a loss, if, as has so often happened, we are again disappointed by the failure of an enthusiastic public to appear."

DAY IN NEW YORK.

The Hadden-Rolce New York letter was as follows: "Traders who were long of stocks have been inclined all day to take profits and it looked at times as if interests even higher than traders were floating out of the market. The market took this selling in a very admirable manner, even advancing until, in the late trading active competition on the part of the bulls brought in the board room to get out of stocks caused prices to run off a little. The disappointment in the market today was the weakness of Steel preferred in the face of the announcements concerning the conversion business. The selling of Steel preferred all day looked better than the buying. The strongest stock in the market today was Southern Pacific, which was manipulated by brokers and traders supposed to be keeping orders and information from the market. The selling of Steel preferred was put up to facilitate selling elsewhere in the market. Prices today would probably have to go five points higher, at least, before the outsiders would take an interest in the long side of the market and buy stocks. It is a question whether the big people are willing just at this time to bring about that much of an advance. Considering that this was the third day of the rally and the behavior of the market was not discouraging."

BOUND OVER.

Anderson and Reynolds Held for Trial in Delta Circuit Court.

John Anderson and James Reynolds, the former convicted at the Marquette ranch of state prison, who are suspected of the robbery of the Escanaba post-office and numerous other similar jobs in various parts of the upper peninsula, were this week bound over for trial in Delta Circuit Court at Escanaba on a charge of grand larceny. Bail was set at \$500, it is not believed they will be able to secure sureties.

It is not expected that Anderson and Reynolds will ever be tried for grand larceny. It is quite certain that before the next term of court comes around a hearing will be made out against them in connection with the postoffice robbery. Indeed Postal Inspector Backus of Marquette was at Escanaba attending the hearing and he was prepared to arrest the men on this more serious charge had it developed that they could be held for grand larceny. They are believed to have been guilty of the robbery at Bay Mills and Seney, and they would have been taken into custody as suspects.

Mr. Backus has made a discovery which seems to connect the men with the Bay Mills affair in an unmistakable manner. Among the clues at Escanaba was a man's cap, found on the floor inside the building. Mr. Backus was at Bay Mills recently and he found a saloon man who had loaned this identical cap to John Anderson the night before the Bay Mills robbery. Anderson had lost his hat and came into the saloonkeeper's place to borrow a piece of headgear. It has been ascertained conclusively that Anderson and Reynolds were both at Bay Mills for about a week before the robbery and that they disappeared on the commission of the crime.

Other proofs not yet given publicity are at the officers' command and it is said that a case for the government against the men is so clear that it is assured that they will be tried for post office robbery. If this is so, the hearing will occur in the United States court in this city.

COAL ABOUT ALL HERE.

Movement to This Port Has Been Heavy for the Season of 1903.

The coal movement for the season 1903, which has been unusually heavy for this port, is now about at an end. The steamer Amazonas has been unloading a large cargo during the past few days and the Andante and Chisholm are awaiting their turn at the Picket and dock. The coal yet to be received amounts to in the neighborhood of 12,000 tons. Practically all of the coal has been handled over the Pickard lock, and, as usual, for the most of it has been distributed to other Marquette county and peninsula points.

Navigation was tied up this week near Detroit, for about thirty-six hours laying a number of upbound craft. The trouble was at the Lime Kiln crossing, one of the most vulnerable points on the entire chain of navigation. A little ridge of rock, five feet wide and about two feet in height, left by the engineers between the recently improved twenty-one foot channel of the crossing and the old channel in which there is at least a depth of nineteen feet was the direct cause of the blockage. About 1 o'clock Tuesday morning the steamer William F. Brown, of the Elphicke fleet, bound down, ran on the ridge, abreast of the present location of the south lightship and, swinging around in the current grounded almost perpendicularly across the 190-foot channel, leaving ninety feet of her bow and 200 feet of the 420-foot channel astern. The Brown carried a cargo of iron ore, and began to leak, two of her amidship compartments being soon filled.

This accident in itself was not serious except to the Brown, as most of the old channel was still free for the passage of other craft. But about 7 o'clock Tuesday morning the Hawgood steamer S. S. Curry, upbound, ran into the eddy caused in the swift current of the channel by the stranding of the Brown. The eddy forced the Curry aground on the east or Canadian bank of the crossing abreast of the Brown and in such a position that the two boats almost entirely obstructed navigation of the passage.

The blockage was raised Wednesday by the lightening of the Brown, but more or less trouble continues to be experienced in the channels, and there is talk of closing the new one, on account of the number of boats that have struck in it during the past few weeks.

Ishpeming and its Environs.

MUCH STREET IMPROVEMENT.

About 4,000 Feet of Macadam Has Been Laid During the Summer.

The board of public works presented an active campaign of street building during the season just closed. The sum appropriated for highway improvements has been expended to good purpose, the streets never being in better condition than at present. Nearly a mile of macadamized surface has been laid, the approximate figure being 4,000 feet. The steam roller was put into commission early in the season and was employed most of the time until a few weeks ago when the approach of cold weather put an end to the work. Besides the improvements on the streets in town, not a little attention was given to the Winthrop road.

The following sections of street were macadamized: First, from Euclid to Arch; Front, from Lake to Pine; Vine, from Third to Fifth; Barnum, from Spruce to Pine; Ridge, from Spruce to Pine; Euclid, from Lake to Pine; Ridge, from Second to Third.

The work has been done thoroughly. With occasional repairs, the streets will remain in good condition for many years.

Street building will likely be extended even more widely next season. Residents in many parts of the city want the highways in their neighborhood put in better condition; in fact there has been some complaint because the street surface of the whole town was not reconstructed during the few months that was devoted to the work. The places that were most in need of repair received attention this year.

A good deal has been done, too, in the improvement of the water system. The lakes from which the city draws its supply have all been cleaned of dead timber and the brush has been cut away from the shores. Seven miles of six-strand wire fencing have been built around the chain of lakes, enclosing them completely. Three hundred water meters have been installed during the season. Over 1,100 meters are now in use and the supply of more than 50 per cent of the consumers is regulated by meters.

The glass has been placed in the windows in the front of the new theater and the doors have been hung. The decorators are at work. The building is now well heated, most of the radiation having been installed.

The four Ishpeming men who take affidavits for deer licenses have had 42 applications to date. William Peters heads the list. The number of applications this year is considerably in excess of those filed last season.

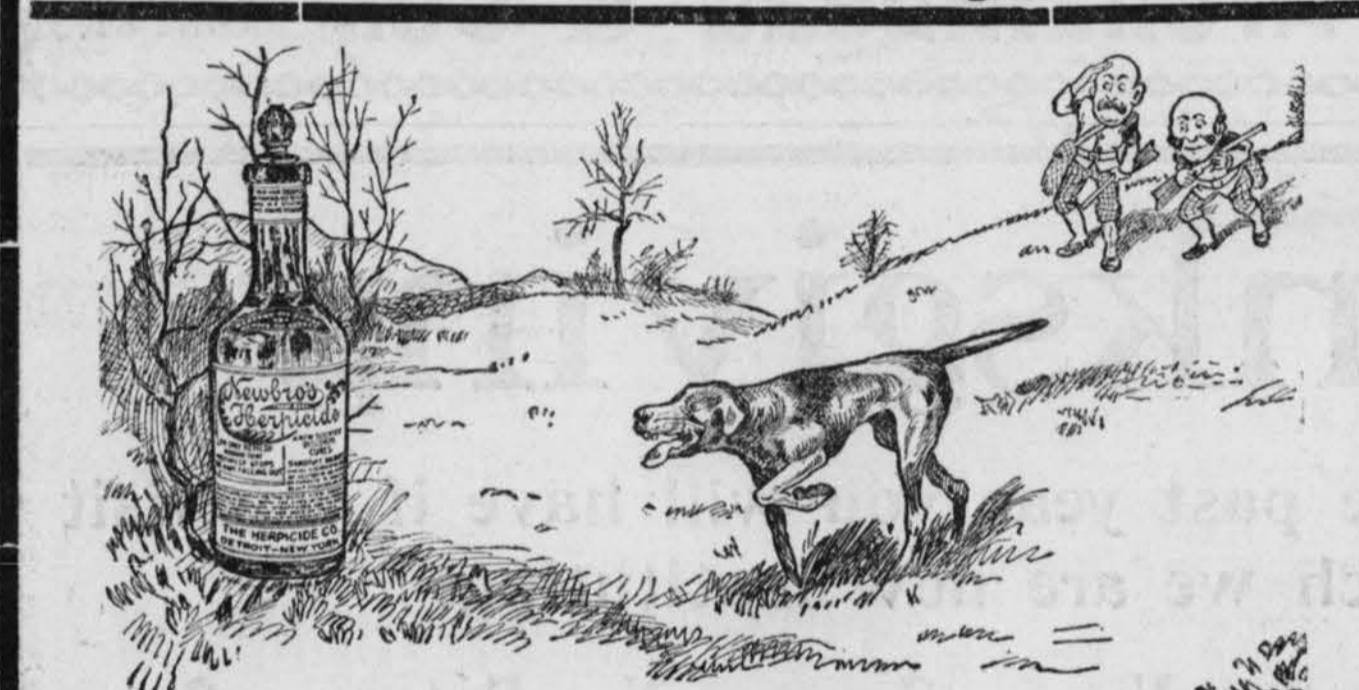

SHIPMENTS ABOUT AT END.

Season's Work at Breitung Mines Now Nearly Concluded.

There will likely be no more shipments from the Breitung mines this season. The Marie Charlotte has shipped all but 4,000 tons in fulfillment of a 35,000 ton contract. The ore was being forwarded over the Northwestern to Escanaba. Lake shipments from that port have been very light of late and the railroad company has several hundred loaded cars in its yards there, the docks being full of ore. In case more vessels arrive before the close of navigation, the railroad may be able to dispose of the surplus stock and again provide cars for moving ore from the Marie Charlotte.

The Breitung Hematite has also stopped shipping. The mine has produced in the neighborhood of 6,000 tons this season. Work will soon be commenced on a new shaft, and diamond drills will be put in commission. The force of men has been reduced from sixty to less than twenty.

At the Marie Charlotte operations during the winter will be confined to deepening the shaft and extending the development work. The force has also been cut down at this property, only about forty men now being employed whereas nearly 175 were on the payroll when the shipping was active. The Marie Charlotte is less than a year old yet it is already reckoned among the most important of the Negaunee properties. Since last February a well equipped plant has been established, a fine shaft has been put down and 31,000 tons of ore taken out and shipped. When active work is resumed next spring the mine will be ready to operate on a much larger scale. The work this winter will place it in condition to produce largely in case it is desired to do so.

LIBRARY PATRONAGE.

The record of the library for the past two months shows that 1,018 books were drawn from September 15 to October 15; 1,781 going out from October 15 to Nov. 15. These figures represent only the catalogued books. Many magazines are drawn by the high school pupils. The number of patrons is 609. There are now 3,205 volumes in the library, 478 having been added recently. All of the late accessions have been catalogued and are ready for circulation. Since the library was reopened 841 new books have been added, and a number of volumes have been rebound.

Henry Case was exhibiting on the streets a few days since the head of a horse with two perfectly formed horns that had grown on the left side of the head. They were so near a duplicate that when held in alignment prongs and all appeared as one horn. The horn on the right side was single and gave no indication of a double growth. The head has been mounted and will be preserved as a curiosity.

Loggers are not letting the sudden burst of cold weather and snow get by them without making the best use of these elements in preparing their logging roads. There is a general move to push the woods work while conditions are so favorable. The Sparrow-Kroll Lumber company is operating four large camps this winter, employing about 200 men at present but which number will be increased as the work progresses. The company is also working eighty head of horses. The usual cut of about twenty million feet of timber will be put in stream and at the mill.

The sudden freeze-up put a quietus to activities at the Sparrow-Kroll mill here. Operations ceased on the 13th and a force of men has been at work since raising the gates at the hot water pond and making a general clean-up of dead heads and hardwood logs that were sunken near the mill slide. In consequence, on account of there being insufficient water the dynamo at the electric power house have been cut out since Monday night, making it necessary for those using electric lights to see by the faint glim of kerosene lamps. It will require thirty days to get the mill in readiness for the winter's run.

BANKING BUSINESS SOLICITED.

BIG SUM SPENT ON ENGINE WORKS

LAKE SHORE PLANT HAS BEEN LARGELY MODERNIZED BY THE EXPENDITURE OF \$25,000.

HAS BEEN VIRTUALLY REBUILT

OTHER IMPROVEMENTS TO BE TAKEN UP IN THE SPRING.

Foundry Room Greatly Increased in Size and an Electrical Crane Has Been Installed—Other Changes.

The management of the Lake Shore Engine works is now completing improvements which, at a cost of about \$25,000, do a great deal to modernize the plant and provide for big reductions in manufacturing costs. In the past few months the plant has been largely rebuilt, and the rearrangement of the various departments, as well as new equipment, provide for some great economies.

The exterior appearance of the plant has been changed in no small degree. The main building, fronting on Lake street, has been lengthened by taking in the former boiler shop. It has likewise been increased in height. The walls were raised five feet and the light fixtures, providing an admirable light in the shop and foundry, were put in, giving the roof an increased height of about ten feet.

The rearrangement of the interior of the plant is now about complete and work is again proceeding in an orderly and effective manner. Some little details are still being worked out, but they are not of a nature to cause any interruption in the main departments.

The greatest improvement is found in the foundry, which has been enlarged to at least twice its former size. The room is now 175 by 47 feet, and the light is admirable. In it is installed the fifteen-ton Pauling & Harnischfeger electrical crane, which handles with great speed and perfect safety the heaviest castings.

Into the northeast end of the foundry runs a spur of railroad track, which can be used either by the Marquette and Southeastern or South Shore roads, providing for the delivery of material right in the plant. Beginning at this spur and running through the yards and back to the foundry room through the machine shops, is a narrow gauge track, used in handling material within the plant. There is a patented Kinear rolling door where the railroad cars are to have entrance and a second door is to be put in between the foundry room and the heavy machine shop.

Off the foundry room the core room is enlarged, and there are several other minor improvements. It is planned in the spring to put in a new brass foundry, with enlarged capacity and better equipment for the brass work.

The Heavy Machine Shop. In the heavy machine shop, southwest of the foundry, is installed the heavy man power crane formerly used in the foundry, it replacing a jig crane that had been in use there over twenty years.

This shop has been largely increased in size as a result of additional length gained in the main wing of the plant, and it is now 125 by 47 feet. This increase allows for the setting aside of a goodly floor space for erecting purposes. A lack of room for this work has always been a good deal of an inconvenience at the plant. The superintendent's office and the tinsmith's shop are to be installed in one corner of this room.

In the machine shop which fronts on Washington street, where all the light work is done, there have been no changes, as it was well arranged and adapted for the work.

The store room is to have new and larger quarters, conveniently located between the two main machine shops. This is one of the most important departments at the plant, and when it is fully fitted up and supplied it will be a veritable hardware store. Upwards of \$10,000 worth of stock is carried.

In the yard considerable work has been done at the two cupolas, around which a substantial brick wall has been built. The charging platform has an iron floor and is covered with a steel roof. This platform is on a level with the coke chute, from which the fuel for the cupola is run in on a tramway. A new power iron elevator is to be installed.

Not the least of the improvements is the installation of a new vacuum heating system, along with a 100 horsepower boiler to replace one worn out in service. The new system furnishes heat for the entire plant and keeps it warm at reasonable cost, being economical of operation. Besides being used for heating purposes the boiler furnishes steam for whatever engines are used about the plant, although the main motive power is electricity, a large motor being employed to drive the machinery.

The convenience of the men has not been overlooked, and flush closets have been installed in both the foundry and machine shops. A new washroom is also to be provided.

To Remodel Blacksmith Shop. It is proposed to remodel the blacksmith shop, a work which would have been taken up this fall had the winter held off longer. The floor space of the shop is to be increased by about a third and new equipment, including another steam hammer, shears and puncher, is to be put in. In addition the purchase of a new fourteen-inch boring mill for the machine shop is contemplated, to be used in turning out drums for the heating plant. Other improvements are also planned, such as a separate motor for the pattern shop and a complete telephone system for the plant.

The works are working full handed and are very busy, with lots to do in sight. The changes outlined above put them in better condition than ever before to turn out work expeditiously and in a first-class manner.

A 250-POUND BUCK.

A 250-pound buck, the largest brought in this season and one of the largest killed by a Marquette hunter in some years, was hung up in front of Fesser's meat market yesterday, and inspection of the tag showed the name of Peter White. Mr. White shot the big fellow at his camp near Deerton. The buck had a magnificent pair of heavy horns, and was a stocky, plump carcass. He was struck in the front shoulder. The deer attracted much attention yesterday, as it easily outweighed the other bucks brought to town this year.

HUNTERS GOING HOME.

Lower Michigan Sportsmen Gradually Leaving the Upper Peninsula.

The movement of lower Michigan hunters to their homes has commenced, and they are gradually straggling back. They come in with a rush, but they leave by twos and threes and small parties, according to the length of time that they see fit to hunt. The movement toward the straits has been noticeable during the past few days and from now on it will increase until it reaches its climax at the close of the season. Judging from the number of deer handled by the South Shore the lower Michigan hunters have been meeting with very fair success. Every regular train lately carries in the neighborhood of fifty carcasses into St. Ignace. The hunting season has so far been free of fatalities in the eastern part of the peninsula, where a number occurred last year, and to date no lower Michigan men have been shot.

The movement of resident hunters is likewise away from the woods. Fewer sportsmen are out in quest of game than at any previous time during the season. Many of them have had their hunts and set one or two trophies of the chase. Others have quit in despair of ever shooting a deer. The hunters generally report fair success, though it does not appear, by any means, that the slaughter has been unprecedented.
