

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

ISLAND WOULD KEEP TROOPS.

Porto Ricans Object to Disbanding Their Regiment of Natives,

San Juan, Feb. 8.-As the time pro sed for the disbanding of the Porto Rican provisional regiment approaches sentiment throughout the island and especially in San Juan is growing stronger against such action. This anti-disbandng feeling has been intensified recently public knowledge of a quiet polling of the Porto Rican soldiers to learn how many would be willing to enlist for service at Panama in the event of war with Colombia or as a guard along the canal. Ninety-five per cent of the men expressed themselves as anxious to reenlist, especially if there was a prospect of going to the isthmus. The polling, it is said, was by direct orders of the war department, the rules of which prevent the sending of soldiers to war whose terms of enlistment expire within six months, and, therefore, few, if any, of the soldiers of the Porto Rican reginent could be sent involuntarily to Pan-

The only way that the regiment could e used in war with Colombia, if it should come, is by a voluntary reenlistment of the men, or the enlistment of other Porto Ricans. The latter proedure would not be practicable, as the new men would not have sufficient training to do the work expected of them in

The fact that the soldlers are acclimated and speak the Spanish language makes them especially available for service in any Spanish-speaking territory. The development of these men physically, intellectually, socially and as soldiers has been one of the most interesting results of the American occupation of Porto Rico. ACETATE PLANT ABOUT TO START

ING ANOTHER BYPRODUCT AT

WILL HELP WATER SITUATION

IT WILL REDUCE AMOUNT OF STUFF GOING INTO THE LAKE,

Mr. Farrell Is of the Opinion That the Trouble With the Water Will Be of a Constantly Decreasing

Another of the byproduct plants at the North Marquette furnace of the Pioneer Iron company about ready to go into commission is that for the manufacture of acetate of lime, on which work has been progressing for the past several weeks. It is now about finished. and in a few days it will be adding aptreciably to the value of the byproducts derived from the smoke distillations from the company's eighty kilns odd.

The furnace officials say that the acctate plant will further reduce the amount of foreign matter being discharged into the lake and give it as their opinion that this will in turn lessen the amount of trouble experienced with the water supply, although in this connection it is only fair to state that Professor Koenig last week said that the stuff that will go into the production of acetate of lime is harmless in the water and has nothing to do with giving it the unwonted taste about which there has been so much complaint during the past several months. However, it is readily apparent that anything which in any degree reduces the amount of foreign matter going into the lake is in the nature of an improvement, and therefore the completion of the acetate plant is a thing to be welcomed,

Austin Farrell, manager of the North Marquette furnace, is of the opinion that there will be a constantly decreasing amount of trouble with the creosote, and he is inclined to believe that the coming summer there will be less cause for complaint than there was during the and calculated to give rise to a hope that he may be right, and that the water problem may thus solve itself.

He calls attention to the fact that for four solid months after the kilns at the of the season, North Marquette plant were first burned, previous to the date when the byproduct plant went into operation, there was permitted to flow into the lake the whole product of smoke distillations. The smoke was condensed to prevent interference with the work at the plant and they had to be permitted to find their way through the ditches into the lake. Thus for four months a flow of upwards of 1,500 gallons of tar, together with other waste and soluble foreign matter, went daily into the water. All the tar that is now drawn off and burned, about 1.200 gallons a day, and all that now escapes were alike deposited in the lake. If Professor Koenig's theory that the tar is responsible for the trouble is correct it may be readily seen that here is where an amount of deleterious mat-

When the chemical plant went into commission the larger part of this tar waste was cut off. As Professor Koenig commented last week, the first tar is drawn off and burned under the boilers. The tar that escapes to the lake is a second tar, left after the process of saving the byproducts is complete and then washed out of the stills. This second tar is but a small percentage of the first tar now burned under the boilers and ferred to, allowed to escape,

It works out to this, that during the months previous to the operation of the chemical plant there escaped into the lake an amount of tar equal in volume to what is now escaping in three or four years or more, and it is with this fact in mind that Mr. Farrell is in-
