James Morgan, who arrived here last night from the lower Rio Grande region, confirms the report that the river has changed its course and that a greater bulk of its water is flowing down the bed of the Arroyo Colorado than in the old bed of the river which runs by Brownsville.

He says that the Texas territory which is now situated below the main channel of the river aggregates fully 606,000 acres of land. The Arroyo Colorado channel is being constantly deepened by the flow of the river and it now said to be considerably below the level of the old channel. The distance and the mouth of the old channel is twenty-five miles. The river empties into Arroyo Colorado about four miles below the town of Hidalgo,

Brownsville Is Threatened.

The city of Brownsville, which has population of about 10,000 people and is the terminus of the new railroad built by the Yoakum syndicate, promises to be left high and dry if the Arroyo Colorado channel becomes the permanent water way of the river.
