





## CENSUS AGENT LOOKING UP DATA

GETTING FACTS ON FINANCIAL CONDITION OF U. P. CITIES AND COUNTIES.

HIS WORK IN THIS REGION IS NEARLY FINISHED.

This Inquiry Is Something New for Census Bureau, but Hereafter Will Be Undertaken Every Five

Years.

James Barr, an employe of the census bureau at Washington D. C., is in Marquette for the purpose of collecting data regarding the financial condition of the city, also of the county. Yesterday he was pursuing his inquiry at the city building, and later he will take up his work at the county offices. He comes here from up-the-road, where he has been working the past few days. Mr. Barr has been on the upper peninsula for over a month, pursuing this inquiry into the financial condition of cities and counties, and in this time has visited the majority of the counties. He is about through with the work, and after finish-ing up in Alger will return to Washing-ton. He came north instructed to work all the upper peninsula, with the exception of two or three of the eastern counties. His superiors have now ordered hurry back. They have ascertained that he has a command of the Spanish language, and desire his assistance with the tabulation of the results of the Philippine census, which have just lately been received. This census is, for the most part, in Spanish, so that the number of clerks that can be employed to

advantage on it is of necessity limited. Mr. Barr's inquiry into the financial affairs of Marquette city is very thorough, extensive blanks being supplied for use in cities of 10,000 inhabitants or over. The inquiry covers all possible questions, accounts and expenditures. The inquiry into county affairs is no less thorough. Bureau Is Now Permanent.

nent bureau, and although the national census is taken only at the end of each decade there is a vast field of inquiry that may be profitably worked in the interval between. This is what the bureau, with the approval and support of congress, is doing, the scope of its work and inquiries being widened every year. The bureau is a large establishment. even when the national census is completed, tabulated and out of the way. At present the force of clerks is in the neighborhood of 900, engaged with the tabulation of material gathered in the various special inquiries.

To the ordinary run of people 900 clerks appears like a goodly number, but it is a mere handful compared with the force employed when the rush of getting and preparing the results of the national census was on. Then the clerks numbered as high as 5,000, this figure, of course, taking no account of the enumerators who were employed in counting the population. These enumerators made up an army of over 50,000 people, busy as they possibly could be during the weeks in which the census had to be completed. When the census of 1900 was finished the force was reduced to the normal footing, at which it has re-

The functions of the bureau are by no means confined to the enumeration but are of an infinitely more varied nature, and, as has been intimated above are constantly being expanded. The bureau undertakes inquiries of any sort that may properly be judged to fall within its scope, and prepares any sort of statistics for which any division of showed no real tendency until late in the government or any large segment of the day's transactions, when they stiffthe public may have a real demand. It is today one of the most important bureaus in the government service.
