THREE POLITICAL CAMPAIGNS.

The fact that Canada and the United States are to be simultaneously engaged in a general political campaign has already been noted.

The Newfoundland election is set for Monday, Oct. 31, and the Canadian for Thursday, Nov. 3.

In Newfoundland there are three parties hotly contending for control of the government. The Liberals have been in possession for four years under Sir Robert Bond, and he is fighting the campaign on the issue of resistance to confederation with Canada.

The contest in Canada is between the present Liberal administration headed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Conservatives under Hon. R. L. Borden, who in 1901 was elected leader of that party on the resignation of Sir Charles Tupper.

There is a thin thread of connection between the three political campaigns now covering the whole continent north of the Gulf of Mexico.
