the temperature of the rock was found to be 108 degrees F., which, allowing for the mean annual temperature of 60 degrees F., indicates an increment of 1 degree per seventy-eight feet of descent; to refund the money on a 50-cent bottle therefore, while the hardness of the rock maintaining an atmosphere suitable for efficient manual labor has intruded itself. While two men can work a rock-drill in the upper levels, three are reouired at 3.856 feet, on account of the greater strain on their endurance. In order to mitigate the heat, water is brought down from a dam at 3.200 feet and men at the face are sprayed contin-
